Mrs. A. L. Fiddler, her 12 year old daughter, Judy, and 5 year old son, Larry, of Houston, Texas sustained injuries when a blowout of the left front tire of their station wagon resulted in a wreck on U. S. 287 about two miles south of Kerrick about 9:15 a. m. Thursday morning of last week.

## Trucks Must Have Texas License Tags

### Find County Grasshoppers In Concentrated Hatching Areas

Now is the time to poison grasshoppers, while they are concentrated in the hatching areas, is the advice issued this week by the county agents office. Grasshopper infestation is breaking out in local areas scattered over Sherman County. The present infestation is concentrated in small areas but may be expected to spread rapidly unless they are brought under control by farmers and ranchmen.

Control measures should be directed toward killing the hoppers while they are small and concentrated in the hatching area. There are a number of chemicals that will give very successful control if properly applied. Aldrin, Dieldrin, Chlordane and Toxaphene have been used successfully to poison grasshoppers. Instructions on the container should be followed carefully in using these chemicals. They should not be sprayed or dusted on any vegetables or fruit that grows above the ground, that is to be used for human consumption.

Aldrin was used and killed 90 to 100% of the grasshoppers on range land treated in the east part of the county two years ago. Aldrin should be applied as a spray at a rate of 4 ounces per acre for range land or in yards and fence rows, or about 5 to 7 gallons per acre if water is used as the solvent. It should not be applied in great enough quantities to run off of the leaves. A fine mist or fog is desirable. If oil is used as a solvent not more than 1 gallon per acre should be applied.

Aldrin kills grasshoppers by contact and as a poison when they eat it. The hoppers can be expected to die 24 to 72 hours after they have fed on it. Aldrin will kill the hoppers after it is sprayed on the foliage for a period of a week or 10 days.

Dieldrin, Chlordane and Toxaphene should be applied and handled with care, as recom-

If the grasshopper infestation is so severe and wide spread that the operator cannot cope with the situation the federal government will cooperate in a county wide program for grasshopper control.

In a county program of this type contracts can be left for spraying the range land at a cost of not more than 60 cents per acre. The federal government will share the expense of spraying up to one-third of the cost, or 20 cents per acre. If the ranchmen in Sherman County are interested in this type of program, they are requested to contact the county agent immediately so that plans can be made to spray the hoppers before they develop wings.

Wheat producers who contemplate using out-of-state trucks during harvest, were cautioned this week by Tax Collector John Kidwell to make certain the owners of the trucks had secured their Texas permits before making any contracts. This precaution will avoid the possibility of considerable delay during the harvest rush.

Texas law requires that out-of-state trucks hauling wheat in Texas, have at least 30-day permits, to be eligible for use on its roads and highways. A further requirement is that the motor vehicle carry liability insurance of not less than \$5,000 for bodily injury of one person, \$10,000 bodily injury of two or more persons, and \$5,000 liability insurance against property damage in one accident. The liability insurance requirements must be complied with before a 30-day Texas license permit can be issued.

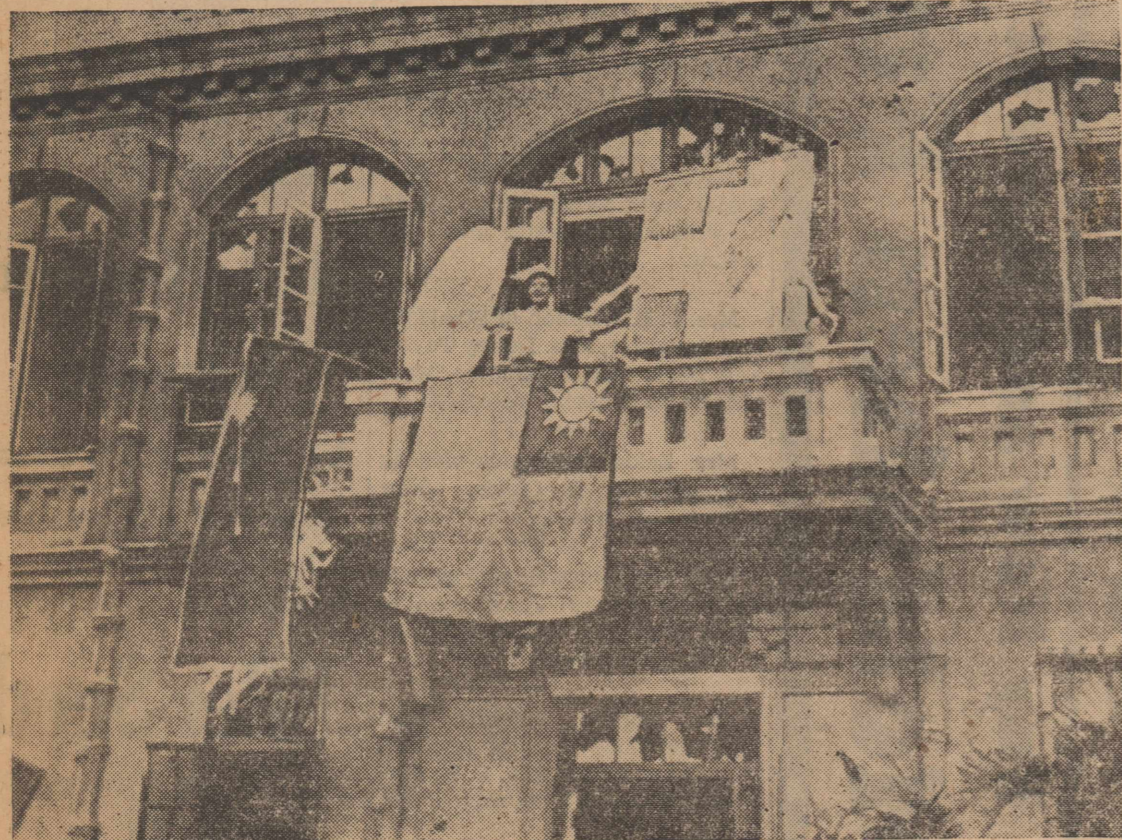
In event local producers hire truckers who have not met with these requirements and they are stopped by an officer, a time consuming delay may result.

It is in the hope of preventing such delays that Tax Collector John Kidwell has issued the warning to producers, and advises them to make certain the trucks hauling their grain are qualified to operate on Texas roads.

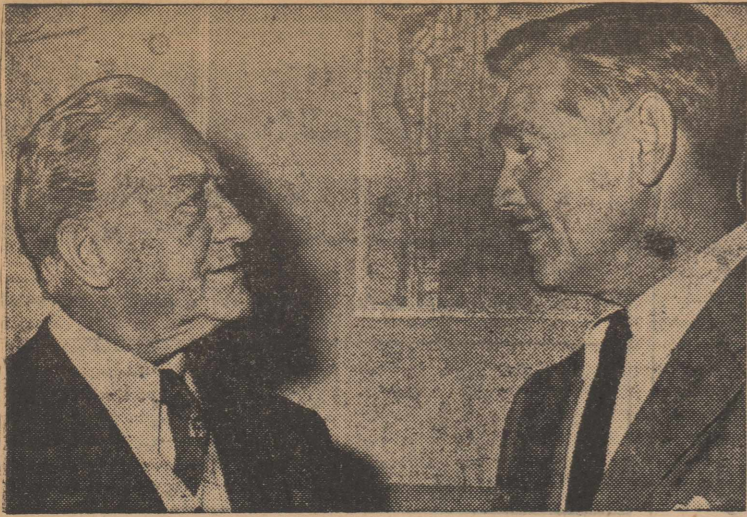

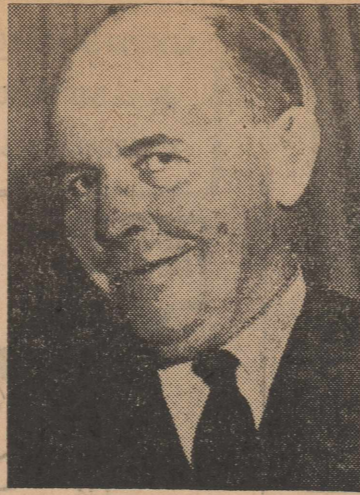

**WHAT'S** wrong with this picture? Wage increases are promptly labeled "inflationary" while price increases, with living costs now at highest point in history, are "gently chided."

Agricultural surpluses, instead of being used to provide adequate diets for millions of underfed Americans, and for starving people in other nations to strengthen the free world, are being used as a pretext for forcing farmers into poverty.

The President's budget adding up to a record \$71.8 billion and on a par with wartime budgets, in terms of a 1956 dollar, would total only \$30.6 billions of goods and services in terms of 1940 dollars.

Comparatively, in 1940 farmers spent \$6.7 billion in cash on the operation of farms, while in 1956 they spent \$21.7 billion, or more than three times as much in terms of 1956 dollars. Price increases took the first big upturn in 1953 immediately after price and wage controls were taken off the economy in this administration, and the hard money and tight credit policy was inaugurated by the Treasury Department, with the Federal Reserve Banking system refusing to put on the brakes, as it had done in the past.

In 1957 the American people are paying at the rate of \$425 billion dollars for goods and services which in terms of 1940 dollars would have cost only \$194.5 billions. In other words the people pay \$230.4 billions which added to the cost of things by inflation.

Take taxes—Personal taxes back in 1940 amounted to \$2.6 billions. Today personal tax alone is running at the rate of \$41 billions a year. President Eisenhower has

tried to make a case for his super-budget. He points out that \$41 billion goes for defense and that's not too high a price to pay for security. But he does not say why an airplane today costs three times as much as it did in 1946 or 1948, or why a submarine costs twice as much as it did seven years ago, or why Atomic Energy costs four times as much as it did in 1950.

Economists within the government say the reason for this picture is the so-called "wage-cost-spiral" bringing about inflation. But inflation, real inflation is only brought about when total demand for goods and services far exceeds our productive powers, when the economy expands at an unusually fast pace, when unemployment is negligible and almost all prices and income spiral upward.

But today there is no shortage in anything. As a matter of fact total private and public demand for goods and services is far short of our productive capacities and the upward curve of our growth is flattening out. Soaring prices have not been caused by any excessive demand, nor justified by higher costs. And some economists outside the government see the cause as due to price fixing and profiteering, which is cutting into consumer purchasing power—which boils down to a factor of under-consumption of goods and services, rather than over-production. As a matter of fact, due to this under-consumption, production rate is on the down-grade rather than increasing. Growth in production rate has fallen from 4 1/2% a year in the 1947-53 period to about 2% from the fourth quarter 1955 to the fourth quarter 1956.

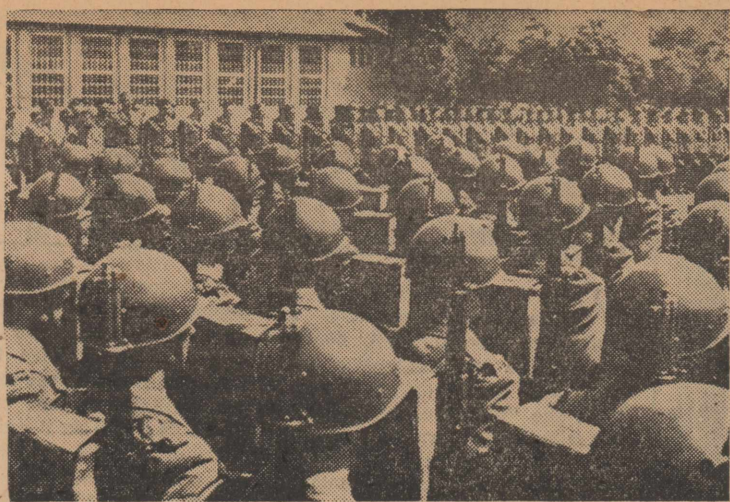

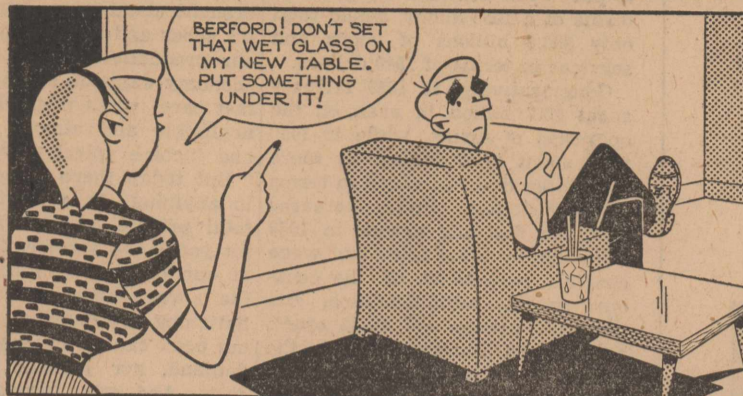

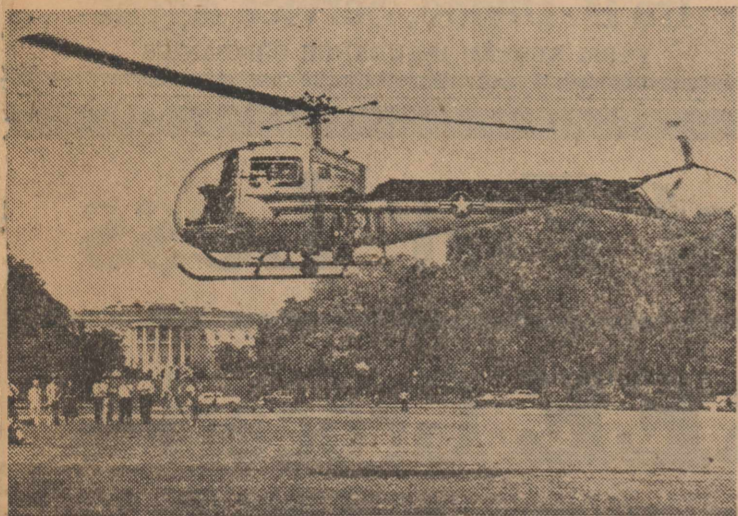

### The WORLD OUTDOORS



TWO of our most popular sports—boating and fishing—make an ideal combination for the sportsman who's lucky enough to have a few days to spend in the great outdoors.

Floating a stream with a small boat is an excellent way to relax, enjoy beautiful scenery and the smell of clean, fresh air. It's also the best way to discover new fishing spots quite inaccessible to the angler who travels on foot. Among my fondest memories are the floating trips made on the creeks and rivers of the deep south. The average float took three or four days, and we never hurried. In the heat of the day we would seek the cooling shelter of a cypress or oak. Every stream of water entering the river was investigated and many of them led to seldom-fished lakes, well stocked with hungry, fighting bass.

If you're floating a good stream and water conditions are right, you can often catch more fish than you can eat, or wish to keep. Many veteran floaters work as a trio: the bow man gets the brim and smaller bass with a fly rod; the center man goes after heavy bass with big, floating plug; and the anchor man keeps the boat just the right distance from shore. This type of fishing, however, is not recommended in cases where waters are dangerous or the man in the middle (tossing many-barbed plugs) isn't a highly competent and accurate caster.

If there's a stream near your neighborhood that is deep and safe enough for floating, give it a try. You can drive a second car to the "take-out" point or have someone meet you there to bring you home. But give it a whirl and you'll find new enthusiasm for the world outdoors.

### Texans Need Civil Defense

Texans might well adopt the Boy Scout slogan - "Be Prepared" warns William L. McGill, state co-ordinator of Defense and Disaster Relief, following the state-wide devastation caused by 112 tornadoes, rampaging creeks and rivers and the Panhandle blizzard since March 1.

"Civil Defense," Mr. McGill points out, "will not in itself prevent floods, tornadoes and other natural disasters, but properly mobilized civil defense will go far to protect lives and property when emergencies arise. Every community should perfect a strong Civil Defense organization that it may be prepared for any emergency, be it war, tornado, hurricane, flood, fire, epidemic, explosion, or any other disaster."

Through passage of the Texas Civil Protection Act of 1951, Governor Price Daniel is empowered, through the State Co-ordinator of Defense and Disaster Relief, in emergencies to call on the combined resources of the departments of Public Safety, Public Welfare, Civil Aviation, Health, Fire, Highways, the Railroad Commission, the Employment Service, the National Guard, state consultants on engineering and education and a liaison officer of the American Red Cross, together with a representative of the Attorney General of Texas, who serves as legal adviser. These are some of the tremendous resources at the command of your Civil Defense. The facilities and services of all other State departments and agencies are also subject to call, those listed being members of the State Defense and Disaster Relief operating organization.

### Consider Alaskan Statehood

(By Walter Rogers)

The bill for Alaskan statehood has been reported favorably by the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs. The vote was 24 to 6. My vote was included among the 6 opposed to statehood.

This will undoubtedly prove to be a highly controversial issue again this year as it has been each year in the past. One of the amendments that barely escaped adoption in the Committee because of a tie vote will probably be the subject of more debate in the House than any other portion of the bill. The amendment was offered in Committee by Mr. Pillion, of New York. Its purpose is to provide for an election to be held in Alaska on the question of "statehood" or "no statehood", as a condition precedent to Alaska becoming a state when, as, and if the present bill is passed. One of the best arguments in favor of such an election is the fact that in a recent poll taken in Alaska, the vote was more than 2 to 1 against statehood. It has always been my position that under any and all circumstances, the people of Alaska should have the opportunity to approve or disapprove the issue.

#### The Budget

The budget continues to be a number one conversation item in Washington, and among the top subjects in the mail. To date, the House has considered and acted on 22 separate measures concerning the appropriation of funds for this government and its departments and agencies. It has not acted on the Public Works bill, which is sometimes referred to as the "pork barrel" bill, nor the Mutual Security (Foreign Aid) bill. As of June 3, 1957, the Senate had acted on 14 of these measures. Four had been signed into law by the President, while 6 were awaiting the President's signature. Four of the measures were subject to the action of a Conference Committee between the House and the Senate. The 4 that have already been
