



New Texas Teenage Driver's License Laws **Become Effective** August 23

- (1) Youngsters 14 and over can be fined \$100 for speeding, DWI or driving without a license.
- (2) Parents will be liable up to \$300 for property damage by minor children.
- (3) Drivers licenses for youngsters under 16 will be harder to get. Department of Public Safety, rather than local county judge, will have say-so.
 - (4) A special "license" will be needed for driving motor bikes and scooters.

REV. ROBERT H. HARPER HURRICANES

HUNDRED and one years A ago, August 10, 1856, not a human being was left on Last Island, Derniere Isle, off the coast of Louisiana. For a great storm had roared out of the Gulf, followed by a tidal wave, and swept the island clean and left it to the sole habitation of gulls and pelicans. The large hotel and all that made summer resort for South Louisiana a hundred years ago were swept away. But it may be doubted that the century-old disaster that wrote Finis on Derniere Isle and rise to legends that have survived the years was really as appalling as the black ruin wrought the latter part of June by Hurricane Audrey upon the courthouse town of Cameron and a great section of the low-lying Gulf coast of Louisiana. Five hundred lives were lost and untold wealth was swept away.

Stories of terrible Audrey, like that of the hurricane that left Last Island an uninhabited strip of sand, may well survive for a century. 


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I Am My Brother's Keeper

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children: and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:



6 medium-sized tomatoes 2 tablespoons softened butter 1/3 cup fine bread crumbs

1/3 cup grated Cheddar cheese 1 teaspoon prepared mustard 1/2 teaspoon salt ¼ teaspoon pepper
