County Sugar Beets Thrive

Excellent progress on the Sherman County agricultural development survey was reported by Doane Agricultural Service this week.

Russell Krutzman, manager of the Area Development Section at Doane, stated, "The Sherman County survey is now in the analysis stage. Basic information has been compiled and is being reviewed by staff members."

Other information has been prepared for use in the linear programming phase of study. Market potentials for existing as well as potential crops continue to be analyzed. This information will be correlated with price forecasts.

The second phase of the field work was conducted during the second week of June. Lloyd Bergsma of the Area Development Section at Doane was in the county gathering additional information.

Doane Agricultural Service was able to place Sherman County Development Association in contact with a major sugar producer interested in testing sugar beets in Sherman County. Bergsma said, "The prompt action taken by the Development Association could well result in a new cash crop for Sherman County."

Holly Sugar Company is cooperating with the Association in field testing sugar beets. Glen Yeager and Bill Dunn, representing Holly, recently inspected the sugar beet plots and were well pleased with the growth and appearance of the beets.

The analysis of basic information so far, indicates that many other strong opportunities exist for improving the agricultural incomes in Sherman County. The complete analysis will continue in preparation for making final recommendations and presentation of the report.

No. 1 J. D. Amend, 914 feet from the north and 990 feet from the west lines of Section 2 in Block 3, 22 miles southeast of Stratford, will be drilled to a potential depth of 3,000 feet in search of oil.

Shamrock Oil & Gas Corp. No. 1 Strother, located 1,250 feet from the south and east lines of Section 177, Block 1-T, 2 miles east of Stratford, is being drilled to a potential depth of 3,500 feet.

Steeple Oil & Gas Corporation No. 1-T Amend in section 12 of Block 3, is producing a potential volume of 1,950 million cubic feet of gas from formations from a depth of 5,414 to 5,432 feet.

The Texas Co. No. 1 M. Dortch in Section 27 of Block 1-T, is producing a potential volume of 6,500 million cubic feet of gas from formations between 2,942 and 3,429 feet.

In Dallam County, the Sun Oil Company No. 1 Ray Taylor, 1,320 feet from the south and east lines of Section 15 in Block 50, in the Kerrick territory, will be drilled to a potential depth of 4,000 feet.

K&H Operating No. 1 W. N. Price in Section 131 of Block 1-T, was drilled to a depth of 3,608 feet and abandoned as a dry hole.

K&H Operating Co. No. 1 B. J. Wiggins in Section 112 of Block 1-T, was drilled to a total depth of 3,568 feet and abandoned as a dry hole.

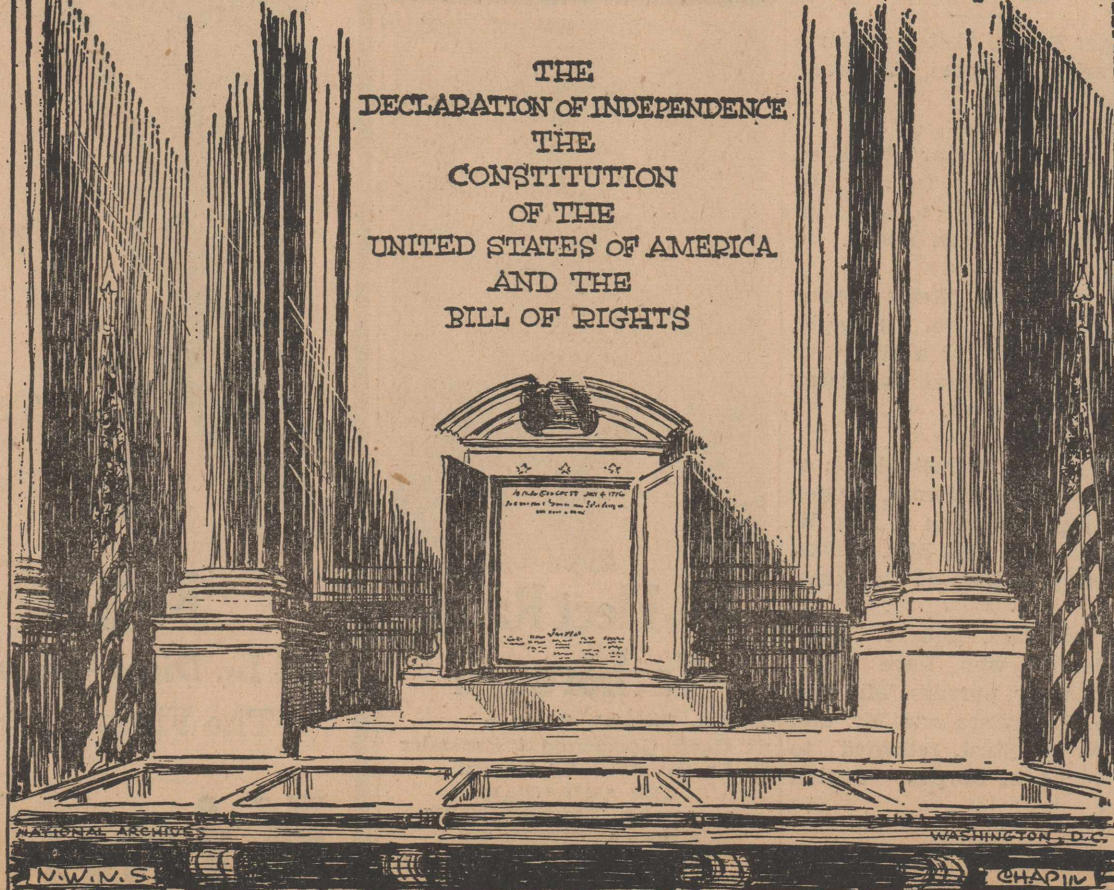

House Vote Kills New Farm Bill

SOLEMN THOUGHT FOR "THE FOURTH"

"RIGHTS, HARD WON, NEED ETERNAL VIGILANCE LEST THEY BE LOST"



THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND THE BILL OF RIGHTS

The Agriculture Committee of the House of Representatives last week voted out an omnibus farm bill that undertook to solve some of the dilemmas which have plagued the agricultural segment of the economy. It was a highly controversial measure. In fact, during the committee hearings all of the Republicans, except one, walked out of the hearing room at one point in protest to the measure. Nevertheless, the bill was voted out with approval and was sent to the rules committee. The rules committee is sometimes called the legislative traffic cop committee. This committee passes upon the manner in which legislation is to be presented to the House, the length of debate and other procedural matters. The controversy concerning the farm bill was, of course, renewed in the rules committee; however, it was voted out of the rules committee by a resolution authorizing the House to debate the measure for hours. This resolution was subject to debate, and the question was whether or not the House would adopt the resolution and thereby clear the way for consideration of the farm bill. Tempers ran high, and there was much oratory. The matter was approached on a partisan basis, and it soon de-

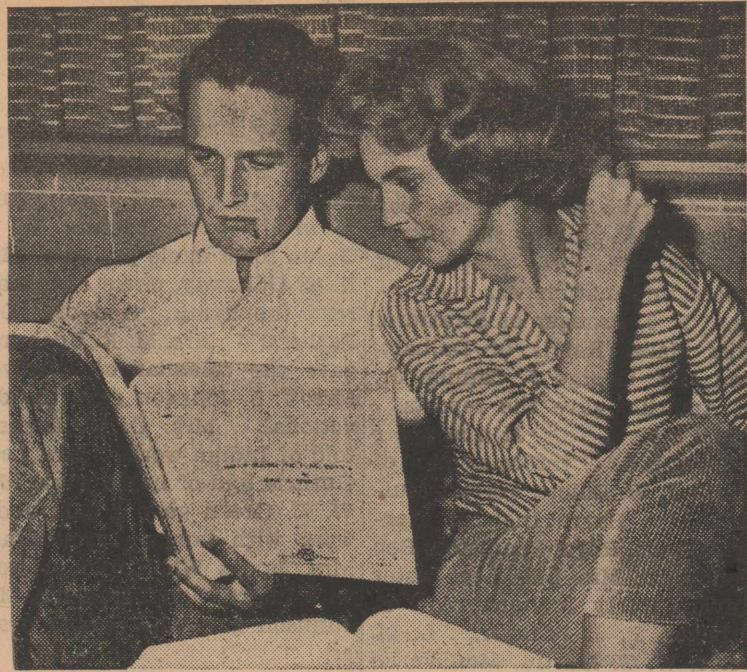

veloped that the vote would be along party lines. When the time came to vote on the resolution, it appeared that it would be very close. Had the resolution been adopted, we could have considered the farm bill and it probably would have passed. However, the Republican members of Congress, almost without exception, voted against the resolution, which was a vote against the farm bill. There was a split in the Democratic party. A number of the representatives from the big cities forsook the farm bloc and voted against the resolution. This, of course, swung the pendulum against the farmers, and the result was that we lost the resolution by approximately 40 votes.

Mr. Benson, the Secretary of Agriculture, had attacked the bill as an "economic monstrosity" and had stated that if the bill was taken up and considered by the House, it would probably ruin his trip to Russia this year. Admitted, there were some rough spots in the bill. These rough spots could have been cured by amendments, and the indications were that such amendments would be offered and adopted. The matter that concerned me was why so many members did not want to debate
