47 Absentee Ballots Cast

Forty-seven absentee ballots have been cast in the Democratic Primary election to be held Saturday. This is one of the largest numbers of absentee votes ever to have been cast in the county. A high percentage of absentee votes usually signifies that a high percentage of the qualified voters of the county will be cast in the election.

The polls will be open in all four precincts Saturday at the usual voting places to provide voters with an opportunity to exercise their voting franchise in casting their ballots for the candidates of their choice.

Over 900 votes may be polled in the election Saturday. There are 820 qualified voters of record in the county. Precinct one has 69 votes, precinct two has 72 votes, precinct three has 195, and precinct four has 484 votes. This does not include residents of the county who are over 65 years of age and who may vote without either paying a poll tax or securing an exemption certificate. There are an estimated 100 votes of this nature in the county.

Interest in the state representative race boiled over in Moore County this week. J. W. (Buck) Buchanan and Bob Porter, both Moore county citizens, are candidates for state representative of the 95th district. Publishers of the Moore County News endorsed Porter for the office in an editorial in the Sunday edition of their newspaper. Political observers are watching developments of this turn of events, and agree that at least the Moore County publishers certainly added fuel to the flames of the race for state representative.

Democratic Precinct Conventions Saturday

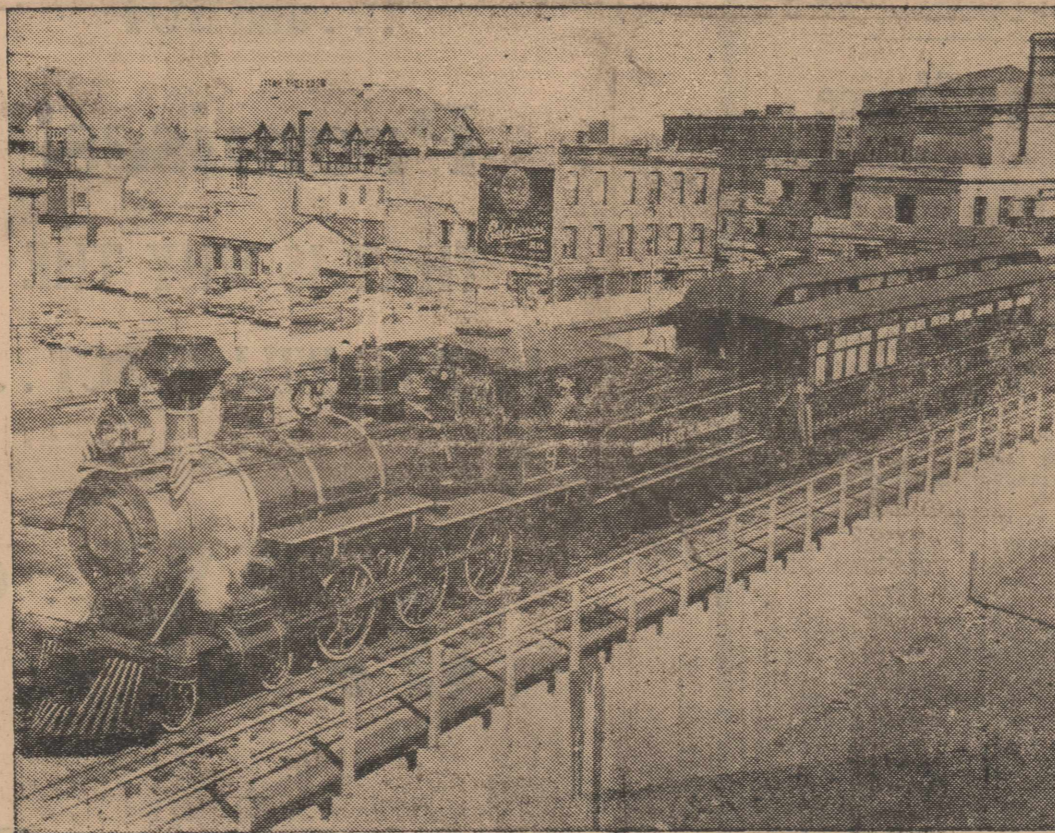
Democratic Precinct conventions will be held Saturday at 1:00 p. m. in each of the four precincts. Precinct one will meet at the Bob Burgess residence. Precinct two meets at the Spurlock chapel. Precinct three meets at the Texhoma, Texas school building. Precinct four democrats will meet at the court house in Stratford.

Precinct conventions give the qualified voters of the precinct a small voice in the county, state and national conventions. Procedures are simple. A permanent chairman and a permanent secretary are elected by those attending. A parliamentarian and sergeant-at-arms may be appointed.

The primary purpose of the convention is to elect delegates to the county convention. They may be sent to the county convention either instructed or uninstructed. In the event an instructed delegate or delegates is desired, resolutions should be offered which are subject to debate and amendments before adoption or rejection.

Any person has the right to attend precinct conventions. Only qualified voters have a

Old Number 9 To Visit XIT Reunion And Rodeo



Through the courtesy of Chicago, Rock Island, and Pacific Railway the famous locomotive, old Number 9, and the equally well known Palace Dining car, will be on display in Dalhart at the 22nd annual Rodeo and Reunion.

Rock Island lines' famed Ten-Wheeler Old Number Nine, one of the few remaining historical steam locomotives in the country, was built by the Baldwin Locomotive Works in the closing years of the last century.

Built for the Warren and Ouachita Valley Railway, a logging railroad and predecessor company of the Rock Island in Arkansas' Ouachita Mountains, the 4-6-0 type comes equipped with spark-arresting stack, gay painting and brass fittings polished to a high luster.

Rita Blanca Lake Study Finished

Recent investigation of Rita Blanca Lake near Dalhart has

been completed by biologists of the Game and Fish Commission. The project was conducted to determine the species of fish present in the lake as well as their abundance, habits and condition.

The investigation yielded 2,664 specimens which were made up of 17 species. Included in the collection were fish of the minnow, catfish, bass, sunfish, crappie, and perch families.

Condition of all fish taken was found to be excellent, but recommendations were made to improve spawning facilities to keep up with increasing sports fishing in the area.

Mideast Holds Spotlights

The political explosion in the Mideast swept everything off the front pages. This included the much publicized Adams-Goldfine hearings, which will probably be suspended for awhile until other legislative business can be taken care of before adjournment. However, it can be expected that the Adams-Goldfine hearings will continue as soon as time permits. The people of this country are entitled to know the full story as to what has or has not happened with relation to the conduct of the administrative agencies of this government. These agencies occupy a quasi-judicial status in our economy, and in many instances their powers exceed those of the courts. Under the circumstances, side door entries and influence peddling cannot be tolerated in the slightest.

The Mideast situation has unified this country as it should. The developments in that part of the world were probably anticipated but not expected. It was generally felt in Washington that anything could happen, but apparently few people expected it to happen when it did and where it did. This has caused deep concern in many parts of the Nation's Capital, and these questions are being asked repeatedly: "Where was our Intelligence?" "Was there a lack of knowledge or a lack of cooperation?" Apparently, it was one or the other. The intelligence agency of this government is under the jurisdiction of the Executive Branch and has been headed for several years by Allan Dulles, the brother of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

Phil D To Run In Race Sunday

District WTCC Meeting In Amarillo July 28

A district West Texas Chamber of Commerce meeting will be held in the Flame Room of the Pioneer Natural Gas Co. at 2:00 p. m. July 28 to discuss and approve the WTCC program of work for the coming year.

The program includes agriculture and livestock, public information, industrial development, state affairs, water resources, national affairs, community services and member relations.

Counties represented in the district are Sherman, Armstrong, Carson, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Roberts and Wheeler.

Phil D, the ten year old race horse owned by W. C. Martin, will run in a 5/8 mile race in Raton, New Mexico Sunday afternoon. Phil D has won approximately \$230,000 for his owner in the races in which he has participated. It will be the first race in which he has run for three years.

During the last year Ray Taylor has kept Phil D with his string of race horses at Kerrick. The horse will appear in the race Sunday as the horse of Martin and Taylor.

According to reports, Phil D has been training well, and should be in good condition for the race.

Martin had not intended to place the horse in any additional races. This year the horse started training by himself for racing. Owners and trainers decided to capitalize on the horse's ambition and give him another opportunity to appear on the race track.

Phil D has raced on both the east and west coasts but this will be the first time the horse has appeared in a race which has been closer to the Texas Panhandle than Denver, Colorado.

Craigs Give School Fund

A Plainview farmer who had to help meet family expenses has transferred a 653-acre, \$65,000 tract of land at Sunray to the Baptist Foundation of Texas.

He is James Burton Craig, a deacon in the College Heights Baptist Church of Plainview and a Wayland College trustee for several years. A trust fund to be established through the transaction will benefit Wayland College.

Under the agreement, Mr. and Mrs. Craig will receive a monthly income for their lifetime and for the lifetime of the survivor of them, said Dr. George Shearin, endowment secretary for Texas Baptists.

After the death of both Mr. and Mrs. Craig, the foundation will establish and administer a permanent endowment fund consisting of the trust estate. The fund will be known as the "James Burton and Annie Claire Trust."

Arrangements for the land transfer were completed through the endowment department of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Mr. Craig says he "sold himself on the idea of investing in Christian education" after trying to get a business associate to participate in a similar program to benefit Wayland.

As a Wayland trustee, Mr. Craig works diligently in seeking funds for building and endowment needs of the school. Two of his three children are Wayland graduates.

two incidents have occurred about which the government of this country, if not all of the people, should have had ample advance warning. The first of these was the occurrence in the Latin American countries when the Vice-President of this country was spat upon by angry de-

monstrating mobs who obviously were spurred into action by a long, smouldering feeling of hatred and ill-will as to some of the policies of this government. At that time I wrote a newsletter in which I posed the question as to whether or not the intelligence agency of this government was at fault. Subsequently, I was told in private that the intelligence agency knew of

the ill feeling and unrest in those countries and had warned the Vice-President; further, that the intelligence agency of this country was second to none in the world.

Yet, only a few short months later the leaders of the American Congress are called to the White House unexpectedly and on an emergency basis and advised that developmentsts have occurred in a Mideast country which could destroy the peace of the world.

The country in which these occurrences took place was a country which has received much of the foreign aid money of this country; a country which we had counted on as being friendly and a military ally, and a country which has as its capital the city that furnished the name for the Baghdad Pact. These and many other smaller incidents connected with the over-all development are causing many people in Washington, including myself, to wonder just what has happened to our Intelligence. The revolt in Iraq was not developed in a few minutes. It is undoubtedly the result of extended and detailed planning. Certainly if our intelligence departments did not know what was happening in this instance, how much more is going on that is not known. If the intelligence departments did know what was going on, then the question arises as to why the Executive Branch of this government did not keep in close touch and liaison with the Legislative Branch of the government, the branch that is most closely associated with the people, who, after all, are the government.

Our country will unite as it always has against any common foe, but in my opinion, it is high time that the White House took a long look at the intelligence agencies of this government and made some corrections. Otherwise, it can expect the Congress to do the job.





Compliance Affects Wheat Allotments

Farmers who comply with their 1959 farm wheat acreage allotments will receive credit for the acreage "diverted" from wheat production this year in

establishing future wheat allotments.

Legislation enacted in recent years provides that a farm's

"base acreage" shall be used as the wheat acreage history for 1959 and future years if the farmer complies with his wheat acreage allotment. The "base acreage" is the farm allotment plus the acreage considered diverted from wheat for the year.

On the other hand, farmers who exceed their farm's wheat acreage allotment in 1959 will be credited only with the allotment in the determination of future allotments.

If such a farmer arranged to store the excess wheat or deliver it to the Secretary of Agriculture, however, his farm would be credited with its "base wheat acreage" for the year in determining future allotments. But if he later used or marketed any of the excess wheat and a marketing quota penalty became due, his farm would be considered as "not in compliance" for 1959 in determining future

wheat acreage allotments. Thus, the farm would be credited with the 1959 wheat allotment only (not the base acreage) in establishing future allotments for the farm.

Under a marketing quota program, approved for the 1959 wheat crop in a farmers' referendum on June 20 of this year, price support in commercial wheat states is available only on wheat produced in compliance with farm wheat allotments. "Excess" wheat, produced on farms with more than 15 acres of wheat and not in compliance with the wheat allotment, is subject to a marketing quota penalty. This penalty may be avoided or postponed also by storing the excess wheat or by delivering it to the Secretary of Agriculture.
