Keener, Wakefield In Aug. 23 Primary Race

F. M. Keener and Tom Wakefield, candidates for the office of county commissioner of precinct four, will be the only local candidates in the second primary run off election to be held Saturday, August 23. In the primary election Saturday Wakefield polled 217 votes and Keener polled 203. C. W. (Pup) Wells, another candidate in the primary race, polled 88 votes.

Clyde M. Hudson won the democratic nomination for the office of county judge over Sam L. Cunningham. During the early returns of the race Hudson and Cunningham were polling votes in a dead heat with neither candidate leading by more than a few votes. In the final returns Hudson gained a plurality of 363 votes while 325 votes were cast for Cunningham.

Mrs. Ethel Skillin won the democratic nomination for the office of Justice of the Peace of precinct four. Mrs. Skillin polled 306 votes. Her opponents, E. B. McQueen polled 109 votes, and Burk Green polled 92 votes.

Bob Porter and J. W. (Buck) Buchanan, candidates for state representative, ran a close race in the county. Porter polled 321 votes and Buchanan polled 336 votes. Buchanan held a small lead in all the counties of the district except in his home county of Hansford where he received a heavy majority vote.

Price Daniel was favored by a heavy majority of the county vote for governor.

Ben Ramsey was favored by a vote of 502 to 141 over George Nokes for lieutenant governor.

In the race for United States Senator Wm. A. Blakley polled 325 votes and Ralph W. Yarborough received 358 votes.

Joe Greenhill was favored by a vote of 305 to 289 over Sarah T. Hughes for the unexpired term as associate justice of the supreme court place no. 4.

Bill Allcorn was favored over L. J. (Lil) Dimmitt by a vote of 293 to 201 for commissioner of the general land office.

John C. White polled 405 votes for commissioner of agriculture. Kothmann received 50 and Tom Griffin 157.

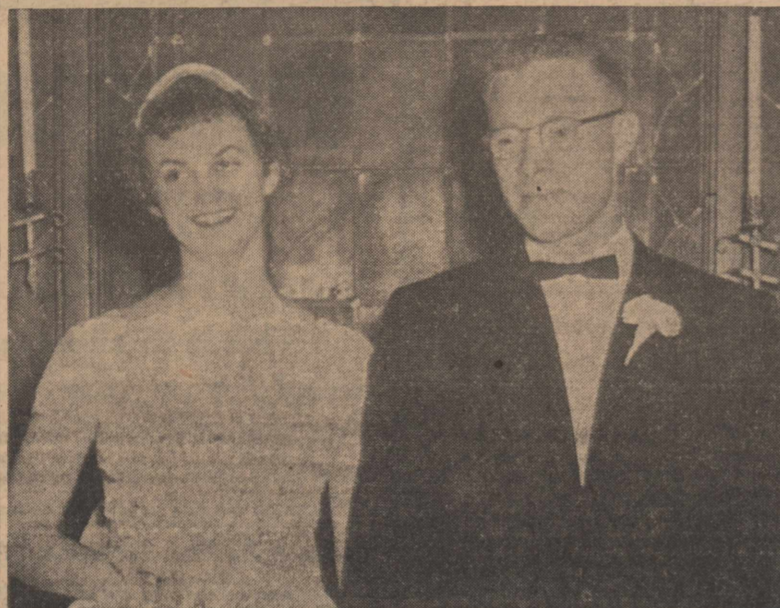

Rabies Threat Invades Region

There is a possibility of an outbreak of rabies among the pets belonging to citizens of this area. It is not a time for wild panic. All pets that have not been inoculated against rabies this year should be given the protective serum as soon as possible. Every unprotected pet is a potential rabies carrier which might threaten the health of the children playing with the pet, as well as others in the neighborhood.

Cecil Hill Rites Held Monday

Funeral services for Cecil Hill, 65 year old brother of Mrs. Lelah Boney, were held in Dodge City, Kansas Monday. Mr. Hill passed away in his sleep Friday of last week. From young manhood until about four years ago he was employed with the Rock Island Railroad Company, and was a station agent for many years. A severe heart attack four years ago forced his retirement.

Mr. Hill is survived by his wife, one daughter, Helen June of the home, and one son, C. W. Hill of Santa Monica, California, and one sister, Mrs. Lelah Boney.

A rabid skunk killed three kittens at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Knight, one mile south of Stratford, Sunday morning. Awakened by the noise, Dale Knight shot the skunk, and its head was sent to Austin for a laboratory examination. The laboratory test proved the skunk was a victim of rabies.

The presence of rabies among wildlife in the fringe area of the city presents a potential threat to all domestic animals. The safety of the children playing in every yard depends almost entirely on the complete inoculation of all domestic animals within the city limits. In the event citizens have pets which have not been inoculated within the last year they should notify Dan Foreman. The city secretary will arrange for a veterinary to come to Stratford to administer the inoculations in the event a sufficient number are to be treated.

Rabies in the immediate area of Stratford presents the possibility that city dogs have strayed to the area, and may have been exposed. It is highly probable that other skunks or wildlife may appear with rabies. If anyone should happen to see any pets or other animals acting strangely, or out of the ordinary, they should contact the officers immediately. In the event it is necessary to kill an animal, the head should be preserved for a laboratory examination.

The incubation period for rabies varies from 10 days to 30 days. The disease, transmitted

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HJR #17—Number Six on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17 proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 66, to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions to certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows, stating the maximum of such pension; and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 66, to read as follows:

"Section 66. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 352, Acts of the Fifth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any

such Texas Ranger or his widow, provided that such widow was legally married prior to January 1, 1957, to a Texas Ranger qualifying for such pension.

"These pensions may be paid only from the special fund created by Section 17, Article VII for a payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia."

"The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas and their widows."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

Sec. 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Make Second Doane Survey Payment

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 6, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas; authorizing the County of Potter to render financial aid to the district; authorizing the Commissioners Court of said county to assess and levy taxes on property outside the incorporated limits of such city; further authorizing a countywide Hospital District for Wichita County, Texas, and authorizing the creation of two districts in Jefferson County; and further providing that any enabling Act shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 6, which shall read as follows:

"Section 6. (a) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two hospital districts, one to be coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and the other to be coextensive with Wichita County.

"If such district or districts are created, they may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property taxpayers voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the City of Amarillo.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same boundaries as the district may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the district shall by resolu-

tion assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and contracts) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the district may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said Seventy-five (75¢) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the district.

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Potter (in which the City of Amarillo is partially located) to render financial aid to that district by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the district (whether assumed or created by the district) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed Ten Cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the district without the City of Amarillo at the time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the district shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the county in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions having boundaries coextensive with the district, and the county shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the county.

"(c) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a hospital district within Jefferson County, the boundaries of which shall include only the area comprising the Jefferson County Drainage District No. 7 and the Fort Arthur Independent School District, as such boundaries existed on the first day of January, 1957, with the power to issue bonds for the sole purpose of purchasing a site for, and the construction and initial equipping of, a hospital system, and with the power to levy a tax of not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property therein for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on such bonds.

"The creation of such hospital district shall not be final until approved at an election by a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting at said election who have duly rendered their property for taxation upon the tax roll of either said Drainage or said School District, nor shall

such bonds be issued or such tax levied until so approved by such voters.

"The district shall not have the power to levy any tax for maintenance or operation of the hospital or facilities, but shall contract with other political subdivisions of the state or private individuals, associations, or corporations for such purposes.

"If the district hereinabove authorized is finally created, no other hospital district may be created embracing any part of the territory within its boundaries, but the Legislature by law may authorize the creation of a hospital district incorporating therein the remainder of Jefferson County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided by Article IX, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, except that such district shall be confirmed at an election wherein the resident qualified property taxpayers voters who have duly rendered their property within such proposed district for taxation on the county rolls, shall be authorized to vote. A majority of those participating in the election voting in favor of the district shall be necessary for its confirmation and for bonds to be issued.

"(d) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a countywide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a countywide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

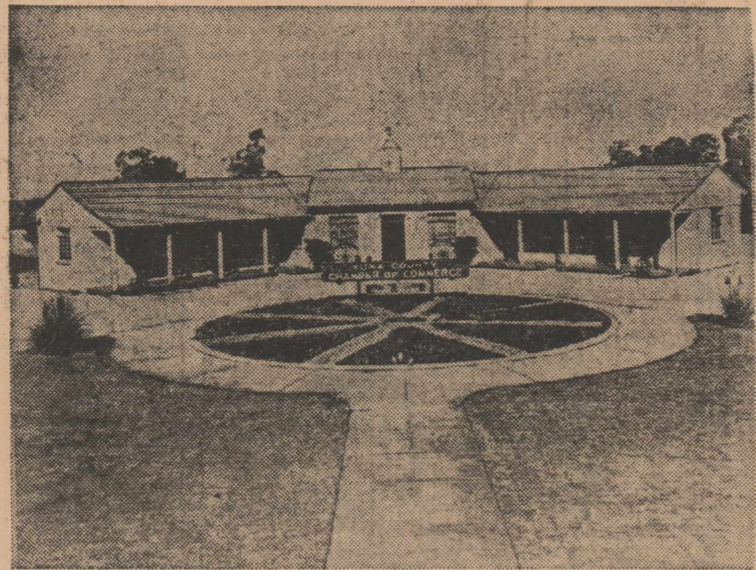

AMERICANA Cities to See Yuma—Prosperity in the Desert



INFORMATION CENTER—Yuma, Ariz.

An old city that is bursting at the seams with new life and vitality—that's Yuma, Arizona. Located in the southwest corner of Arizona, this city of some 18,000 citizens is bordered on the west by the Colorado River and California and on the south by Mexico.

A century ago, Yuma, was heavily overshadowed by nearly Gila City, a mining boom town which became one of Arizona's first ghost camps. First white man to visit the area was Father Kino, who in 1701 reached the Colorado in an effort to prove that Baja California was a peninsula and not the island it was thought to be. It was Father Kino who blazed El Camino del Diablo—The Road of the Devil—which figured prominently in early Southwest Arizona history.

As an Indian settlement and river crossing, Yuma predated the Spanish explorations of the 16th and 17th century. Soil in Southwest Arizona varies from silty clay to fertile sandy loams and there is sunshine the year round. Yet, agriculture had to depend upon the availability of water from the Colorado and the Gila Rivers. The Gila was undependable, bone dry in some seasons, a flooded torrent in other months. The Colorado was the big hope for Yuma and the surrounding territory.

Two Projects

A study of the area undertaken by the government in the early 1900's resulted in two major reclamation projects. The Yuma projects include 50,000 acres southward from Yuma to the Mexi-

can border. The Gila project, 15 miles east of the city extends up both sides of the river for about 40 miles.

From Imperial Dam, 18 miles north of Yuma on the Colorado, hundreds of miles of ditches and canals bring the life-giving water which has transformed the Yuma area into an agricultural paradise.

Diversified Crops

Thousands of acres of citrus crops bloom on the Yuma Mesa. Tomatoes, onions, and potatoes have taken over fields that once grew only cotton. About 90 percent of the nation's Bermuda grass seed is grown in the Yuma area. Dates, cantaloupes and rust-resistant varieties of wheat are other products of Yuma's constant agricultural productivity.

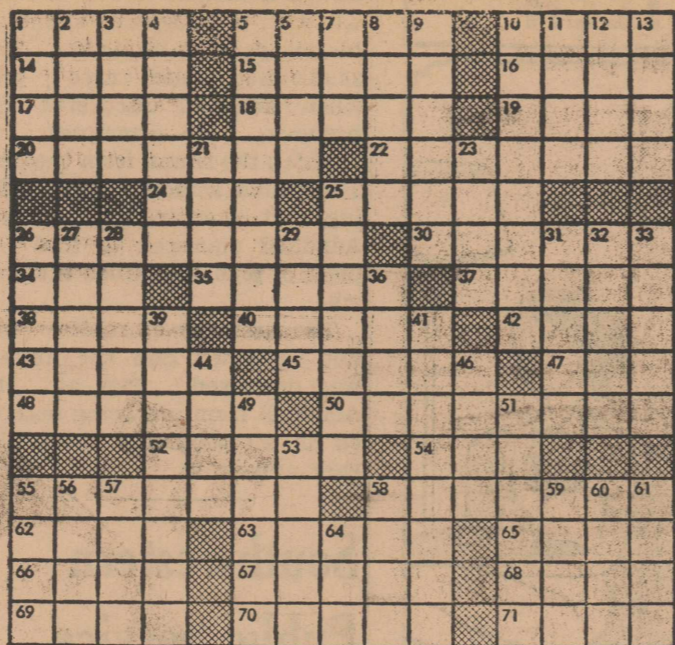

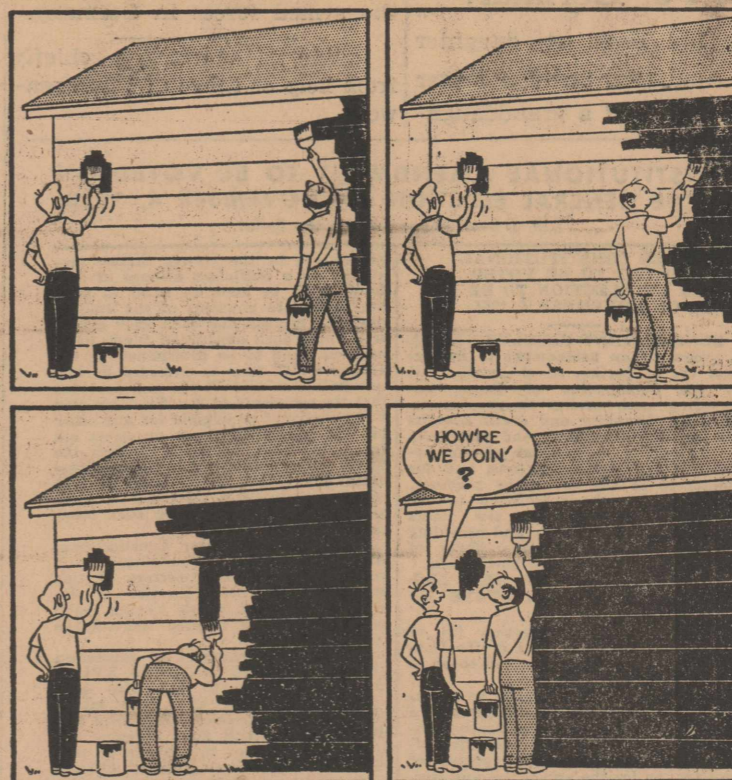

Houseplants in pots often get moldy around the rim of the pot as a result of various chemicals. Remove plant and soil from the pot and line the pot with foil, then repot with fresh soil.

Before applying paint to calcimined walls, make certain they are washed off thoroughly with a brush and a solution of salsoda and water or the new paint will flake and peel.

SJR #6—Number Two on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an amendment to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for retirement, disability and death benefits for appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for appointive and elective officers and employees of the county or precinct, providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to the voters qualified to vote thereon, and providing for the necessary election forms, ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read hereafter as follows:

(b) Each county shall have the right to provide for an annuity, Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for the appointive and elective officers and for the employees of the county or precinct, provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such fund shall not exceed one percent of the income of each such person and shall not exceed one-half percent (1/2%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is

guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said fund; and provided that the retirement fund provided for said fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the general election in November, 1958, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution to authorize each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the appointive officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct."

"AGAINST the amendment of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the appointive officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct."

"Each voter shall mark one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment in counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, and also provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on either side of the ballot, and the necessary proclamation for said election and have notice of said proposed amendment and of said election published at least once in each newspaper of general circulation in the county or precinct, as well as the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that a home rule city may provide by Charter Provision and general law city operation under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby, providing for an election, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to read as follows:

"Section 11. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby.

"Provided, however, if any of such officers, elective or appointive, shall announce their candidacy or shall announce a candidate, in any general, special or primary election, for any office of public office in the State of Texas, other than the office then held, at any time when the unexpired term of the office then held shall exceed one (1) year, such announcement or such candidacy shall constitute an automatic resignation of the office then held, and the vacancy thereby created shall be filled pursuant to the same manner as other vacancies for such office are filled.

"A municipality so providing a term exceeding two (2) years but not exceeding four (4) years for any of its non-civil service officers must elect members of the members of its governing body

by majority vote of the qualified voters in such municipality, and any vacancy or vacancies occurring on such governing body shall not be filled by appointment, but shall be filled by majority vote of the qualified voters at a special election called for such purpose, but not to exceed one hundred (100) days after such vacancy or vacancies occur."

"The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipality, and the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. HJR #1—Number One on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 5 and 24 and authorizing a new Section of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for annual Sessions of the Legislature; changing the compensation, per diem and travel expense of the members of the Legislature; authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol; providing for an election; prescribing the forms of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read hereafter as follows:

Section 5. The Legislature shall meet every year, under the condition and limitation hereinafter set forth, at such time as may be provided by law, and at other times when convened by the Governor.

"During the First Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January, 1959, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thirty (30) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty (30) days of the First Regular Session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership.

"During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January 1960, and each succeeding two years thereafter, the Legislature shall be authorized to consider and act upon the following only:

"a. Make annual appropriations for the general operation of the State government; which appropriations may be passed by majority vote of each

"b. Consider emergency matters submitted by the Governor; bills embodying such matters shall become law if passed by a majority of the members elected to each House.

"Whenever the term 'Biennial Session' appears in Article 17 of this Constitution, it shall be construed to mean the Regular Session."

"Any bill considered in the Second Regular Session of the Legislature must be introduced in that session."

Sec. 2. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a salary of Seven Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) per annum and expenses of office in amount and manner as determined by law. The Legislature shall not provide for any per diem for a greater number than one hundred and twenty (120) days during the First Regular Session, and sixty (60) days during the Second Regular Session, and thirty (30) days during any Called Session."

"That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 24a to read as follows:

"Section 24a. In addition to other compensation provided herein, the Lieutenant Governor of the State of Texas and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to temporary residence in the State Capitol during their term of office in such quarters and under such conditions as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 3. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for annual Sessions of the Legislature, prescribing the compensation and expenses for members thereof, limiting the per diem for each Session, and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives in the Capitol."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for annual Sessions of the Legislature, prescribing the compensation and expenses for members thereof, limiting the per diem for each Session, and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives in the Capitol."

"The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

through saliva, must travel through the central nervous system of the animal to the brain, before it becomes apparent. A bite close to the brain, normally develops a case of rabies within a shorter period of time.



Atomic age—nuclear power— may be just around the corner, but it isn't a very short corner. Some serious technical problems will have to be solved first.

A more economical means of producing nuclear power must be devised before it can become competitive with conventional power, according to Darwin Krucoff, of Armour Research Foundation of Illinois Institute of Technology.

Krucoff, supervisor of the reactor systems section in the ARF physics research department, pointed out that the economics of power reactors has become as complex as the reactors themselves.

"Until the technological complexities are solved, the over-all problem of economics may forestall the benefits of nuclear power to man for five to ten years," he said.

The reactor system section currently is working in two areas—reactor safety and advanced reactor concepts—to solve some of these problems. It is concerned with all phases of reactor design and development, including research, test, power, and propulsion reactors.

This research has resulted in the development of a new power reactor concept with interesting possibilities, according to Krucoff. Known as the "Armour Dust Fueled Reactor," the concept involves a new fuel form—fissionable dust carried in an inert gas.

"The dust fueled reactor concept has the advantage of greatly reduced corrosion and inherent high temperature capability, as well as all the advantages of fluid fueled systems," he said.

"Its unusual safety features and simple design appear very promising for the production of competitive nuclear power," he added.

In addition to research in reactor design and development, the reactor systems section also engages in reactor hazards analysis. Physicists investigate occurrences which could produce overheating and resulting damage to the reactor.

These occurrences can result from a variety of accident conditions, Krucoff explained, and may be followed by chemical reaction and unusual steam generation rates.

This research is aimed at modifying reactor design to minimize hazardous conditions and to enable the design of adequate containment structures within the reactor.

A recent ruling of the Internal Revenue Service permits annual royalties from patent rights to be treated as capital gains for tax purposes. The IRS had held out for four years against a congressional directive to this effect, insisting that patent royalties should be classed as ordinary income. Now the service has capitulated and promises not to go to court again in order to enforce the old regulation.

About two weeks ago Paul Aduddell became locked in combat with a belligerent skunk in his pig pens at his farm. The skunk had killed three pigs when Aduddell discovered its presence. He attempted to frighten the skunk from the pen. The skunk attacked him. Kicking and stomping the animal, Aduddell managed to find a piece of pipe, and killed the animal.

The presence of rabies was not suspected and the animal was destroyed. Pigs at the Aduddell farm are being observed for the possibility of the disease appearing.

Southwestern Public Service Robbed Thursday

Southwestern Public Service Co. was robbed of \$33.99 Thursday night. Customers checks amounting to \$190.57 were taken while \$6.25 in bills and change was left on the floor.

The intruders gained entrance to the building by forcing open the back door. The office safe was rolled to a store room in the rear of the building. It was turned on its back and the door of the safe was literally beat apart with a heavy pick.

Entrance to the building was made some time during the rain storm after midnight. Footprints and car tracks were secured by investigating officers. Finger prints were taken from the safe.

Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation Faces Bankruptcy

In the next 60 to 90 days, Texas' famous physical rehabilitation center, the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, must either make the grade financially or close its doors to handicapped Texas citizens. Approximately 4,500 patients have received comprehensive treatment since the center opened in 1941.

Faced with a deficit of \$100,000 as the result of a dramatic shift from polio care to the treatment of numerous other handicapping injuries and diseases, the Foundation's statewide board of directors was called into emergency session Sunday. While polio care has been extensively financed by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, few funds are available for patients suffering brain damage, spinal cord injury, strokes, and such diseases as cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, and multiple sclerosis.

The new program of the National Foundation will not provide patient care help for patients other than polio in the immediate future, spokesmen from the Foundation told the Warm Springs board.

No child whose condition could be helped by the non-profit center has ever been turned away for lack of funds, and the welfare program has also been extended to adults.

"It is our fervent hope that the Foundation's many friends, when told of this need for additional funds, will come to the aid of this truly outstanding work," R. I. Payne of Dallas, president, said.

Stringent economics in the center's operation, special efforts to raise funds for immediate needs, an emergency public information and fund-raising campaign, and the establishment of a long-range fund-raising program were ordered by the Board.

The name of the 110-bed center, Texas' only complete medical facility for the rehabilitation of the severely handicapped, was officially changed to the Texas Rehabilitation Center of the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and have the same published in the manner and for the length of time required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Section 1. That Section 56 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 56. The Legislature of the State of Texas shall have the power to appropriate money and establish procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of the State of Texas about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing, however, that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall be used in any of said advertising, and providing, however, that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any such money may be expended."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an amendment to Section 61a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature be authorized to provide for the acceptance of financial aid from the Federal Government for medical care on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such payments; providing that the payments for such medical care shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients; providing that the amount paid out of State funds shall never exceed the amount of Federal funds for such purposes; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-1, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for medical care on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of such recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and providing that the amount so expended out of Federal funds shall never exceed the amount of Federal funds."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance; and providing that the expenditure out of State funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and the Laws of the State of Texas.

Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 28. Vacancies in Offices of Judges of Superior Courts To Be Filled By The Governor.

"Vacancies in the office of judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next succeeding General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

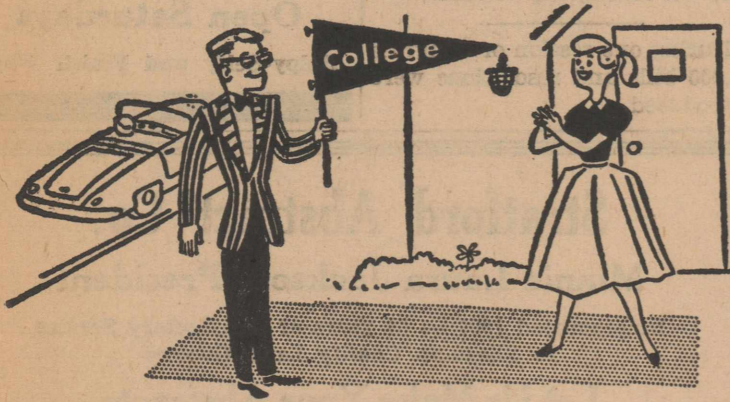

There is nothing wrong with it in the sense that to have dates with this boy is "doing wrong." However, I believe I understand what must be the parents' concern. As our friend says, she is allowed to date high school boys. This indicates that her parents want her to have friends among teenagers of her age group. They want her to have a good time,

but within her circle of friends. This boy, because he is older and in college, moves no doubt in an entirely different circle. His friends and their dates are older and more mature and our young friend could hardly have much in common with them. It would seem to me she would have much more fun with boys and girls her own age. A few years from now three or four years difference in age will not make much difference. Now, however, it is important that our teenage friend confine her social life to her age group. I think, too, that fifteen is much too young to become emotionally involved with an older boy. Once our friend stops and thinks about her problems she will realize how fair her parents are being and how much they have her welfare at heart. Publish Nine Amendments

In this issue of the Star there appears the full text of nine Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election November 4. That you may be fully informed you are urged to read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

A brief digest of the nine different amendments follows: (HJR 1) Provides for annual sessions of the legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expenses of members of the legislature and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol Building.

(SJR6) Authorizes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct.

(HJR 30) Provides that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

(HJR 31) Provides that any District, County or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unserved more than one year of the term for which he was elected.

(HJR 48) Provides that a Home Rule City may provide by Charter Provision, and a City operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years.

(HJR 17) Provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows.

(SJR 4) Authorizes the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, and recreational and other resources of Texas.

(HJR 36) Gives the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care

in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance.

(SJR 3) Authorizes the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits to the City of Amarillo, Texas and a county-wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas.

Conservation Reserve Program Formulated

Farmers of Sherman County will have the opportunity within a few weeks to get full information about the Conservation Reserve program of the Soil Bank for 1959 to decide on participation.

The Conservation Reserve is being opened early this year because the other part of the Soil Bank — the Acreage Reserve program will not be in effect in 1959.

Under the Conservation Reserve program, farmers contract with the U. S. Department

of Agriculture to reduce their acreage of harvested crops for a period of up to 10 years, and devote this acreage to conservation practices. In return for this contribution to production adjustment the government makes an annual rental payment to the farmer based on the productivity of his land. The government will also share in the cost of establishing the conservation practices.

Three major changes in the 1959 Conservation Reserve from

the program in effect this year are:

1. A higher average level of rental payments with the individual rate depending upon the productivity, agricultural value, and rental rates for similar land in the locality.
2. A higher payment rate as an incentive for a farmer to place all eligible cropland in the Reserve.
3. A priority system for accepting contract applications which gives preference to those farmers offering land at the lowest cost per unit of productivity.

Farmers will be notified as soon as the county office is ready to receive Conservation Reserve applications.
