### **Texas** Allotted 4,149,071 Acres For '57 Wheat

tional wheat allotment is 4,149,071 acres, about 2 per cent less than the state's allotment for 1956, according to the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The national allotment 1957 continues at 55 million acres, the minimum permitted by law. Allotments for the 9 states of Kansas (10,615,188 acres), North Dakota (7,327,856 acres), Oklahoma (4,878,623 acres), Texas (4,149,071 acres) South Dakota (2,746,578 acres) and Washington (1,994,450 acres) account for more than three-fourths of the national

The State Committee advises that the State allotment is now being divided among the counties and notices of 1957 county allotments will be sent to county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation offices in the near future. County allotments then will be divided among wheat farms of the county with each farmer notified of his farm's wheat acreage allotment well in advance of the wheat marketing quota referendum to be held July 20. If two-thirds of those voting in the referendum approve, farmers harvesting more than their farm allotments will be subject to a penalty of 45 per cent of parity on their excess wheat.

### **Veterans Asked** To Cash Leave Bonds, Buy E's

Thousands of World War II veterans in Texas are holding Armed Forces Leave Bonds that have drawn no interest for five years or longer, and Uncle Sam would like to pay up, an average of \$200.00 a piece.

Jesse L. Adams, Jr., state sales director of the U.S. Treasury's Savings Bonds Division, has an idea for these ex-G.I.'s who apparently don't need the money right now. He suggests they redeem those Leave Bonds and put the money in Series E Savings Bonds, which pay 3 per cent interest compounded semannually when held to maturity of nine years and eight months.

In the country as a whole, 130,000 veterans hold Leave Bonds worth \$26 million. It's all that's left of more than two billion dollars paid to members of the Armed Forces discharged between April 1943 and October 1, 1946. The five-year bonds, carrying an interest rate of 21/2 per cent a year, were used to reimburse veterans for unused

Dalhart, Dumas, Conlen, Kerrick, Texhoma, Spearman and Gruver are organizing Ground Observation Corps primarily for the purpose of spotting and reporting tornados which may appear in this territory at this time of the year.

The Ground Observation Corps is primarily set up to spot and report aircraft but it has the secondary mission of severe weather reporting. When severe weather is reported in any area, all posts in that area are alerted to man their posts for severe weather. Upon sighting a tornado, hail, or winds over 50 miles an hour, these are reported to the Oklahoma Air Defense Filter Center. If it is a tornado, the word is relayed to the Weather Bureau, who immediately puts it on radio and television. It takes about 1 or 2 minutes for these warnings to be issued, far faster than they could be called in on ordinary long distance calls.

The GOC is comprised of people of all ages over 14, who have normal eyesight, hearing, and can speak distinctly over a

Mixed Reaction To Highway Bill A bonanza or a blunder, Texans are in disagreement as to which term applies to the new federal highway bill.

Senate passage of the bill left only a few details to be ironed out in House-Senate conference before sending the measure to the President. Final enactment will set into motion a 13-year, \$51,000,000,000 interstate highway construction program.

Texas Highway Department officials are frankly jubilant. They are poised to begin letting contracts August 1, using the new supply of federal funds. "We'll be scraping the bottom of the barrel in the July letting," said State Highway Engineer DeWitt C. Greer.

Greer said the new law would mean a minimum increase of \$57,000,000 a year in federal road building aid to Texas, or double the present amount.

He called it "the most farreaching piece of highway legislation yet enacted." He predicted an era of unparalled development.

Gov. Allan Shivers was less enthusiastic. He charged turning a state function over to "bungling bureaucracy" made it unduly costly.

What does egg cooling mean to the egg producer? It has several advantages: 1. He gets a higher price per dozen for his quality eggs because the ultimate consumer is willing to pay more for eggs that he knows are quality. 2. He is assured of a constant mar-ket because cooled eggs are a better edible food product. 3. He needs to make fewer trips to market, thereby saving on hauling costs and time. 4. Obviously the investment in egg cooling equipment will more than pay off.

will do both the cooling and humidifying job needed to maintain quality? Tests at the Texas Agriultural Extension Service found that refrigerative equipment must be used, and that, in general, a twelve case cooler will handle the production from 1,800 laying hens by marketing twice weekly. The cost, expressed in terms of kilowatt hours used, is only 1½ kilowatt hours of electricity per case of eggs cooled. This is indeed cheap insurance for keeping your market eggs at top quality. Inci-dentally, those who have tried evaporative egg coolers found that in high temperatures the method failed to bring egg temperatures down to 55 degrees and that humidity control was lacking. Too much relative humidity may cause mold to develop on the eggs, while too little may cause weight shrinkage, as much as 3½% in five to seven days.


