

At current feed prices Professor England calculated that a baby pig is worth about \$10.00 at weaning time. So obviously every pig that can be saved to go to market is a ten dollar bill in the seller's pocket. Conversely, every baby pig that dies is a ten dollar loss. A few cents worth of electricity can prevent this loss.



A report recently made by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Bensons shows that about 79 percent of the funds were used for irrigation, including the purchase of pumps and piping, the drilling of wells and the construction and repair of irrigation ditches and laterals. Irrigation systems were developed or improved for about 282,000

In Texas, through December 31, 1955, 85 per cent of the \$2,280,000 loaned was used for irrigation. Irrigation systems were developed or improved for more than 34,603 acres. The remainder of the funds was used for such soil conservation measures as terracing and pasture improvement, and developing water systems for household use and farm livestock.

This was too late for the farmer to preirrigate much of his cotton land. He irrigated 62 acres and harvested 63 bales of cotton without using any fertilizer this Dryland cotton in this area on similar land made about 1-3 of a bale per acre. He acres of land planted to milo and applied water one time after planting. It yielded 2,500 pounds, whereas his dry land per acre. In addition to watering his row crops, he seeded a 2-acre plot to alfalfa which provided a good hog and cow pasture. He seeded an 8-acre plot to vetch and oats and now has a good pasture. At the time the loan was made, the farmer had 10 head of livestock and 2 brood sows. He now has 30 head of livestock and 21 hogs and has sufficient pasture and feed to take care of them. He has a good poultry program. By having the winter pasture and vetch, this farmer is utilizing his irrigation system year-round, and is successful in his farming operations where other farmers in the area, hard hit by drought, are going deeper into debt to continue their opera-

Private lenders provide most of the funds from which these. loans are made. The Farmers Home Administration makes and services the loans and insures repayment of the funds advanced. Farmers pay 41/2 percent in interest or in interest and insurance charges for the loans. The loans are scheduled for repayment within the shortest period of time consistent with the ability of the borrower to repay. The maximum repayment period on loans to individuals is 20 years.

To be eligible for a soil and water conservation loan, a farmer must have reasonable prospects of conducting successful farming operations. He must also be unable to obtain the necessary credit on reasonable terms from private lending sources. Applications for soil and water conservation loans may be made at the county offices of the Farmers Home Administration. The local County Farmers Home Administration office which services Moore, Hutchinson, and Sherman Counties is located in the courthouse in Dumas, Texas.


