Stuff cleaning cloths into a plastic bag for your cleaning caddy and they will always be fresh for use. Slide a vertical storage shelf into your kitchen cabinet for holding cookie sheets and lids so you can find them without searching. Remove brown stains on dishes by letting them stand in a borax solution for several hours, then wash in hot soap suds and water. 




