



From Mary E. Osborn, Pleasant View, Ky .: I remember when my father owned oxen he made a yoke of popular wood. He made bows of hickory and dressed the wood with his drawing knife. He made holes in the yoke with an auger and bent the bows to fit around the oxen's neck. He hitched them to his farm wagon to haul corn fodder, fire wood and many other things. In the fall when the crop was gathered and put away, he would go to Pleasant View, to buy salt, flour, sugar and coffee to do us all winter. In the winter time the mud was to the

wagon hubs. Rabbits, squirrels, quail, wild turkeys were plentiful and hunting was fun. When the snow fell and the ground began to freeze, our hogs were killed and salted down on the meat bench in the smoke house with a winter's supply of apples, beans, cabbage, kraut, sweet and Irish potatoes. We youngsters popped corn, made tuff jack, ate apples and roasted potatoes. The boys set traps and would catch six or eight rabbits, racoons, opposum and other game. a pasttime that made the wintertime seem more fun and appear

shorter and less dreary. We always waited for March to come blustering over the hills. Warm sunshine burst buds into April flowers and wild flowers spread rainbow colors everywhere. Wild birds would sing jubilees in every tree and apple blossom petals showered down all around. Pleasant dreams. Peace on earth, and the old blue hen singing in the farmyard. And then the fields were planted again in corn and potatoes and other things.





ng excess acreage of some crop other than the crop covered by an Acreage Reserve agreement, he loses the entire payment he would have earned by complying with all provisions of the Acreage Reserve program. No civil penalty applies in this case. (As originally announced, a civil penalty would also have applied in this case.)

However, if the farmer harvests more of the Acreage Reserve crop than his crop allotment less the crop land in the Acreage Reserve, the farmer is subject to both loss of his payment and a civil penalty of 50 per cent of the payment.

The civil penalty also applies to such program violations as grazing or harvesting a crop from land designated under the Acreage Reserve agreement.

Farmers in commercial wheat states may sign agreements to take part in the 1958 winter wheat Acreage Reserve program until October 4. The program for spring wheat and other spring-seeded crops will be announced before planting time.

Wheat growers are urged to urnish without delay all information, including their farm's production history for 1956 and 1957, necessary for that County ASC Committee to establish a Soil Bank base for the farm. This base must be determined before a 1958 winter wheat Acreage Reserve agreement may be
