Candidates Bid For July 26 Nomination

Texas politics boiled over this week and candidates for county and state offices as well as their supporters opened a drive to gain the support of the public in the Saturday, July 26 Democratic Primary election. Advertising throughout this issue of the Star carries messages of special interest to the voters.

Four candidates are seeking election as governor of Texas. Gov. Price Daniel of Liberty County is opposed by Henry B. Gonzalez of Bexar County, Joe A. Irwin of Dallas County and W. Lee O'Daniel of Dallas County.

George Nokes of McLennan County and Ben Ramsey of Augustine County are candidates for lieutenant governor.

Will Wilson of Dallas County is unopposed for the office of attorney general.

Wm. A. Blakley of Dallas County is opposing Ralph Yarborough for the office of United States Senator. Blakley is one of the state's most successful business men. Ralph W. Yarborough has devoted most of his life to public service in the political field.

Robert W. Hamilton of Midland County, Wilmer B. Hunt of Harris County and J. Edwin Smith of Harris County seek election to the office of associate justice of the supreme court, place number one.

Frank P. Culver is unopposed for the office of associate justice of the supreme court, place number two.

Ruel C. Walker of Johnson County is unopposed for the office of associate justice of the supreme court, place number three.

Joe Greenhill of Travis County and Sarah T. Hughes of Dallas County are candidates for the office of associate justice of the supreme court, place number four.

Kenneth K. Woodley of Travis County is unopposed for the office of judge of the court of criminal appeals.

Olin Culberson of Travis County is unopposed for the office of railroad commissioner.

Robert S. Calvert is unopposed for the office of comptroller of public accounts.

Jesse James of Travis County is unopposed for the office of state treasurer.

Bill Allcorn of Brown County and L. J. (Lil) Dimmitt of Dallas County are candidates for the office of commissioner of the general land office.

Tom Griffin of Bastrop County, Glenn H. Kothmann of Bexar County and John C. White of Wichita County are candidates for the office of commissioner of agriculture.

E. O. Northcutt of Potter County is unopposed for the office of associate justice of the court of civil appeals, 7th supreme judicial district.

Bob Porter of Moore County and J. W. (Buck) Buchanan of Moore County are candidates for the office of state representative of the 95th district. Porter is a successful Moore County attorney. He completed his education and moved to the Texas Panhandle after the close of World War II. Buchanan has been a resident of the Panhandle area for 42 years and has a record of 15 continuous years in public service.

Walter Rogers is unopposed for the office of representative of the 18th congressional district.

A new streamlined dual purpose fire truck is expected to arrive here Saturday to be placed in use by the Stratford Volunteer Fire Department. Claude Fedric and Ted Reynolds are driving the new fire truck from the factory in Anderson, Indiana.

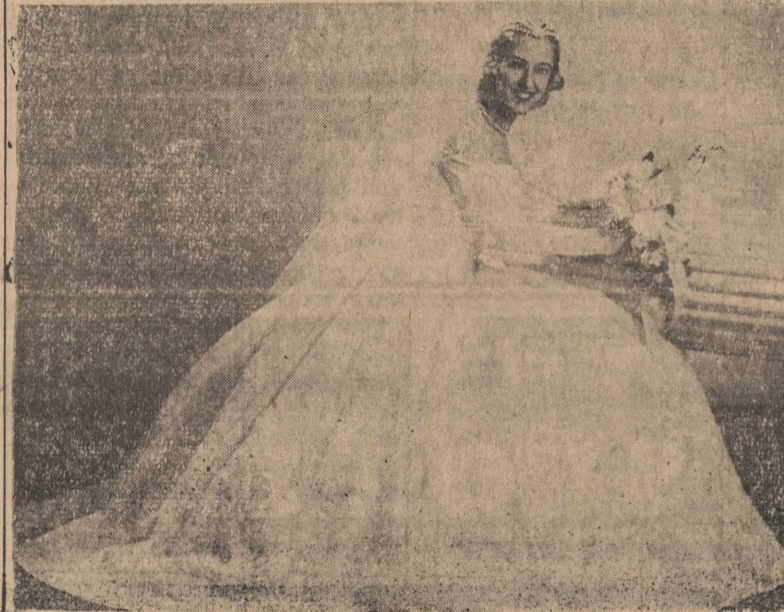
Reynolds and Fedric arrived in Indiana Wednesday to view final installation of fire fighting equipment and for schooling on the handling of the truck and equipment. They plan to arrive home Saturday.

The new fire truck has a 500 gallon water tank, and will operate from a city fire hydrant as well as a stock water tank. The dual purpose truck will be used for protection against both city and rural fires.

Specifications for the truck were prepared by the Stratford Volunteer Fire Department personnel. The City Council and County Commissioners acquired the truck at a cost of \$15,087. The county will pay \$7,500 of the cost and the city will pay \$7,587.00.

The new fire fighting equipment is said to be the most efficient which can be secured, and is mounted on a 2½ ton Chevrolet V8 truck.

Six Injured In Car Collision

Six people were injured seriously in a head-on collision of two cars about two and one-half miles southwest of Stratford on U. S. Highway 84 shortly after 12 noon Saturday. Douglas Hill, a four year old boy playing on the floor of one of the cars, escaped uninjured.

Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Pray and son, Larry, 9 years old, were driving southwest to their home in Riverside, California after a visit in Wichita, Kansas. Mrs. K. F. Hill and three children, Michael 9, Susan 6, and Douglas 4, were driving northeast, returning to their home in Wichita, Kansas after a visit in Tucson, Arizona.

Those reconstructing the accident, reported that a car driving southwest turned off on the northwest shoulder of the road and turned back toward the pavement as though the driver was going to make a U turn. The car stopped short of the pavement. Mrs. Pray veered to the left side of the road in an attempt to avoid a collision with the car in front. In doing so, the Pray car crossed over the center stripe in the direct path of the Hill car traveling northeast. Both cars veered from the pavement to the southeast and met in a head-on collision several feet off of the pavement. The impact drove the engines of both cars back toward the dash and resulted in the total loss of

Voters not expecting to be in the county on July 26 may secure absentee ballots from the county clerk and cast an absentee vote up to and inclusive of Tuesday, July 22.

County May Poll Over 900 Votes

Sherman County has a possible voting strength of over 900 votes. There are 69 qualified voters in precinct one. Precinct two has 72 qualified voters. Precinct three has 195 voters. There are 484 qualified voters of record in precinct four. These figures do not include voters over 65 years of age who may vote without paying poll taxes or securing exemptions. The majority of these voters usually make their home in Stratford. At times the overage voters cast up to 150 votes. It has been estimated that there are 100 votes of this classification in precinct four.

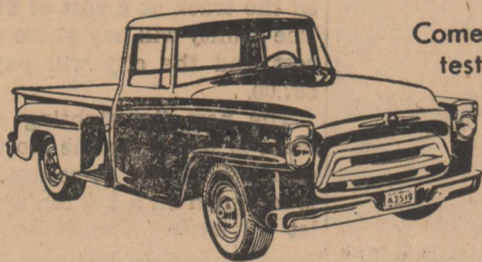

To Observe Farm Safety

Week July 20-26

The need for encouraging safety-consciousness among farmers and ranchers to reduce

the tremendous farm accident toll was pointed out recently by Floyd Brannan, president of the Sherman County Farm Bureau.

"The urgency of this matter is attested by the fact that both President Eisenhower and Governor Daniel have proclaimed the week of July 20-26 as 'Farm Safety Week' to focus attention

on this, one of our gravest social problems," Brannan said.

"Farming leads all other occupations in work-accident casualties, taking nearly 13,000 lives and injuring over a million people in one year's time" he said. "This is a needless sacrifice of human life and a flagrant waste of money, not to mention the untold grief, suffering, time loss, and worry attendant upon accident victims and their loved ones." Brannan said that there is "A great deal" each individual in Sherman County can do to help alleviate this condition. "Civic organizations and social groups can take an active part in emphasizing the need for accident-prevention education. And each man, woman, boy and girl can serve as his own and others' bodyguard by remaining constantly alert to the prevention of accidents."

The farm leader called upon other organizations in the county, including churches, civic clubs and "just neighborhood groups of friends" to "spend some time studying this serious matter during the special safety week observance, either by devoting a portion of their regular meeting time to it or calling a special meeting to study the problem."

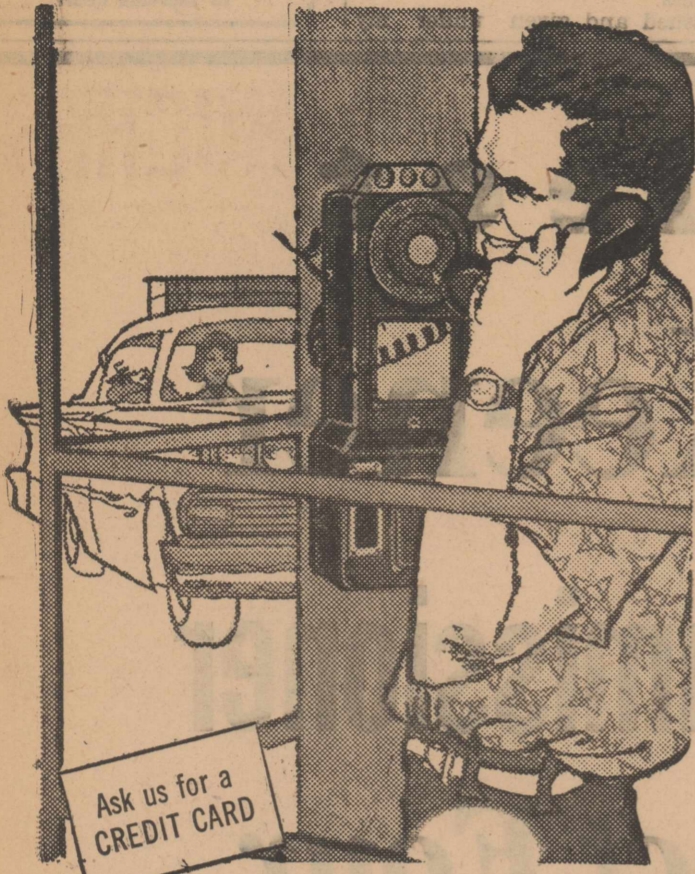
In areas where active Safety programs have been conducted at local levels, rural accidents and deaths have been greatly reduced.

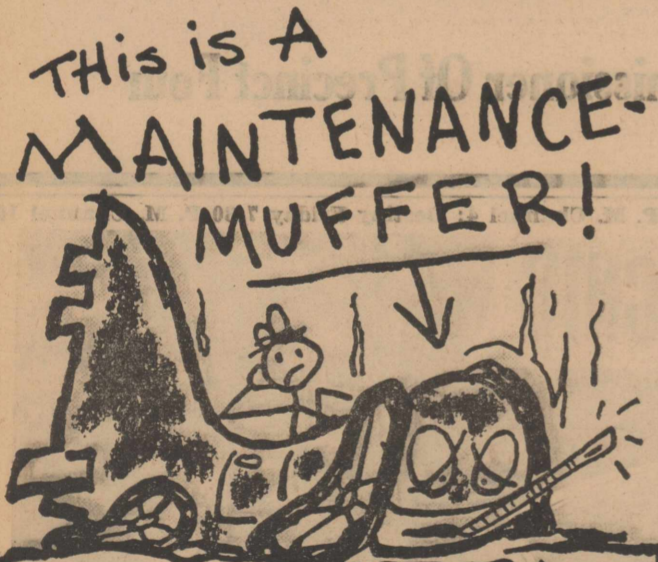

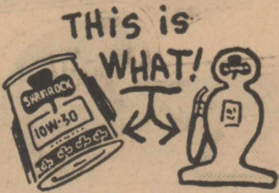

Applications for a County Librarian will be accepted by the Commissioners' Court until August 3, it was announced this week.

Modernizing School Plant

Modernization of the boiler room at the school building and the installation of new heating controls is in progress in the high school building. Reroofing of the buildings is in the process of being completed. Specifications will be completed in time for letting a contract for the rewiring and installation of new fixtures for the high school building on July 24. It is possible a contract may also be let on this date for construction of curb and gutter for a parking area, sidewalks and tennis courts. Preliminary specifications for this work were approved at a meeting of the school board held Thursday night of last week.

Six to eight weeks may be required to complete major plans for new building construction. Plans for the two building additions, installation of new windows in the high school building, and the reconversion of rooms into special rooms will probably be ready about the first week in August. Bidders will probably be allowed about 30 days to complete their bids on the proposed construction work. Actual construction is not expected to start until in September.

Custodians at the school are busy making minor repairs and are repainting parts of the buildings.

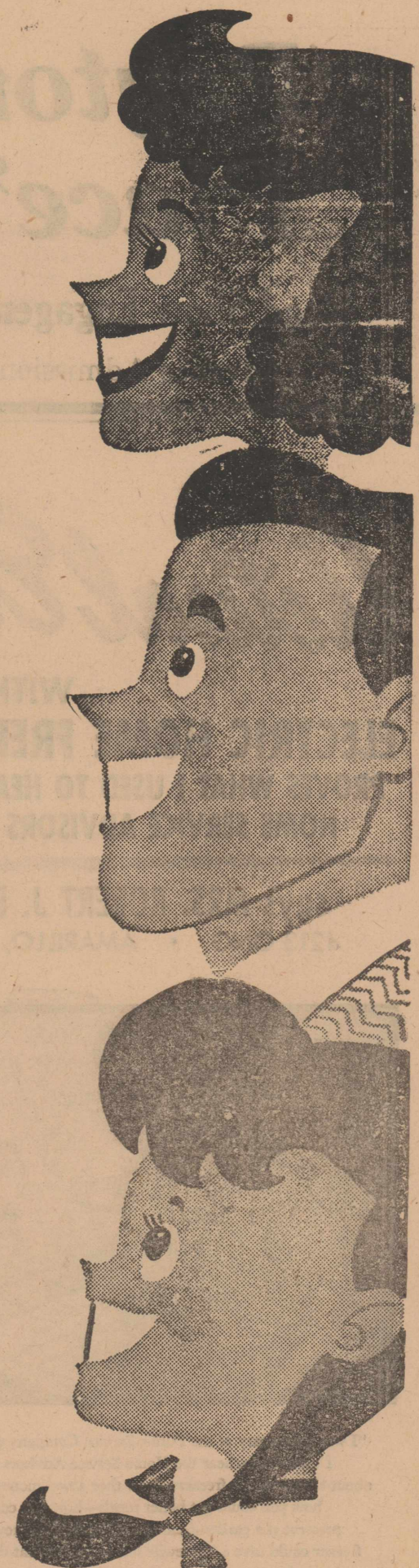

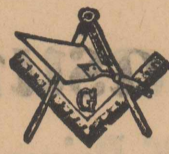



County tax rates were established during the session of the Commissioners Court Monday. The road tax in Road District Four was lowered to 20 cents from 30 cents. Road taxes in Road District 3 which is Precinct 1, were lowered to 20 cents from

30 cents. Road taxes in Road District 3 which is Precinct three, are dormant, all bonds for the construction of paving having been retired. The county tax rate has been set at 80 cents on the \$100.00 valuation. Of this amount 40

cents goes to the general fund, 15 cents to the special road and bridge fund which is set by state law, 15 cents to the road and bridge fund, 8 cents to the permanent improvement fund, and 2 cents for the jury fund.
