Wheat Vote To Decide **Vital Questions**

How wheat farmers vote in the July 20 referendum on wheat marketing quotas will actually affect only two parts of the 1957 wheat program, according to R. G. Shrauner. Chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization devote a little of their time durand Conservation Committee. ing storm periods for the pur-Whether or not quotas are approved, acreage allotments will remain in effect for the crop, the chairman declared.

The two points at issue in the vote are (1) whether marketing quotas shall be in effect, with penalties on "excess" wheat from farms (with more than 15 acres of wheat harvested as grain) not in compliance with the acreage allotment; and (2) the level of price support available to those who comply with their farm acreage allotments.

If quotas are approved by at least two-thirds of those who vote in the referendum, the quotas and penalties for excess production will be in effect, and price support on the crop will be available at a level between 75 and 90 percent of parity to those who comply with the farm wheat allotments.

If more than one-third of the voters disapprove the quotas, there will be no marketing quotas and no penalties for excess production, and the available price support will drop to 50 percent of parity, as provided by duties of the Ground Ob-

Whether or not quotas are in effect, acreage allotments will remain in effect for the 1957 wheat crop.

Chairman Shrauner explained that wheat marketing quotas and acreage allotments operate only in commercial wheat States, including Texas. Since the quotas affect only those growers in the commercial area who will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain on a farm in 1957, these growers are

the only ones eligible to vote

in the referendum.

The general purpose of the meeting is to secure enough volunteers to organize a Ground Observation Corps for the purpose of reporting severe weather in this vicinity. In the plains section the Ground Observation Corps is composed of citizens of each community who pose of citing tornados. Warnings are issued which make possible the saving of human life in the event of an approaching

The only requirement necessary for a citizen to qualify as a member of the Ground Observation Corps is to attend three schools for a peroid of two hours

In event enough are secured to organize the corps in Stratford, an observation tower will be erected on the roof of the courthouse building. The federal government will install a direct telephone line to the Oklahoma Air Defense Filter Center. In event a tornado is sighted it would be possible to warn the people of this territory by direct phone lines to Oklahoma City and Amarillo within two minutes through the combined cooperation of television and radio.

the program, according to R. G. Shrauner, Chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. A short visit to the county office will provide interested farmers with full information on terms and conditions of participation in the Acreage Reserve, which is the first part of the program to get underway this year.

"Growers interested in taking part in the Acreage Reserve have until July 20 to sign the Soil Bank agreements, designating the acreage of wheat (or other "basic" crop) which they wish to include under the Re-Chairman Shrauner serve," states.

A wheat grower who wishes to participate in the Acreage Reserve this year, the Chairman explained, first must have complied with all allotments set for his farm. However, any farm may produce one acre of peanuts without becoming ineligible for Acreage Reserve. If he can meet this condition, he then has three or four opportunities for Rights Bill." The agent who earning payments on 1956 crops.

Such a farmer may earn payments either by underplanting, by crop loss through weather conditions or other natural causes, or by plowing or cutting a portion of the crop to reduce the acreage below the allotment. Certain conditions for eligibility are attached to all the methods of qualifying for the Acreage Reserve. Payments per bushel vary with counties but will be based on county rate times the normal or the appraised yield, according to the method of qualifying.

Payments for underplanting winter wheat, seeded last fall for harvest in 1956, may be made only if the farmer underplanted his farm wheat allotment because of adverse weather conditions. The rate for this practice is \$4.00 per acre.
