Precinct 4 Votes For Commissioner

Qualified voters in precinct four will name the democratic nominee for the office of county commissioner in the second primary election which will be held Saturday.

Tom Wakefield is opposing F. M. Keener, incumbent, in the only local race in the county. Five hundred and eight votes were cast in this precinct race in the first primary. Wakefield received 217 and Keener polled 203 votes. A third candidate polled 88 votes.

Observers believe that the election may either be close or result in a landslide for one of the candidates. Being a lone county race, and with many of the voters away on vacation, the opportunity for winning depends predominantly on the candidate who has the most of his supporters at the polls Saturday.

Both Keener and Wakefield have been active in seeking the support of the voters of the precinct.

Two candidates appear on the ballot for the democratic nomination to the office of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, place number one. Robert W. Hamilton of Midland County is opposed by J. Edwin Smith of Harris County.

The polls will be open in all four precincts to allow voters the opportunity of casting their ballots in this state race.

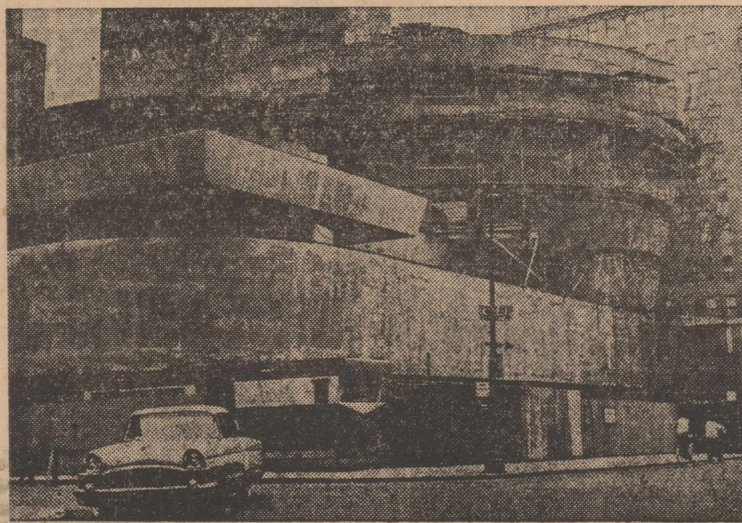
Lewis J. Flyr Gets Naval Commission

Lewis J. Flyr was one of three outstanding Aviation Officer Candidates to receive Outstanding Student Certificates from Capt. H. S. Jackson, USN, Commanding Officer of the U. S. Naval Station at the preflight graduation ceremony held last week in Pensacola, Florida.

Flyr is the son of Mrs. L. A. Flyr of Denton and lived in Sherman County until he was about 8 years old.

The outstanding award is given only to students who achieve excellent grades in every department of training. AOC Flyr was commissioned an Ensign in the United States Naval Reserve. He is a graduate of Oklahoma State University at Stillwater, Oklahoma.

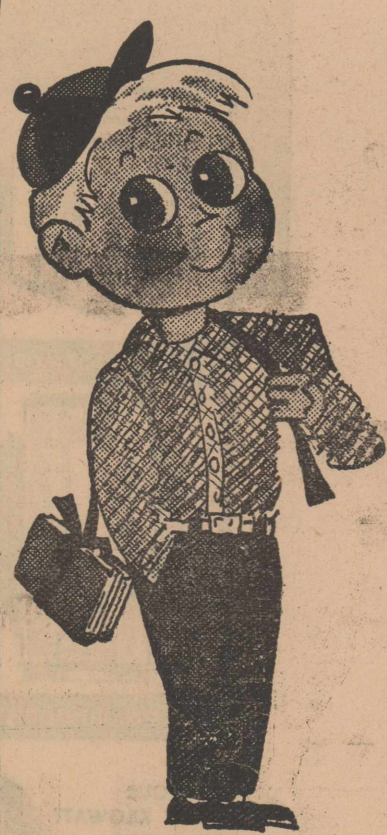

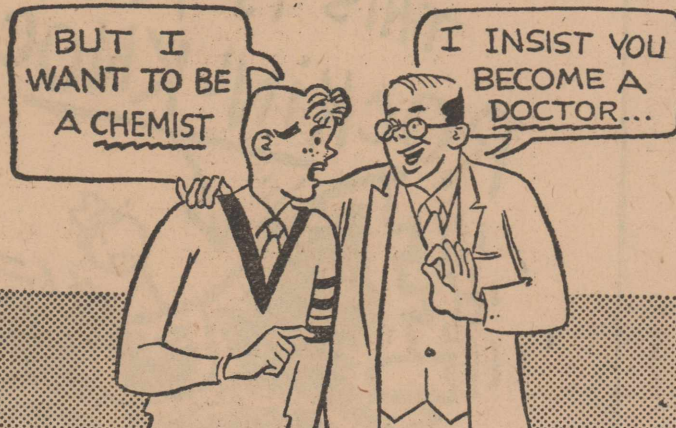

Education Important To Any Vocation

"I am about to enter the state university," a 17-year-old says. "I want to be a chemist, my Father continues to insist that I become a doctor. I don't think we'll ever agree, so I don't think I'll go to college at all. Am I right?"
You are wrong. Go on to school. The disagreement doesn't concern your going to college—only the type of location that you will prepare yourself for while you are there. Simply staying away from college doesn't solve the problem at hand. It's just an effort to ignore it. Problems are the stones that we continually find in the garden of life. When we strike one of these stones as we plow along, we must pick it up and do something with it. We must do something with it because turning our back on it will not make it disappear; it is always there, retarding growth and acting as a stumbling block until we get it out of the way.
The history of differences between father and son regarding a vocation may be a long one. The

older the difference, the more difficult a friendly solution. But, unless one party is unreasonable, there is a solution.

Someone, of course, is going to have to "give-in." But, this giving in can be a victory rather than a defeat if it is based on understanding and recognition of the fact that the path agreed on is the right path to a happy and fruitful life.

Chances are, the father in this situation is himself a doctor. Yet the mere fact that medicine has been a good and fruitful life for him is no guarantee that his son will be happy — as successful — in the same profession.

It is a problem, indeed, that our young friend has brought to attention. But it is not a new or impossible situation. That's why we say, go to your father, man to man, and work for an agreement . . . but begin your college education in the meanwhile.

Southwestern Public Service Sells Gas And Water Properties

The Southwestern Public Service Company has entered into an agreement to sell all of its gas properties and all of its water properties, except Clovis, New Mexico, to the Lea County Gas Company, it has been announced by J. E. Cunningham, president.

The sale, which Cunningham said involves about \$5,000,000, is subject to approval by utility regulatory bodies having jurisdiction.

"Southwestern Public Service Company is primarily an electric light and power company, with more than 95% of our business coming from the sales of electric service. It has been our desire for some years to become 'all-electric', so to speak, but we have wanted to be certain that those customers for whom we provide gas and water service would have a dependable and efficient supplier, such as Lea County Gas Company", Cunningham said.

"The money received from the sale of the gas and water systems will be invested in additional electric facilities. We expect our electric system to continue to grow, because we know our area will continue to grow," he added.

The Lea County Gas Company has its headquarters in El Paso, Texas. It was formed in 1936, and has been one of the fastest growing natural gas utilities in

the Southwest.

The company served 465 customers with 3 employees when it was formed 22 years ago, and its present territory, prior to the purchase of Southwestern's gas and water properties, has more than 20,000 customers and the company employs about 100 people.

In the same period, the plant and equipment of Lea County Gas Company has grown from less than \$150,000 to more than \$3,500,000.

Lea County Gas Company presently provides natural gas service in Silver City, Hurley, Bayard, Central and Anthony, New Mexico, and to certain irrigation areas in Luna and Hidalgo Counties. It also serves a large portion of the city of El Paso and the suburban areas. In addition, the company has franchises to provide natural gas service in Grant, Luna, Dona Ana and Hidalgo Counties in New Mexico.

Calvert C. Tucker is president of Lea County Gas Company. Mr. Tucker has spent 42 years in the gas business, getting his start in Canada, although he is a native-born Texan.

After serving in World War I, he returned to Texas and took an active part in the organization of such companies as Houston Pipeline and Houston Natural Gas. He joined El Paso Gas Company in 1929 as Assistant General Superintendent, and in 1936, he, and associates, purchased the properties that were the start of Lea County Gas Company from El Paso Natural Gas.

Vice President and General Manager of Lea County Gas Company is Daniel L. Hill Jr. Mr. Hill has grown with his company, and since 1937 has filled the posts of chief clerk, secretary-treasurer, vice president and treasurer, and his present position.

Underwood-Neuhaus & Company, Houston investment bankers, will underwrite the financing that Lea County Gas Company will do to purchase the water and gas properties of Southwestern Public Service Company. Milton R. Underwood, president of the investment house, is a director of Lea County Gas Company, and vice president and financial officer.

There are about 21,000 gas customers and 6,000 water customers in the communities which Lea County Gas Company will serve after it purchases the properties from Southwestern Public Service. Berger and Roswell are the largest communities involved in the sale receiving gas service, while Guymon is the largest community in which Lea County will provide water service following sale by Southwestern.

Borger, Etter, Kerrick, in Texas; Roswell, in New Mexico; and Baker, Floris, Goodwell, Hooker, Optima, Turpin and Tyrone in Oklahoma will be the communities receiving gas service from Lea County Gas Company.

Communities in which Lea County will replace Southwestern as both gas and water supplier are Gruber, Phillips, Roxana, Skellytown, Stratford and Texhoma, Texas; and Bea-

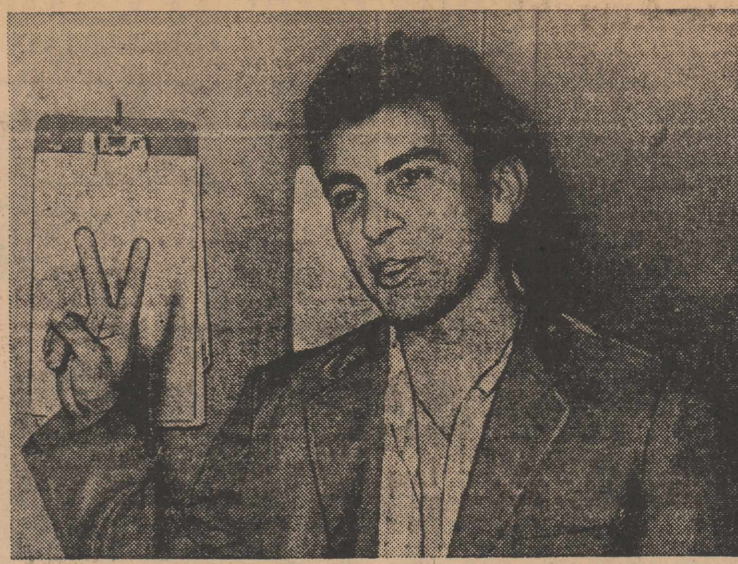

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #30—Number Three on the Ballot.
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to require that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:
Section 2. Vacancies in Offices of Judges of Superior Courts To Be Filled By The Governor.
Section 3. The office of Judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next succeeding General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election.
Section 4. The Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.
Section 5. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.
Section 6. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SJR #4—Number Seven on the Ballot.
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to Section 66 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature be authorized to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through annual periodicals having national circulation and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing that neither the name nor the signature of any state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that an equal sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money be expended.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 66 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read as follows:
Section 66. The Legislature of the State of Texas shall have the power to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through annual periodicals having national circulation and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing that neither the name nor the signature of any state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that an equal sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money be expended.
Section 2. The Legislature shall cause to be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this State:
Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SJR #6—Number Two on the Ballot.
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, authorizing each county to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct; providing that the proposed amendment to the voters qualified to vote thereon, and providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:
"Each county shall have the right to provide for an elective Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for the appointive and elective officers and for the employees of the county or precinct, as provided in this section. The fund shall be established by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and shall be administered by a board of trustees to be appointed by the county or precinct, and shall be published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in such county or precinct, for two consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such fund shall not exceed the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person and not exceed any time seven and one-half per centum of the compensation paid to each such person of such county."
"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of such fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas."

"FOR the amendment of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct."
"AGAINST the amendment of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct."
Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HJR #48—Number Five on the Ballot.
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by charter or ordinance a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters of this State an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its elective officers and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under such charter or ordinance shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation for such election.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:
Section 11. "A city, town or village may provide by charter or ordinance a general law city operating under the general laws of this State or the United States, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under such charter or ordinance shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become ineligible to hold office, or resign, or both, and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipality and for the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or ordinance a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters of this State an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its elective officers and appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under such charter or ordinance shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become ineligible to hold office, or resign, or both, and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipality and for the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."
Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #1—Number One on the Ballot.
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 24 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for annual sessions of the Legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expense of the Members of the Legislature; authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol; providing for an election; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:
Section 5. The Legislature shall meet every year, under the condition and limitation hereinafter set forth, at such time as may be provided by law, and at other times when convened by the Governor.
"During the First Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January, 1959, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thirty (30) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, residing upon the State Capitol during the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty (30) days of the First Regular Session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership."
"During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January 1960, and each succeeding two years thereafter, the Legislature shall be authorized to consider and act upon the following only:
"a. Make annual appropriations for the general operation of the State government, which appropriations may be passed by a majority vote of each House.

Hamilton Urges Texans To Vote

The leading candidate for Place One Supreme Court in the first primary has issued a statement urging all voters to take a personal interest in the run-off election to be held Saturday.
Robert W. Hamilton, who led the ticket by more than 160,000 votes in the first primary, said: "Each voter should decide for himself which candidate is best qualified, then be sure to take time to vote on Saturday, remembering that the Supreme Court has a greater potential effect upon our rights as individuals than any other office in our state or nation. Texas is one of the states which allows its citizens the privilege of voting upon members of its Supreme Court and each Texas voter should express his preference in this election even though in some cases this will be the only race on the ballot."
Hamilton is a veteran jurist now serving as Chief Justice 8th Court of Civil Appeals, just one step in rank below the Supreme Court post for which he is candidate. He has 31 years experience in general practice, as county and district attorney, district judge, and including five years as Chief Appeals Justice.

Justice Hamilton was selected as the preferred candidate of Texas lawyers in a secret vote conducted by the State Bar and he led the field of three candidates with a total of 476,799 votes in the first primary, less than seven percent short of a majority which would have given him a victory without a run-off.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #31—Number Four on the Ballot.
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas to provide that all county officials for whom four-year terms of office were authorized in 1954 must resign such office prior to announcing for a different office when more than one (1) year remains unexpired of the term for which they are elected, and providing for the filling of such vacancies in the manner now provided by law.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. Section 65 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:
Section 65. STAGGERING TERMS OF OFFICE.—The following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve for the full terms provided in this Constitution:
(a) District Clerks; (b) County Clerks; (c) County Judges; (d) County Court Clerks; (e) County Criminal Courts, County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (f) County Treasurers; (g) Criminal District Attorneys; (h) County Surveyors; (i) Inspectors of Highways and Precincts; (j) County Commissioners for Precincts Two and Four; (j) Justices of the Peace.
Notwithstanding other provisions of this Constitution, the following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, shall serve only for terms of two (2) years: (a) Sheriffs; (b) Assessors and Collectors of Taxes; (c) District Attorneys; (d) County Attorneys; (e) Public Weighers; (f) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (g) Constables. At all subsequent elections, such officers shall be elected for the full terms provided in this Constitution.
"In any district, county or precinct where any of the aforementioned offices is of such nature that two (2) or more persons hold such office, with the result that candidates file for "Place No. 1," "Place No. 2," etc., the officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, shall serve for a term of two (2) years if the designation of their office is an even number, and for a term of four (4) years if the designation of their office is an even number. Thereafter, all such officers shall be elected for the terms provided in this Constitution.
"Provided, however, if any of the officers named herein are in office at the time of the election, or shall in fact become a candidate, in any General, Special or Precinct election, such officers shall constitute an automatic resignation of the office then held, and the vacancy thereby created shall be filled pursuant to law in the same manner as other vacancies for such offices are filled."
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that any District, County, or Precinct officer serving a four-year term must resign such office prior to announcing for a different office if there remains unexpired more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that any District, County, or Precinct officer serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unexpired more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected."
Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #36—Number Eight on the Ballot.
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an amendment to Section 61a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 61a-1; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance on behalf of persons eligible for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children as provided in Section 61a of Article III and for persons eligible for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided in Article III, Section 61-b of the Constitution of the State of Texas; providing for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such payments; providing that the payments for such medical care shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients; providing that the amounts paid out of State funds shall never exceed the payments out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 61a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 61a-1, which shall read as follows:
"Subsection 61a-1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children as provided for in Section 61a of Article III and on behalf of needy recipients of Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled as provided for in Section 61-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas. The payments for such medical care on behalf of such recipients shall be in addition to the direct assistance to such recipients, and shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature to be expended out of State funds for such purposes, such amounts shall never exceed the amounts so expended out of Federal funds."
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of repaying such assistance; and providing that the expenditure out of State Funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds."
Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

The WORLD OUTDOORS



ALTHOUGH not as well known as the Everglades of a neighboring state, the Okefenokee Swamp in Georgia's Southeast corner is an exciting primitive area that is practically an unfinished sportsman's paradise.

Once part of an ancient sea, the swamp was aptly called by Indians, "The Land of the Trembling Earth." Most of the area is covered with aquatic blooms, and there are many cypress trees heavily laden with Spanish moss. Except for a few major "islands" Okefenokee is a giant, water-covered peat bog. In places, it is possible to push a pole nine feet through the soft, springy peat before striking solid ground.

Largemouth bass, pickerel and catfish predominate in the swamp, which is fed by underground springs. Wildlife is abundant and includes bear, deer, otter, raccoon and possum. These animals are protected from hunters, as are the estimated 5,000 black alligators which operate with the fishermen in the search for fish. But there are more than enough fish for all.

Okefenokee is also a sanctuary for the large waterbirds, such as the crane, egret, heron and ibis. Mallards, ringneck and pintail ducks make the swamp one of their favorite migratory hotels. The depths of Okefenokee is no place for a stranger. Federally-licensed guides are usually hired at Fargo, Folkston or Waycross. Once in the swamp, one finds a world just as it was 300 years ago. Even Billy's Island, final stronghold of the fiercely independent Seminole Indians and later headquarters of a lumbering village of 600, is now being reclaimed by the wild.

A Michigan Lumberman invented the modern spark plug; a Russian, the demountable rim automobile wheel; a Midwest engineer, the self-starter; and a New England Yankee, the anti-skid chain. The courthouse at Eastville, on Virginia's Eastern Shore, contains some of the oldest continuous county court records in the United States. The documents date from 1632.

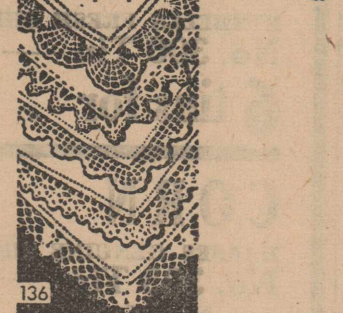
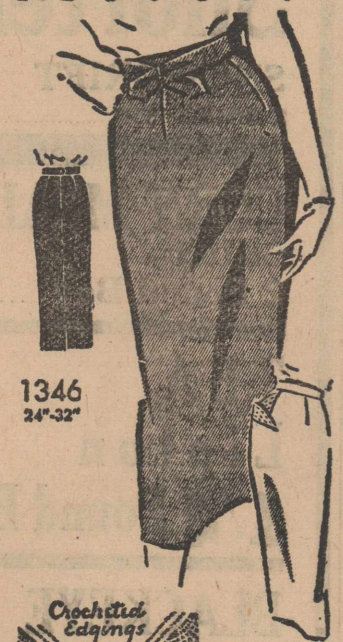

in 1960 that lies behind the cementing efforts. Many leaders contend that a unified Texas delegation could have a key role in naming the next presidential nominee.

All the above-mentioned leaders are presently agreed on one issue, support of the party nominees. Point on which they part is whether the governor should have a veto over the state committee members selected by vote of district delegations.

Governor Daniel, following the practice of past governors, bumped some of the district-selected committee members in 1956 and submitted people more in line with his program.

Mrs. Randolph and Senator Yarborough, now joined by Rayburn, insist the governor has no right to do this.

But Governor Daniel has not promised he wouldn't. He said he felt no district should propose a committee member who is "dedicated to the sabotage of duly elected officers of the party." This almost certainly refers to members of the Democrats of Texas (DOT), an ultra-liberal group that has heckled and hindered the governor and other official party leaders at every turn for the past two years.

Delegates from each of the 31 senatorial districts are allowed two state committee members, a man and a woman. It is estimated that perhaps six of these districts may be controlled by anti-Daniel forces. Therein lies the possibility for discord. If any of these districts propose a DOTer for the state committee, the governor is not likely to "harmonize."

High Hopes

Mr. Wilson went to Washington, his saddlebags full of multi-million dollar hopes for Texas school children.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson personally delivered the Texas brief in the upcoming U. S. Supreme court case on Texas tidelands. At issue is whether the state or federal government owns submerged lands between the points 3 miles out and 10.5 miles out.

Wilson carried the arguments for Texas ownership in 40-year old saddlebags that belonged to a heroic Texas Ranger. He declares optimistically that the case is jinxed — in Texas' favor, because the brief is dated August 13, trial is set for October 13, oral arguments will last 13 hours and 13 people worked on the research.

Texas had spent "a big sum of money" marshalling its facts, that a bevy of top-notch legal minds from over the state, nation and two foreign countries had spent some 2,000 hours on the 400-page brief.

"We feel like we have an overwhelming case," he said. "We feel like we will win it."

Cities Win Out

Cities and utility companies won the first round of a court battle to determine who pays the cost of relocating utilities for new interstate highways.

An Austin district court ruled that the cost can be paid from federal-state highway funds, as provided in a law passed by the last legislature. State Highway Department is challenging the constitutionality of this law.

Ultimate decision will, of course, be made in the supreme court. Some estimate the relocation costs could run as high as \$100,000,000.

Sherman County has 85 old-age beneficiaries drawing annual payments totaling \$4,145.00, it was revealed this week.

Old-age, survivors and disability insurance benefits are being paid in the Texas Panhandle at the rate of \$8,019,024 a year, according to John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security District Office.

"This is an increase of about 35% over last year," Sanderson said.

Payments to a retired worker average about \$65 per month, Sanderson states. The average for a widow with two young children is \$145.00. The maximum payment for a retired couple is \$162.80 a month, and the maximum for a family is \$200.00.

There were several reasons for the increase in benefits over last year. One was the payment of benefits to people who were brought under the law for the first time in recent years, self-employed farmers, for example.

Other reasons for the increase were the reduction in the retirement age to 62 for women and the starting of disability insurance benefits to disabled people 50 or over.

The table below shows the number and amount of each type of benefit being paid in Texas: 210,266 retired workers receive \$12,214,700; 70,345 wives or husbands receive \$2,102,100; 33,679 widows or widowers receive \$1,580,700; 16,091 mothers with children receive \$730,000; 79,393 children receive \$2,852,000; 1,042 dependent parents receive \$69,200; 6,105 disabled receive \$427,200.

For the entire State of Texas, social security payments at the end of 1947 were being paid to 417,281 beneficiaries at the rate of \$19,975,900.
