Stratford School Expansion Bond Vote Saturday

Sherman County

Voters of the Stratford Independent School District will be given an opportunity to vote Saturday, June 21, on the proposed school expansion to the elementary school, expansion to the high school, remodeling of present high school building, boiler an heating repairs and ground improvements. The board action to call the election, came upon the petition of 122 Stratford School District voters.

The Hale-Aiken Study Group composed of approximately 30 local citizens, recommended the expansion program to the Board of Trustees. This study group noted needs due to increased scholastic and added subjects to the curriculum.

The Trustees propose to keep the \$200,000 issue on a ten year bond schedule and can issue these bonds at 2.44% interest rate. This is the lowest interest rate ever available to the district and is due to the excellent financial condition of the district. Tax valuations for 1953 will be unchanged except for natural increases. A tax rate of \$1.27 will be used for maintenance and bond retirement. The total valuation of the district for 1958 will reach \$23,917,000 and is covered by valuations of approximately 68% utilities and natural gas, and 32% local property and land values.

Citizens of the school district who take pride in their fine school system, and vote approval, will enable the Board of Trustees to continue the school plant, curriculum, and instructional improvements to enable the school growth in a progressive and educational manner.

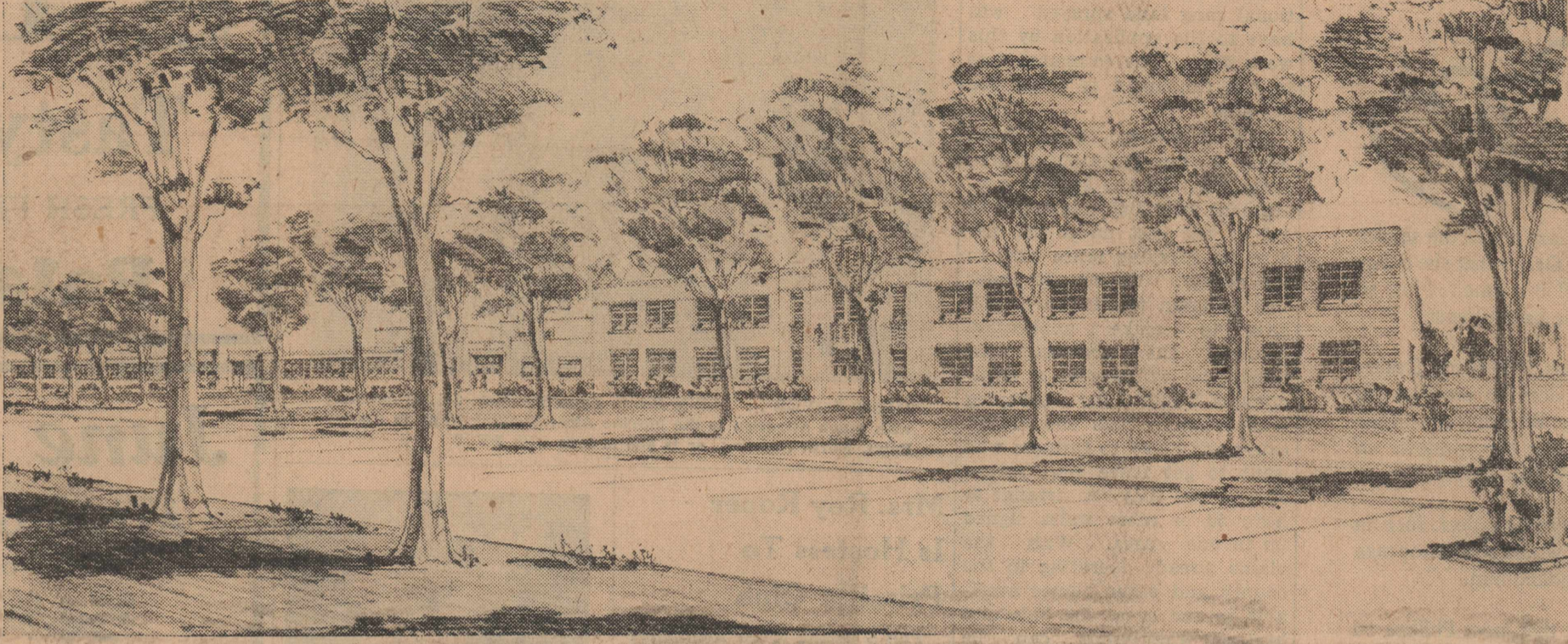
The wedding took place Sunday in Boise City. Mr. and Mrs. Carl Oquin accompanied the couple.

Women and children will be prohibited from entering fields of burning grain or straw, it was announced this week. An officer will be posted at the entrance of burning fields to prevent women and children from endangering their lives.

Blazing wheat fields are even more treacherous than burning prairie fires. Once enveloped in the flames, only those in the best physical condition with a clear head, and a great deal of luck, are likely to survive.

Tall stubble in most fields increases the fire hazard during this harvest. A spark from a backfire or the friction of a hot exhaust may set off a blaze at any time. Fighting fires of this nature involves considerable risk for even those prepared to fight

the blaze. A sudden change in the direction of the wind may leave onlookers hopelessly surrounded in the flames.

To prevent possible loss of life in fires which may occur during the harvest season, women and children will be prohibited from entering the fields where fire fighters are at work.

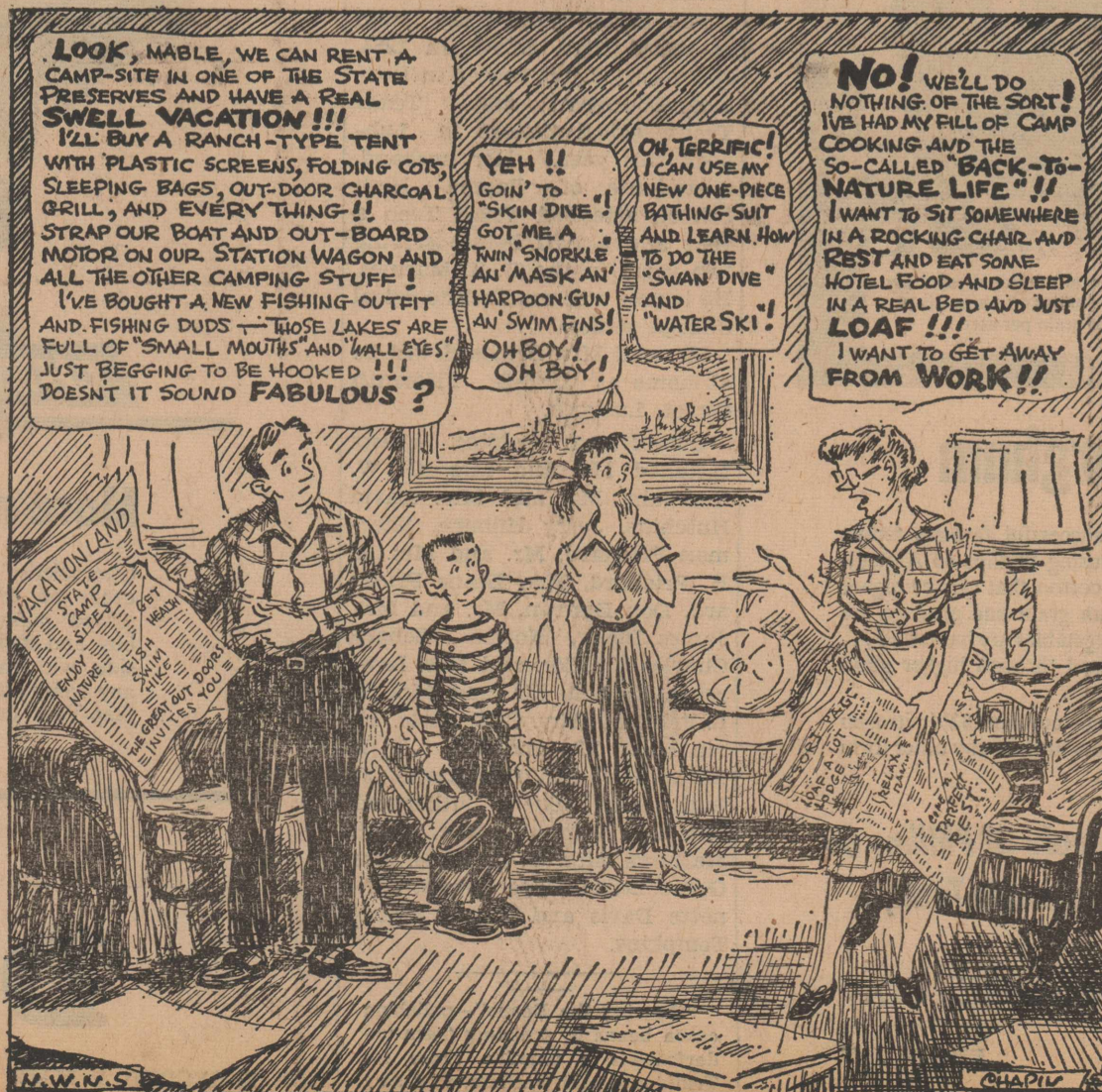

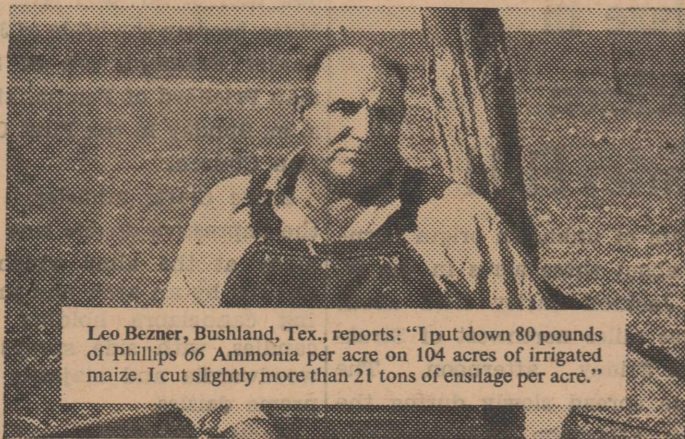

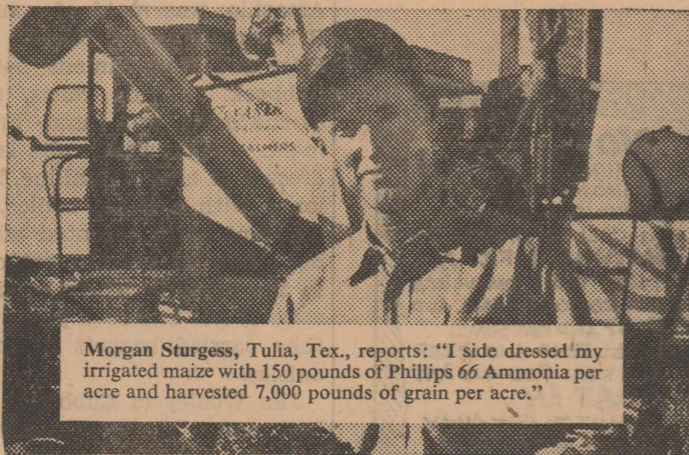

Launching Deadly War On Grasshopper Menace

Contract for spraying range land in Sherman County was let last week in conjunction with Dallam and Hartley County on 514,000 acres. Actual spraying operations are to get underway this week in Sherman County.

Ranchmen wanting any additional rang land sprayed will have to file application by this week end. The estimated cost to the ranchman is about 30c per acre.

New provisions have been made in the grasshopper program whereby the federal government may lend assistance of 1/3 of the cost up to 25c per acre for spraying fence rows in the county. To benefit under this program the farmer will have to make application through the commissioners' court who will accept a minimum of 3 bids for spraying fence rows. This should not cause any delay to farmers who want to get fence rows sprayed provided they can arrange to have 50 or more miles signed up in one area. With the plains already operating in the county and other planes available in the area, the bids and business transaction can be completed very rapidly.

The Sherman County Commissioners' Court is completing plans to spray all county roads adjoining farm land, the state highways and railroad right-of-ways. It is hoped that all range land infested with grasshoppers will be sprayed and this will clean up the road right-of-ways in range areas.

The ground units that have been expected in the county the past 10 days will not be available, so the commissioners' court is making arrangements for airplanes to spray road right-of-ways.

Any one interested in spraying range or fence rows may contact the grasshopper committee composed of J. R. Pendleton, J. W. Flores, Travis Spurlock, J. N. Bridwell, Walter Pratt, Jim Gorman, Frederick Mason, or the county agent and FFA teacher, Duard Lamb.

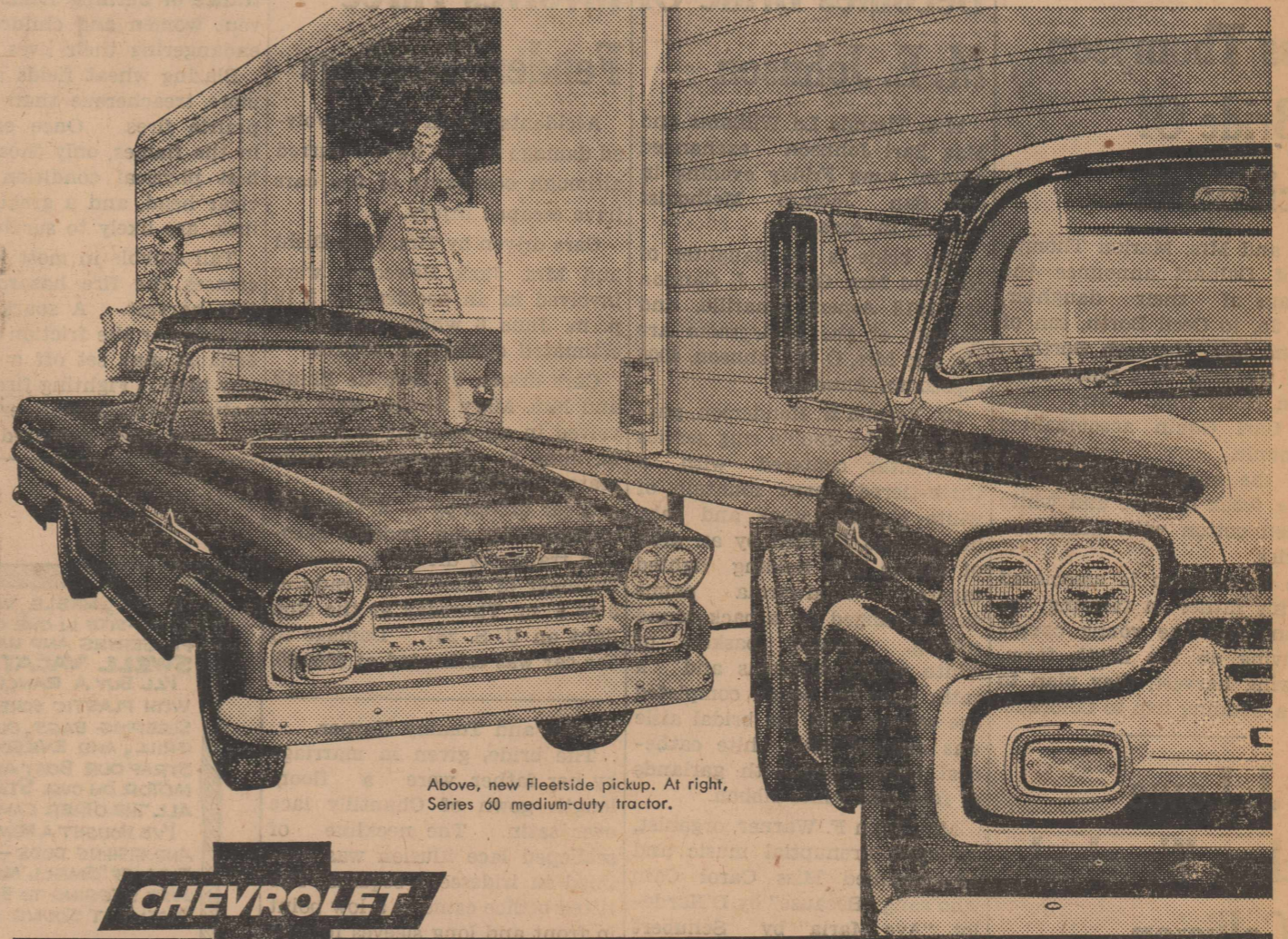

Pipeline Leak Causes Fire

GRUVER — A Phillips Petroleum Co. gas line and compressor on the Emil Knutson farm in Olso was still belching flames 10 to 15 feet in the air at 6:30 p. m. Friday, two hours after the fire started.

The fire started with a leak in the gas pipeline on the Knut-

son farm 9 miles northwest of Gruver. The Gruver volunteer fire department snuffed out a fire that spread through a freshly cut wheat stubble field surrounding the compressor, but nothing could be done to quell the gas-fed flames on the compressor.

Phillips company officials arrived at the scene and turned off the gas leading through the pipeline, but the gas remaining in the lines continued to feed the flames.

A ripe wheat field on the adjacent farm of Bobby Alexander was in danger if the compressor blew up and spread sparks, but fire trucks could not drive onto the field. The wheat was irrigated Thursday and the ground was so soft that trucks became mired.

Texas Panhandle this year, it was learned on the third annual field day tour held Saturday. The early maturing wheats had sufficient moisture to ripen while later maturing varieties have been damaged by hot burning winds. Wheat straw in the late variety plots was killed by the hot blast, leaving most of the heads only partially filled or the grain shriveled.

Twenty-five varieties of wheat were viewed on the irrigated Sneed-Eller farm. A new variety which may be released next year will have the baking qualities of turkey wheat, the hardness of red chief, the rust resistance of several varieties, and early maturing qualities. This type wheat matured with full

grains on the Sneed farm. Sixty-four varieties of wheat were viewed on the Eller dry land farm. Early maturing varieties are producing good grain while the later varieties are producing lower yields.

The tour had been planned for two weeks before harvest. Rapidly maturing fields kept many farmers busy in the fields and resulted in a low attendance at the demonstration sites.

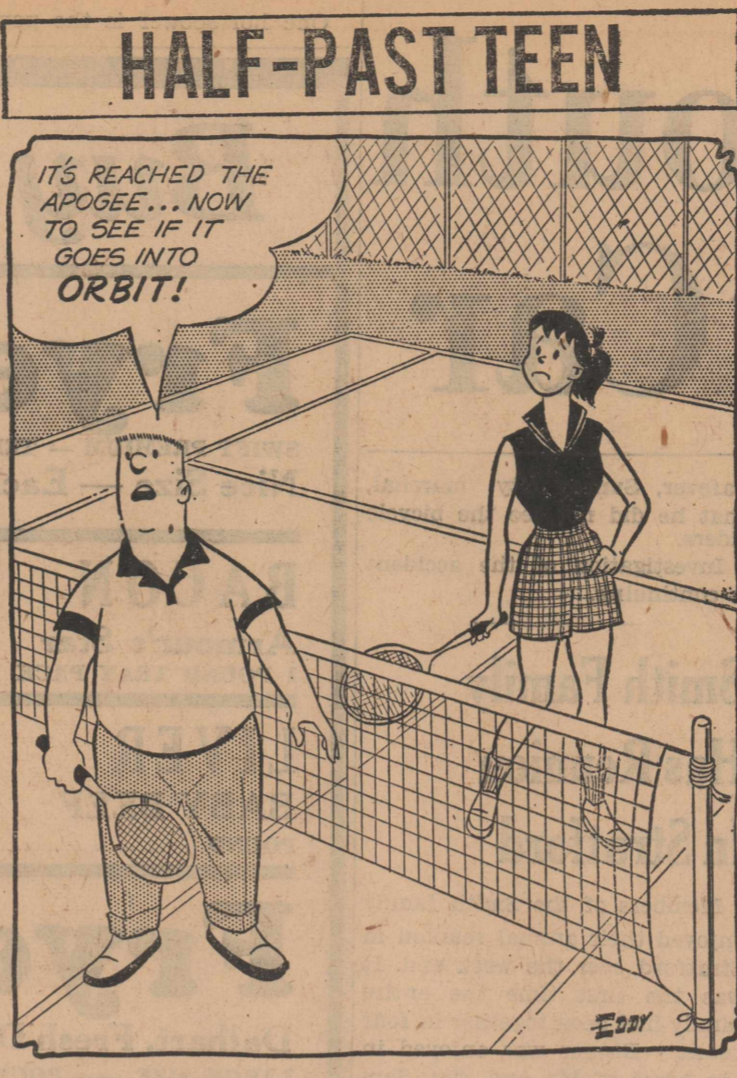
