well-known Texas rehabilitation center, the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, were polio patients. They were greatly and often dramatically helped by the fine staff and unique facilities.

Then came the Salk vaccine and fewer polio patients came to Warm Springs for treatment. Todty less than a third of the patients have been afflicted by polio.

Instead, the spotlight of rehabilitation, once focused brilliantly on the needs of polio victims, has shifted or at least widened to include many citizens who suffer from other disabling conditions.

Today, the skilled hands and tools of physical medicine at the Foundation also minister to the many Texans who have suffered spinal cord injuries or brain damage in auto wrecks, and in many other types of accidents. There are also many who have become handicapped by strokes and arthritis or from cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, multiple schlerosis, and similar fearsome conditions.

No child whose condition could be helped by this nonprofit center has ever been turned away from financial reasons, and now indigent adults also have the benefit of this policy of benevolence.

However, while polio care has been extensively financed by the National Foundation, few funds are avaliable for the care of patients suffering from the many other conditions described above. As a result, the Foun-






