Commissioners' Court Considers Erecting Community Building

The Commissioners' Court is considering the erection of a community building to be located on property on which the county barn has been erected. A proposed 40x30 building has been suggested by ladies of the county home demonstration clubs. When space for a kitchen and rest rooms are taken off this floor space, it would leave approximately the same amount of space which is available in the American Legion Hall.

Other organizations which might desire use of the building are invited to lay the plans of a community building they would desire, before the court.

At the present time the proposed building for community use merely has the sympathetic consideration of the court and no set plans for such a building have been approved.

It is further understood that considerable time may pass before funds are available for the construction of such a building.

In their meeting Monday the commissioners sanctioned half payment for a new fire truck to be purchased by the city on which the city will bear half of the expense. Purchase of the new truck will make two trucks available for use in fighting country fires and still leave one truck for use in the city limits.

The commissioners also approved an increase in the travel allowance for the county agent to bring the allowance in line with the costs of rising prices.

Phillips Petroleum Co. Stratford No. 1 is located 1,250 feet from the south and east lines of section 25 in Block 1-T in Sherman County. The location is 10 miles northwest of Stratford and has a potential depth of 3,600 feet.

A 7,500 foot test of the Gulf Oil Corporation is being made on the David McBryde land about 12 miles northwest of Stratford in Dallam County. The D. P. McBryde "B" No. 1 is located 1,980 feet from the north and east lines of section 55 in Block 1-T. The location is 4 miles southeast of Kerrick.

The Shamrock Oil and Gas Corporation started drilling operations on land belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Harold Wilson, about 8 miles west of Stratford, in Dallam County Monday morning.

Dear Friends at Home:

Thank you so much for the packages, flowers, cards, letters and other remembrances. Everyone connected with the hospital stops by my room almost everyday to see what new that lady from Texas got today. They like my candy. The janitor brought an extra table to take care of my flowers.

The flowers have been beautiful, especially the bouquet from the Sixth grade, the bouquet has been carried to almost every room on the second floor. Maybe people here don't do for their sick as we do in Stratford. They all say that folks must like me down there. I have to tell them that I didn't realize I had so many friends.

I am quite comfortable now that the misery with the ribs is in the past. I am doing well so the doctor says. Seems I am his first Texas wreck victim. He kids me about having heard Texas stories and about Texas but now that he has seen the recovery I have made he will have to have more faith in Texans and Texas stories. My lung should be in shape to take anesthesia next Thursday.

Dr. Piper, from Dixon-Dively Bane Clinic, in Kansas City, will come here and reinforce the bones in my left angle and repair the right heel. Then as soon as the left ankle can come out of the cast, and I can be fitted with a steel brace for the ankle, fitted with special shoes, and be taught to walk with the new ankle arrangement, I will be home. Dr. Lusk has promised to tell me Thursday when I can expect to be dismissed. I'm guessing about a month from now I'll be home.
