High Sugar Content In County Sugar Beets

Bill Dunn, a field man for the Holly Sugar Co., was in the county recently for the purpose of obtaining sugar beets for the final sugar content analysis Beets were taken from the demonstration plots on the R. M. Buckles and Phillip Miller farms, and returned to the Holly plant in Colorado for tests.

Beets from the Buckles demonstration contained an average sugar content of 17.1%, while the beets from the Miller demonstration contained a sugar analysis of 17.6%.

G. W. Yeager, chief agriculturist for the Holly Sugar Co. says "This is indeed an excellent sugar content, especially when we consider the late date of planting, insect damage, hail, etc. These few samples would indicate that the area would be ideal for sugar beet production. It has indeed been a pleasure to work with the people on this






