In another hearing this week the Texas Educational Commission recommended an increase in tuition for all students at-

tending any one of the state supported colleges and universities. It was recommended, above student and others protest, that the increase be set at an amount so that tuition fees would pay about 20% of the students' educational costs. Tuition is now \$100 per year (for the nine month term) for resi-

dent students and would be increased to \$125 or \$130 beginning in September 1959. Fees of the medical and dental schools would not be affected. A formula plan was introduced

BEFORE APRIL 1ST

Your License Plates may be put on at the time of purchase. Farmers may register Truck-Tractors as Farm Trucks.

Cars with out-of-state license must have 1958 Texas tags before 1959 tags may be sold for the cars, if the cars are registered any time before April 1.

All vehicles must bear 1959 tags by midnight of April 1, 1959.

To avoid delay and confusion bring your certificate of title and last year's registration receipt.

Your County Tax Collector is Required under the Law to Examine the Title and License Receipt before he can renew the registration of your vehicle.


