The test is the first step in competition for Merit Scholarships provided by some 90 corporations, foundations, professional societies and individuals, as well as by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation itself.

Some \$15 million in Merit Scholarships has been awarded in the first four years of the pro-

The number of scholarships awarded in any year depends upon the extent of sponsor participation. The basic continuing program is for one million dollars a year (for ten annual programs). In addition, sponsor participation this year is expected to add about two million dollars more in sponsored Merit Scholarships. It is estimated

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test is a three hour measure of educational development and college aptitude. Emphasis is on broad intellectual skills, and on understanding and ability to use what has been learned, rather than on sheer knowledge of facts.
