

## Engineer Fails To See Paving Gift

Harvey Smith, highway engineer, fails to see how citizens of Stratford can construe the paving of 1.6 miles of road connecting US. highways 54 and 287, as a gift to any person living along the road. "If you will just sit down and figure," Smith said, "You will find that any person living along that road will have to pay as much or more for paving in order to be in a position to use that road during muddy weather than those who live on any street in town and completely pay for their own paving."

Smith based his opinion on these facts. The 1.6 miles of road will be 56 feet wide from curb to curb. A strip of 8 inch base paving 22 feet wide which is built to carry heavy loads according to state specifications will be constructed in the center in a manner to make it acceptable to the state which is expected to take over the road for maintenance. It will be necessary for the drainage ditches along this road to be open at all times in order to protect the pavement. This means that people living along the road would have to pave a strip 17 feet wide along their frontage. This is only 1 foot less than residents living along the average city street pave in paving half of a street. Driveways on private property which would enable these citizens to use the road as a street would in all probability place them in a position of paying more of a paving bill than those living on most of the more central streets of the city.

The above discussion was one of the points which have been brought out during the consideration of the proposed paving project in Road District Four.

The other stretch of pavement under consideration in Road District Four is the 11.4 miles of road extending north to the Oklahoma line. The bond election in Road District Four for the approval or rejection of \$210,000 in bonds to pave the proposed roads will be held May 16.

### 12 1/6 Miles Paving In Road District 3

Approximately 12 1/6 miles of paving are being considered in Road District Three. The election in which the voters of this district will have the opportunity to approve or reject the issuance of \$220,000.000 for completion of the project will be held May 16.

Roscoe Dyess, county commissioner of precinct one which comprises road district three, located the proposed paving project as follows: (1) Beginning at the end of FM2014 and extending south for a distance of five miles to an intersection with a county road, (2) Beginning at a point on the above described road two miles south of the end of FM2014 and extending West one and two-thirds miles to the Dallam County line, (3) Beginning at a point on US 287 approximately 10 1/2 miles southeast of Stratford and extending a distance of five and one-half miles to the precinct line.

Harold Gray held the mask and drove with one hand to E-tter where he stopped as a man was just getting out of his car and asked for help. The E-tter man leaped into the ambulance and held the oxygen mask during the remainder of the trip to the hospital.

Mr. Smith was born March 27, 1908, in Oklahoma. He came to Stratford from Dimmitt four years ago as an employee of the Texas Highway Department. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

If a Notre Dame professor is right, one of man's greatest problems may be solved soon—prevention of the common cold.

A vaccine which will prevent from 60 to 70 per cent of all common colds will probably be available within the next two years, Dr. Thomas G. Ward, professor of virology at Notre Dame University predicts.

An expert in cold research, Dr. Ward says that a vaccine can be developed against "an acceptable proportion of the common colds." But he does not believe that common colds will be wiped out, even with an adequate vaccine.

"People are not going to take the vaccine, just as they are not taking polio vaccine . . ." he said. "People are people and we have great difficulty in selling preventive medicine. The prevention of disease is not as glamorous or as consuming to the individual as his actual illness."

From 70 to 80 per cent of common colds are caused by a group of viruses or a group of ordinary bacteria of the streptococcus type, he said. Others may be al-

## Finding Golfers Sewer Oil Seep Feast Tues.

Crank case oil in comparatively large quantities is finding its way into the City Sewer System. This situation has threatened to destroy the settling plant of the city sewer system three times since the first of the year. Oil in the settling plant of the sewer system stops the action of bacteria. Unless the oil can be pumped from the system, the disposal plant will have to be drained and operation started over again.

City officials believe that the crank case oil is finding its way into the system through the carelessness of someone who would not think of destroying the sewer system were they aware of the damage they are doing.

Persons engaged in the draining of oil from cars and tractors, and those who have stations for this purpose, are requested to take necessary steps to prevent further overflow of oil into the sewer system.

### Tax Bill Hits Snags In House

(By J. L. Bass Jr.) The House turned down speedy action on the big new broad-base tax bill by a vote of 102 to 33. This was HB 727.

Speaker Waggoner Carr, who has backed the new bills as a substitute for the Governor's tax bill pleaded with House members to start work on the matter this week so that it could go to the Senate next week. Motions to hear the bill on Friday failed, then the motion to hear the bill on Thursday afternoon failed. The final motion was to hear the bill on Monday, April 20, which also failed.

Carr said members could completely rewrite the bill if they wanted to, but they should do something quickly if a tax measure is to be enacted before the May 12 adjournment date.

Opponents of the speed up plea said the bill had just been printed and had just reached their desk and they needed time to read and study it. One representative pleaded for time to go home and talk to the constituents. The motion to take the bill up on Monday got a simple majority of 74-68, but the proposal lacked the required two thirds.

Some members were saying that the hastily prepared tax bill was so harsh that it made a general retail sales tax look good. The bill, with taxes ranging from building a barn to eating a cafe meal, could well mean a special session.

Rep. Ben Lewis of Dallas charged that the bill was a deliberate attempt to get a general sales tax enacted by first writing an "obnoxious" bill. A complete substitute for the bill will be offered by Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas.

Atwell's substitute is similar to the Pennsylvania selective sales tax law and would put a flat 3% tax on a large number of things sold at retail. Such things as: motor parts, furs, construction materials, furnish-

HB 32 which is called the "ESCHEAT" bill has had its third reading before the House and will be up soon for passage. The bill would allow estates to escheat and be transferred to the state and then sold if unclaimed. Legally the property already belongs to the state, but the state does not get to use the funds and cannot be accounted as state funds. Also, as it stands the companies holding the money get free use of it.

Proponents of the bill say that it will save the taxpayers \$20,000,000 just because the state will have use of the funds. An added feature of the bill is that in the event owners should be discovered, they are permitted to recover, and therefore the bill protects anyone mistakenly thought to be dead or any heirs later discovered. A reserve fund is maintained at all times to assure prompt payment of all claims.

Thirty-six States have similar laws, and this uniform law is recommended by the American Bar Association, the Council of State Governments and the Commission on Uniform State Laws.

Mr. Buchanan's HB 271, ratifying, confirming and validating the designation of the boundary lines of the Dallam County Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, has passed the Senate and is awaiting the Governor's signature. Also awaiting the Governor's signature is HB 498 which was sponsored jointly by Mr. Buchanan and Rep. R. C. Slack of District 104. The bill relates to the taking or killing of pronged-horn antelope and wild elk, and confers the
