General Election Voting Tuesday

Democratic, Republican and Constitution party candidates will learn their fate Tuesday, November 4, when voters determine the officials who will take office in January of 1959.

Democratic Governor Price Daniel is opposed by Edwin S. Mayer of the Republican party; Democratic Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey is opposed by Philip Lee Eubank of the Constitution party. Democratic candidate Will Wilson is opposed by Muckleroy McDonold of the Constitution party for the office of attorney general.

Three candidates, Ralph W. Yarborough, Democrat; Roy Whittenburg, Republican; and Bard A. Logan of the Constitution party are candidates for the United States Senate.

Robert W. Hamilton, Democrat, is opposed by John Q. Adams of the Republican party, for the office of associate justice of the supreme court.

Olin Culberson, Democrat, is opposed by Howard Bumbaugh, Constitution party, for the office of railroad commissioner.

Robert S. Calvert, Democrat, and Glenn Florance, Constitution party, are candidates for comptroller of public accounts.

Bill Allcorn, Democrat, and W. C. Miller, Constitution party, are candidates for commissioner of the general land office.

Jesse James, Democrat, and Bert Ellis, Constitution party, are candidates for state treasurer.

John C. White, Democrat; Grover C. Carothers, Republican; and H. W. Vogan of the Constitution party are candidates for commissioner of agriculture.

Other democratic nominees are unopposed in their bid for public office. The 11x29 inch official ballot will cause little confusion for voters who study the sample ballot in this week's Star. Those who vote the ticket straight for any political party may do so by merely drawing a black line the full length of the four other columns on the ballot, leaving their favorite party's column of candidates unscratched.

Split-ticket is a little more complicated. A voter has the privilege of voting for a candidate of any of the three listed party nominees for any one office. This is accomplished by marking out the names of the candidates of the other two political parties and leaving the name of the candidate favored unscratched. This type voting may be done rapidly by drawing a line down the full length of the column except through the name of the favored candidate. The name of the candidate in the favored party is scratched out separately in the same manner as though one were voting in a party primary election.

Write-in campaigns seldom occur in general elections. However in the event a voter desires to cast such a vote, he marks out the name or names of the candidates in the three party columns and write in the name of the desired candidate in the right hand column of the ballot provided for such votes. Write-in candidates are not eligible for election under party affiliations in the general election as candidates who enjoy these nominations have won the designation in previous primary elections or in conventions.

In addition to the candidates for public office, the ballot carries nine proposed amendments to the constitution of the state

of Texas which should be considered carefully as they will determine the future of several services, the very procedure of the state legislature, and the taxes which will be paid by citizens and those of future generations.

Amendment No. 1
Constitutional amendment No. 1 provides for annual sessions of the legislature, changing the compensation per diem and travel expenses of members of the legislature and authorizes temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol Building.

Amendment No. 2
Constitutional Amendment No. 2 authorizes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct.

Amendment No. 3
Amendment No. 3 provides that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next general election.

Amendment No. 4
Amendment No. 4 provides that any district, county or precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unexpired more than one year of the term for which he was elected.

Amendment No. 5
Proposed amendment No. 5 provides that a home rule city may provide by charter provision, and a city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years.

Amendment No. 6
Proposed amendment No. 6 provides a pension for retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows.

Amendment No. 7
Proposed constitutional amendment No. 7 would authorize the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, and recreational and other resources of Texas.

Amendment No. 8
Constitutional amendment No. 8 would give the legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance.

Amendment No. 9
Proposed constitutional amendment No. 9 would authorize the legislature to create a hospital district coextensive with the incorporated limits to the city of Amarillo, and a county wide hospital district in Wichita County, and hospital districts in Jefferson county.

Voting for or against the constitutional amendments is very simple. Those favoring the amendment merely mark out

Cars Demolished In Accident Friday

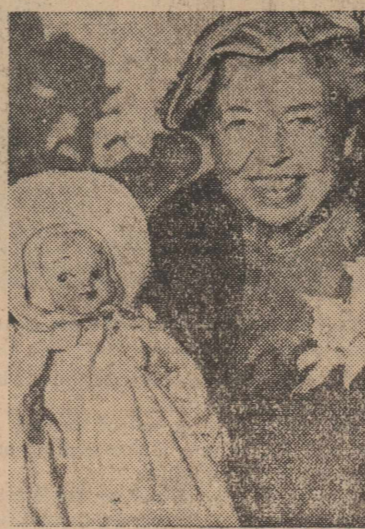

Haskell, Hathcoat, Goule and French were in one car. Bennett and Elms were riding in the other.

As the two cars driving parallel to each other approached the curve, the car on the right side of the road struck loose gravel on the shoulder. Investigating officers and the boys riding in the cars believe the driver used his brakes. The car skidded back on the highway in the path of the car on the left side of the road. Attempting to avoid the crash the other driver used his brakes and veered to the left. Skidding sideways the cars started turning over as the tires struck the loose shoulder on the left side of the road. One car was thought to have turned over 1 1/2 times and the other is thought to have rolled over twice.

Mrs. E. Goule Laid To Rest Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. E. Goule, 42, were conducted in the First Methodist Church Tuesday afternoon by Rev. Charles Gates, pastor. Burial was made in the Stratford cemetery. Mrs. Goule was born February 17, 1916 in Breckenridge, Texas. She is survived by her husband, a son, Larry of the home; a daughter, Mrs. Bob Newman of Borger; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. P. Thompson of San Aneglo, Texas, two sisters, Mrs. Oleta Mosteller of Paint Rock, Texas and Mrs. Opal Bergmann of San Angelo, Texas; one brother, George Thompson of San Angelo, Texas; and two grandchildren.

Mrs. Goule died about 5:00 p. m. Sunday from a wound inflicted by the discharge of a .16 gauge shot gun. The tragedy took place at the family home on the western edge of Stratford.

Mrs. Bob Newman and her two children were visiting her mother at the time. Mrs. Newman was feeding her three month old baby girl. Her 2 1/2 year old son was playing with his grandmother. Mrs. Goule is said to have left the room and stepped into the bedroom for a few minutes before walking to the rear door of the home. She stepped out the door and went toward a small building near the home where Larry Goule has his room. The small grandson followed. A loaded shotgun used to kill skunks was sometimes kept standing near the entrance of the door and other times was placed on a highboy near the door. Members of the family believe Mrs. Goule may have attempted to place the gun out of the reach of her grandson. Walking out of the house to join her mother, Mrs. Newman heard a noise which sounded as though something was falling. She heard the explosion of the gun as she walked from the house, then saw her mother standing in the doorway of the small building, mortally wounded. Mrs. Goule fell forward out of the door. As Mrs. Newman reached her mother's side she thought she heard her murmur, "It's too late now." Mrs. Newman phoned the offices of the doctor and the sheriff, failed to get answers, and then called the long distance operator to summon aid. Mrs. Newman placed her two children in a car and drove to the home of a friend, Mrs. Don Riffe, where she found Mrs. Leslie Parker, who called friends to accompany them to the Goule home. Mrs. Goule was dead when they arrived. The discharge of the .16 gauge shotgun had penetrated her heart.

E. Goule was on his way to College Station to attend a state conference for county agents. He was informed of the tragedy at the home of his mother, Mrs. G. W. Walker, at Hext, Texas near Menard, where he had planned to spend the night. He arrived in Stratford at 5:30 a. m. Monday accompanied by Mrs. Goule's mother, Mrs. O. P. Thompson, her brother, George Thompson,

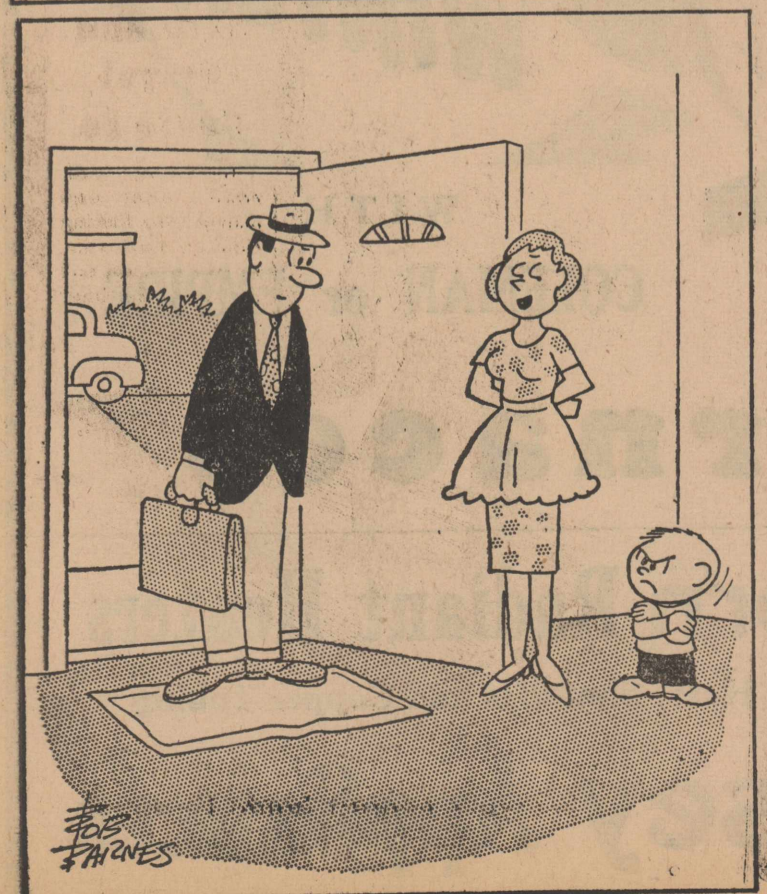

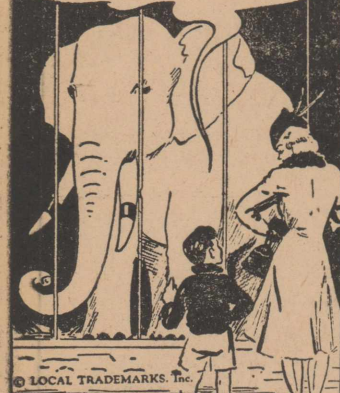

Gruver, and a brother, Erwin of Gruver.

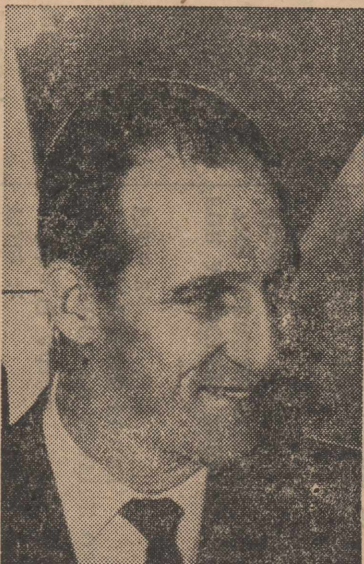

used in other states, said the governor. And other taxes, not sales or income, could be added.

Daniel also indicated that he was not fully convinced that the gap between income and needs would be as large as the \$154,000,000 mentioned by the comptroller.

He would not definitely say now, said the governor, that he would or would not veto sales or income tax bills if passed by the Legislature. But he made it clear that he did not favor them, and that he thought there were better possibilities.

Daniel praised state agencies who reduced their budget requests a total of \$1,490,631. Overall, the budget requests had run \$272,000,000 higher than for the present biennium.

Anti-Crime Laws

New laws and institutions to deal more forcefully with Texas' soaring crime rate may be a major topic for the next Legislature. County and district attorneys meeting in Austin were asked by Governor Daniel to help in the job of strengthening and plugging the loopholes in Texas' law enforcement structure. Daniel said that at the present rate Texas will have a 28 per cent increase in crime in three years.

Too often, said the governor, criminals escape punishment through hairline technicalities in the laws. He also urged (1) state-paid parole supervisors for juveniles, (2) a second boys training school to separate ser-

ious offenders from those for whom there is more hope, and (3) stricter narcotics laws.

Air Force Tests Experimental Equipment

An Air Force eight-jet bomber flew a series of high-speed, low level test missions over parts of Texas and Oklahoma beginning about Thursday of last week.

Some of the test flights were only about 300 feet above the ground in order to test experimental equipment by Wright-Patterson Air Force Base personnel of Ohio.

The aircraft flew a course along the Rock Island railroad and U. S. Highway 54 from Dalhart to Guymon. This course took the planes over or near Chamberlain, Conlen, Stratford, Texhoma, and Goodwell.

Selection of this area was made because it is the only such

area in the nation that is accurately surveyed, and flat, yet thinly populated.

The tests were flown by pilots of the Air Research and Development Command's Wright Air Development Center of Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio.

Both high speed and low level flights were made in both directions along the corridor between 8:00 a. m. and 6:00 p. m.

Mix and sift together dry ingredients. Make a well and add remaining ingredients all at once; stir only enough to dampen ingredients. Batter should be lumpy. Bake on a hot, oiled griddle until golden, turn and bake other side.

Remove brown stains on dishes by letting them stand in a borax solution for several hours, then wash in hot soap suds and water.

Store china plates and saucers which are seldom used by placing circles of Canton flannel between them, then cover with a plastic bag to prevent dust from settling on them.

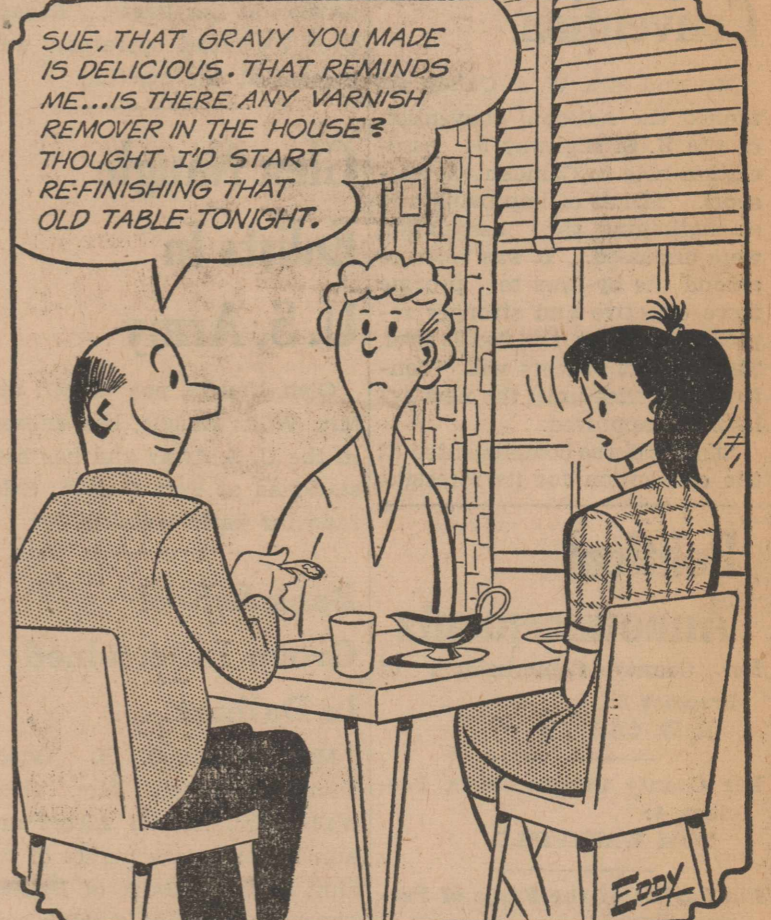

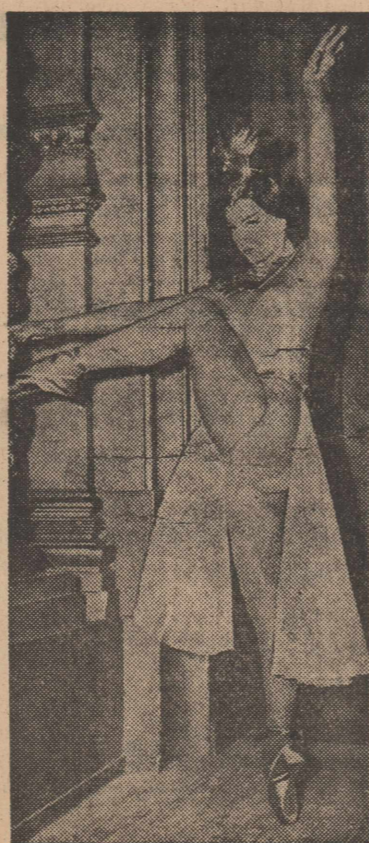
