Western Gas Service Company, according to an announcement made by the company president, Jess E. Scarborough, plant

manager for the company in Stratford, stated that the purpose of the name change is "to keep pace with our expansion in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas and is intended to better identify us with the area we cover in the distribution of natural gas.'

The new office in the Taylor building at the corner of Main and Third Streets will be the Stratford headquarters for the natural gas and water services. The office telephone number is 5681. Bills may be paid to Western Gas Service at the Stratford office or by mail to Post Office Box 4 in Stratford.

The name change follows acquisition in November of the gas and water distribution properties of the Southwestern Public Service Company. The \$5,000,-000 purchase doubled Western Gas' size. It now serves more than 40,000 customers, some with gas, some with water and others with both gas and water, in 31 communities extending from Silver City and Lordsburg in Southwestern New Mexico to Elkhart, Kansas. This region includes such key areas as the upper and lower valley sections of El Paso, Texas; Roswell, N. M.; Guymon in the Oklahoma Panhandle and Borger in Texas




