
.12 Inch Of Moisture In Snow Friday



Magruder managed to pick up the bird, tie its feet and bring it alive to the checking station. He said that he could find no marks or wounds on

As far as conservation officer Saville knows, this was the first wild turkey ever checked alive at a West Virginia Checking station.

The money is distributed to each State on a basis that takes into account the ratio its land area and paid license holders bear to all the States. Each also is required to match every three Federal dollars with one of its own.

AN ORDINANCE SETTING UP A SANITATION SERVICE CHARGE BY COMBINING PRESENT SEWER, TRASH AND GARBAGE CHARGES; VIDING AUTHORITY FOR LEVYING AND COLLECTING THIS CHARGE BY ORDER OF THE CITY COUNCIL; PROVID-ING A PENALTY FOR NON-PAYMENT; PROVIDING FOR REGULATIONS CONCERNING GARBAGE CONTAINERS AND THEIR LOCATION AND PRO-VIDING FOR A FINE OF \$10.00 FOR FAILURE TO COMPLY; AND REPEALING ALL ORDIN-ANCES OR PARTS OF ORDIN-ANCES IN CONFLICT THERE-

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STRATFORD, TEXAS: Section 1. — That there shall be levied and collected a sanitation service charge in lieu of present sewer, trash and gar-bage charges to effect a com-bination of these charges into said sanitation service charge

and the same shall be payable in one statement rendered to the

patron. Section 2. — That the City Council shall have authority after the effective date hereof to levy and collect said charge from all patrons by order properly entered of record in the minute book of said City in an amount deemed necessary for the proper maintenance and extension of the sewer system and trash and garbage disposal system.

Section 3. — That there is hereby provided and imposed a penalty of Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) for non-payment of the sanitation service charge. This penalty shall become automatically due after three days of the final notice given to the pa-

tron. Section 4. — That the City Council shall have authority to require each and every household, residence, business house, or anyplace where people work or reside to have a metal barrel or metal container of some nature in good condition suitable to deposit trash and garbage to be deposited in said containers;

All said containers shall be placed upon the alley line; in the event there is no alley adjacent to the property, then said containers shall be placed so as to be easily accessible to the track and corpage whiches trash and garbage vehicle;

Every person, firm, or corporation who shall omit or refuse to comply with the foregoing section shall be deemed guilty or a misdemeanor and conviction therefor shall be fined in any sum not more than Miss Carla Jean Smith and Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each


