

Iraq: A sad, scary place for service personnel and Iraqis

Iraq is scary sometimes, but usually just sad. Last night, as I was lying in bed, I heard mortars landing somewhere in the distance, followed by about 20 minutes of return artillery fire, along with the very familiar sound of an F-16 plugging in the afterburner... probably to get the guys who were firing the mortar rounds.

These are the moments that impact me the most. As life. I lay in bed listening to the sounds of war I said, "I hope no one dies," a silly hope under the circumstances I suppose.

But then the realization that someone will.

incredible young soldiers will be one of their families on the receiving end of that dreaded phone call that stops life dead in its tracks.

Or maybe it will be an insurgent's family that gets has died - just as sad for sure I suppose, though the death of an insurgent means life for women and children who are saved from the bus bomb that dead man might have planted, or the mortar fired on a rival neighborhood, or the suicide vest worn into busy morning market.





Hot Mustard Sauce, the Universe, and God's Love

This column is not about hot mustard sauce; it just starts with it—the stuff you find in most Chinese restaurants.

I think it's mis-labeled. I know a little something about food and a little something about words, and I don't think "hot" is the right word. Jalapeño peppers are hot. Really spicy hot sauce, not the stuff you can drink like tomato juice, is hot.

But that mustard sauce, laced full of horseradish, isn't

just hot, it's more on the order of "explosive." And the really amazing thing about it is that it's a delayed detonation sort of explosive.

It's not really "hot"; it's more like "nuclear." In the right amounts, I really like the kick.

But if you wander into a bit of fried rice or egg roll laced with just a tad too much of it, well, for a moment, everything seems fine. Then, slowly at first, that mustard begins to detonate until it feels like inside your head a forest fire with hundred-mile-per-hour winds

has just vaporized your brain. A nuclear mushroom cloud has just filled your mind, and every bit of DNA in every cell in your cranium has just been scorched to ash. All of your thoughts are suddenly focused and purified as with a refiner's fire, just like all of your sinuses because no matter what method of final disposal you prefer for the rest of

your body, your head has just been effectively cremated.

I wandered across some words this week that worked in my mind a little like that mustard sauce.

In his book Disappointment With God, Philip Yancey shares this quote from Annie Dillard: "You do not have to sit outside in the dark. If, however, you want to look at the stars, you will find that darkness is required. The stars neither require nor demand it."

Take a bite of that. At first taste, you think, "Fine, that's true." Then it begins to detonate and the mushroom cloud of truth grows, and you think, "Wow! That is SO true!"

I know nothing about the context of Dillard's words, but Philip Yancey was writing a truly fine book about what happens when we're "disappointed with God."

We're disappointed with God because of suffering or tragedy. We're dealing with pain. We're experiencing depression. We're down and almost out. Maybe we haven't gone completely down the road to despair, but you can surely see it from where we are. And I hear Dillard and Yancey reminding us that stars appear in the sky not in the daytime but in the darkness.

Thank God indeed, we don't have to spend all of our time in dark and difficult days. But when we're walking through dark times, it's good to remember the lesson of the stars. God's love is there for us always, but some of the deepest and most beautiful facets of his love are only visible to our human eyes in times of darkness.







foods for fairly long periods of time. These processes keep us fed through periods of cold, snowy weather, as well as periods of drought. We have many more choices of foods all year long and it helps us to keep


Milk is an important part of our diet, but it could spoil easily. We pasteurize it to kill harmful organisms. To keep it longer, we refrigerate it, can it, box it, dry it or powder it! We even change it into cheese or butter.






To keep foods for later use, we need to keep them from spoiling for as long as we can. Read the clues and fill in this puzzle with the methods we use to preserve food.



for drv. mild weather during the ginning season, partially because with high temperatures comes an increase in static electricity, which can cause problems in itself.

"It's a challenge," Flores said, "it's different every year."

Along with the varying weather conditions, Flores said the wide variety of cotton seeds, and picking methods impact the ginning process.

Whereas there were only a couple of varieties 30 years ago, Flores said there are 10 times that number in use today, and many of them have different characteristics when it comes to preparing them for market.

Generally, stripper cotton produces larger seeds, more easily removed seeds, Flores explained, but accumulate more trash and sticks during harvest. While picker varieties probably produce more, and accumulate less trash, but apparently produce smaller seeds that are harder to emove.

"There's always a new variety that gins different," he said. "They're different

All-in-all, about a third of a module remains after the cleaning process, with the trash and burrs exiting on one side of the gin's metal building, and the seeds exiting to a much smaller

pile on the other.

The gin buys the cotton gas heaters, inceasing the seeds from the cotton farmers and either sells them for feed to area dairies. Flores said he hopes or sells them to cotton oil companies.

About this year, and with the nine years ago, Flores said, the gin replaced its 1950s era equipment, and the gin is automated, but he added that it is getting more and more difficult to find young workers who want to make it a tradition, as has the Flores family.

According to Flores, his father, Hector Flores, Sr., had 30 years experience before he retired.
