



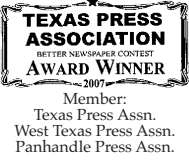

MISD program helps migrant students

The Muleshoe school board received a report of the district's Project MAP, during Monday's regular board meeting.

Project MAP, one of the school district's federally-funded programs, is aimed at improving the education capabilities of migrant students within the district by tutoring the students in the program, and in some cases tutoring the migrant parents to improve their abilities to help their children

in the learning process.

Margie Alarcon explained that many of the migrant students have issues that make learning more difficult, such as having to move during the school year as their parents move from place to place for agricultural work, and also noted problems such as educational and language barriers on the parents part.

She also pointed out that state guidelines don't allow the program at Muleshoe to provide the service during the school day — requiring

the students, both children and adult, to attend during the late afternoon and evening.

It was also noted that the program is only open to migrant students, and their parents, who have no intention of remaining permanently in the district.

"These ladies have done a tremendous job in

doubling the program since last year," said Dave McNeill, who coordinates the districts federal programs, referring to Alarcon and Frances Recio and their efforts to identify migrant families in need of the services and bring them into the program.

Recio also talked about the staff and volunteers who

make the program possible, describing the Muleshoe High School students — such as Franklin Piland, Angel Daniel, Xavier Cuevas, Eli Symm and Courtney Mardis, as both "role models and tutors."

"We want to thank the school board for the opportunity to work with the migrant students," Recio said.

"This is a great program for our students and our parents," Superintendent Gene Sheets said, adding that the staff should be

commended for the work its doing.

"The parents do want to help their children, and with this program they're able to do it," board member Daniel Guzman said.

"I was really impressed," Guzman said, referring to a recent visit he made to see how the program was going at the high school.

"I'm excited," board member Cindy Purdy said. "This is absolutely wonderful."

Dialysis unit raises hopes for nursing home success

The possibility of a dialysis unit being established at Park View Nursing Care Center continues to raise hopes of many concerned about the center's financial future.

During his report to the Muleshoe Area Hospital District's governing body Thursday, Park View administrator Sandy Sandlin reported on the Renal Associates of America's continued interest in constructing a dialysis unit in an unused portion of the nursing home.

According to Sandlin, the

unit would need a base of about 10 patients to make it financially viable, and noted that there were 25 known dialysis patients in the immediate area who would benefit from the service.

Sandlin said he's been visiting with RAA representatives, and that they have been provided with blueprints of the nursing home for the company's architects to study, and that it would cost about \$700,000 to convert the space, significantly less than the amount that is usually required.

And, he said, the cost of the remodeling would be at RAA expense instead of the hospital district.

Sandlin pointed out that it would be a "win-win" situation for the hospital district and the patients because it would not only bring in much needed revenue for the nursing home, and would make it easier for local dialysis patients who would no longer have to travel to Lubbock twice a week, but would also attract residents requiring dialysis services to the nursing home.

"We appreciate what you're doing," MAHD board president Ronnie Dent said, adding that such a service could be a significant benefit to Park View.

"I think, if we get the dialysis, it'll turn everything around," Dent said.

In other business, the MAHD board:

- Voted to ask the district's insurance adjustor to re-measure the roof at Park View in regards to the recent replacement work done by Veach Roofing, but included the stipulation that the hospital district would not be paying the extra amount being requested by Veach.

Jerry Veach of Veach Roofing addressed the board concerning a request

2007 election is fast approaching

Bailey County residents who wish to participate in the Nov. 6 Constitutional Amendment election using a mail-in ballot have until Oct. 31 to get their applications for mail-in ballots in to County Clerk Paula Benton.

Ballots being cast by mail are especially helpful for individuals 65 years of age and older who don't wish to vote at the Bailey County Coliseum on Nov. 6, and individuals who plan to be out of town on election day and can't take part in the early vote, according to Benton.

Mail-in ballots must reach the County Clerk's Office by election day to be counted.

Individuals not wishing to wait until Nov. 6 to cast their ballots can vote early at the County Clerk's Office until

Friday, Nov. 2, from 8:30 a.m. until noon and 1-5 p.m.

The 2007 Constitutional Amendment election includes 16 amendments for consideration on Nov. 6 election, and are as follows:

Amendment No. 1...

Provides for the continuation of the constitutional appropriation for facilities and other capital items at Angelo State University on a change in the governance of the university.

Amendment No. 2...

Provides for the issuance of \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students and authorizing

bond enhancement agreements with respect to general obligation bonds issued for that purpose.

Amendment No. 3...

Authorizes the legislature to provide that the maximum



appraised value of a residence homestead for ad valorem taxation is limited to the lesser of the most recent market value of the residence homestead as determined by the appraisal entity or 110 percent, or a greater percentage, of the appraised value of the

residence homestead for the preceding tax year.

Amendment No. 4...

Authorizes the issuance of up to \$1 billion in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for maintenance, improvement, repair, and construction projects and for the purchase of needed equipment.

Amendment No. 5...

Authorizes the legislature to permit the voters of a municipality having a population of less than 10,000 to authorize the governing body of the municipality to enter into an agreement with an owner of real property in or adjacent to an area in the municipality that has been approved for funding under certain

MISD wins TEA appeal

Muleshoe ISD was notified recently that two additional campuses have been rated as "Recognized" by the State of Texas after the school district won an appeal before the Texas Education Agency.

DeShazo and Dillman Elementary were originally rated as "Acceptable" when the state released its testing results on Aug. 1.

However, the school district appealed the results because two students were counted in the wrong sub-group because of a coding error. Correcting the error made the difference in the two MISD campuses going from "Acceptable" to "Recognized."

"We appreciate TEA for objectively considering our appeal and correcting the mistake. We have an excellent school, and we knew our teachers and students had performed better than the original rating indicated," said Superintendent Gene Sheets.

"With this appeal, three out of four of the campuses in Muleshoe ISD are now rated as 'Recognized' (DeShazo Elementary, Dillman Elementary, and Watson Junior High)," he added. "We are very proud of the efforts of everyone in our district to help every student succeed."

Continued from page 1 for an additional \$5,900 for reroofing the nursing home.

According to Veach, calculated his bid for the roof replacement from the measurement sheet provided by the insurance adjuster rather than measuring it himself, and said that an additional 31 squares of shingles was needed for the project.

Veach said the insurance company apparently didn't allow for the waste that results from the ridges and valleys in the structure's roof.

However, Dent said the other two roofing contractors who bid on the roof had used their own measurements and only differed slightly from the 479 measured by the insurance adjuster.

"Do you normally accept what the insurance company says," board member Zona Gatewood asked.

"They're usually pretty accurate," Veach replied.

According to Dent, the hospital district board couldn't just back up and increase the amount it was paying Veach for the repairs because it had already accepted his bid, and the increase was enough that the board would have taken into consideration prior to

awarding his company the bid.

Dent said the board's decision didn't have anything to do with the quality of the work.

Discussed the district's financial report, noting that it hadn't been a good month.

"You're never happy when you have a bad month," MAHD CEO Ray Mason said.

However, Mason said the revenue being generated by the new physicians was encouraging.

"I expect our financial picture to start looking better every month," he added.

According to the financial report provided to the board members, the total tax collected during 2007 is \$1,022,036, and the collections for the month totaled \$7,456.

Of this, according to chief financial officer Sharon Novak's report, \$7,000 went to Park View, and \$564 went to the hospital's general fund.

Voted to send accounts totaling \$43,731 to the district's collection agency.

Purdy said the school district is always looking for ways to get parents involved in their children's education and said Project MAP appeared to have "hit it on the head."

In other business, the school board:

- Received a report from Assistant Superintendent Don Wood concerning the district's food service contract with Aramark.

"It's been a great partnership," Wood said, "especially since Robin Thacker has been on board."

According to Wood, the district realized a profit of more than \$35,000 from its food service last school year, something he said the

district hadn't seen prior to Thacker taking over as food service manager.

- Approved the minutes from the Sept. 24 and Oct. 5 board meetings.

- Approved the improvement plans for both the district and the individual campuses.

- Approved a partnership agreement with Headstart.

- Approved a resolution listing the sources for investment training the superintendent is required to receive every two years.

- Conducted the first review of "Update 81" to the school board's policy manual, during which the assistant superintendent noted that if the school board wished to allow

students between the ages of 21 and 26 the opportunity to complete high school — as state law now permits — it would need to address the issue in the policy manual.

Board member Thurman Myers thought it would be a good thing, especially with the alternative education program at Pep, saying, "We don't need to hender them."

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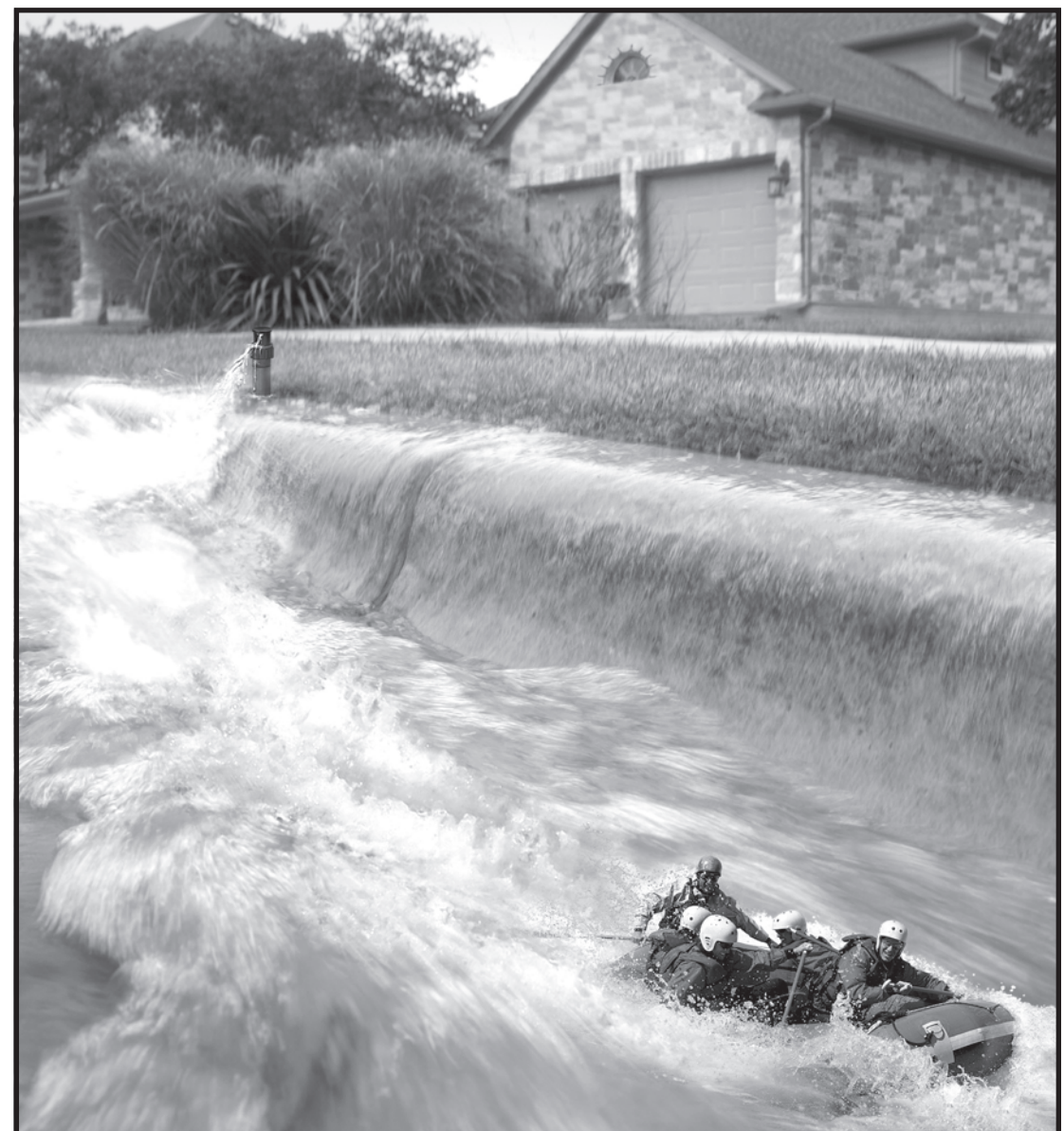

Wood took over the helm and went 17 yards on an option. L. Wood pounded up the middle and a face mask penalty put the Mules on the three.

Jared Mendoza appeared to have reached pay dirt on the "Hammer" but was marked down at the one foot line. Dimmitt recovered a Mule miscue at the one to interrupt the Mule scoring streak.

The Bobcats were forced to punt after three plays and

shanked the punt out of bounds at the Dimmitt 22. W. Wood took L. Wood the ball deep in the back field allowing him to look for an opening. L. Wood hit the hole running and then cut outside and went almost untouched into the end zone. Rodriguez kick was perfect to end all scoring.

Patrick Precure picked off the fourth Dimmitt pass for the Mules. W. Wood ended the game with his Dad's favorite play. The "Victory

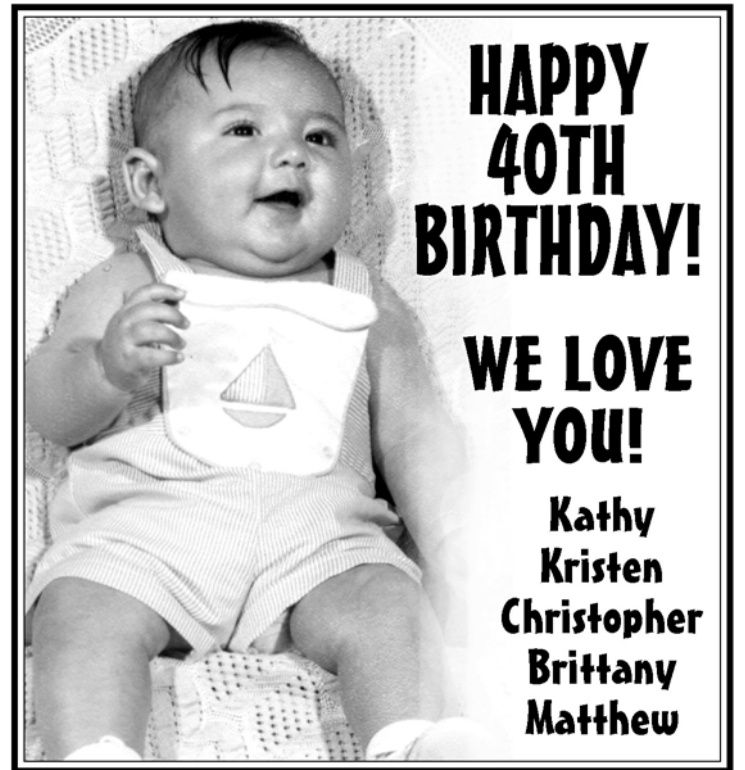

programs administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture under which the parties agree that all ad valorem taxes imposed on the owner's property may not be increased for the first five tax years after the tax year in which the agreement is entered into.

Amendment No. 6...
Authorizes the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation one motor vehicle owned by an individual and used in the course of the owner's occupation or profession and also for personal activities of the owner.

Amendment No. 7...
Allows governmental entities to sell property acquired through eminent domain back to the previous owners at the price the entities paid to acquire the property.

Amendment No. 8...
Clarifies certain provisions relating to the making of a home equity loan and use of home equity loan proceeds.

Amendment No. 9...
Authorizes the legislature

to exempt all or part of the residence homesteads of certain totally disabled veterans from ad valorem taxation and authorizing a change in the manner of determining the amount of the existing exemption from ad valorem taxation to which a disabled veteran is entitled.

Amendment No. 10...
Abolishes the constitutional authority for the office of inspector of hides and animals.

Amendment No. 11...
Require that a record vote be taken by a house of the legislature on final passage of any bill, other than certain local bills, of a resolution proposing or ratifying a constitutional amendment, or of any other nonceremonial resolution, and to provide for public access on the Internet to those record votes.

Amendment No. 12...
Provides for the issuance of general obligation bonds by the Texas Transportation Commission in an amount not to exceed \$5 billion to provide funding for highway improvement projects.

Amendment No. 13...
Authorizes the denial of bail to a person who violates certain court orders or conditions of release in a felony or family violence case.

Amendment No. 14...
Permits a justice or judge who reaches the mandatory retirement age while in office to serve the remainder of the justice's or judge's current term.

Amendment No. 15...
Requires the creation of the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas and authorizing the issuance of up to \$3 billion in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for research in Texas to find the causes of and cures for cancer.

Amendment No. 16...
The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$250 million to provide assistance to economically distressed areas.



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
