

Reveals Plans For Two-County College

A two-county junior college for Sherman and Moore Counties could be established and maintained to a worthwhile advantage, according to a survey completed by Dr. C. C. Colvert, professor and consultant for junior and senior colleges and universities at the University of Texas. Dr. Colvert's findings were revealed at a luncheon held in the Sneed Hotel in Dumas Tuesday.

The proposed two-county junior college would be erected in Dumas and buses would be operated to take other students within the two county area and from college daily.

According to Dr. Colvert, a recent survey he completed among the graduates, revealed that they were primarily interested in vocational training. Girls of the area were interested in courses in secretarial work, beauty operator courses, pre-nursing and pre-teaching training. Boys desired courses in farming and ranching with the most popular course requested being that of automotive repair. The beauty of a junior college is that it is controlled at a local level and can offer the courses desired by the young people of the territory.

Adults may take advantage of the courses taught in night school.

The general attitude of adults at the present time seems to be that they would not object to paying the taxes for maintaining the junior college if they were certain the young people of the territory would take advantage of the institution for the advancement of their education.

The double ring ceremony was performed May 21 in the presence of the parents of the bride and bridegroom, and a few close friends.

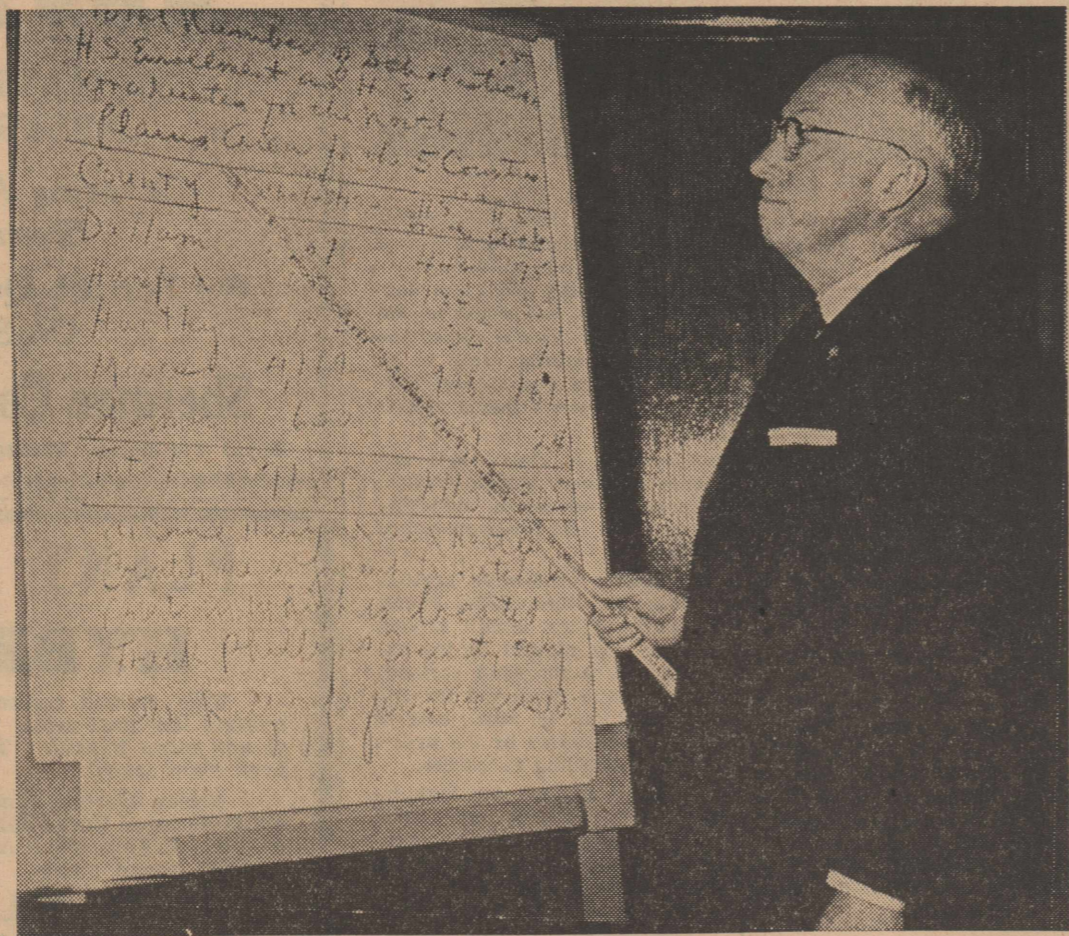

Precinct One Makes Bid For Paved Roads

Taxpayers in Precinct One, whose boundaries comprise Road District Three, have petitioned the Commissioners' Court for a hearing on a \$106,000 road bond issue for new paving within the road district.

The petition will be heard by the Commissioners' Court in Stratford at 10:00 a. m. on Wednesday, June 10. At that time citizens of the road district may offer information and speak for or against the calling of an election to decide the paving issue.

A previous proposal for the amount of \$220,000 in Road District Three, failed by only a small number of votes. County Commissioner Roscoe

Dyess was not available for comment on the roads which have been designated for paving under the new proposed bond issue.

In their meeting June 10, the Commissioners' Court will hear the proposed petition, and if evidence is presented which seems feasible, an election will be ordered which will give the taxpayers of the road district an opportunity to approve or reject the bond issue which would pave additional roads in the district.

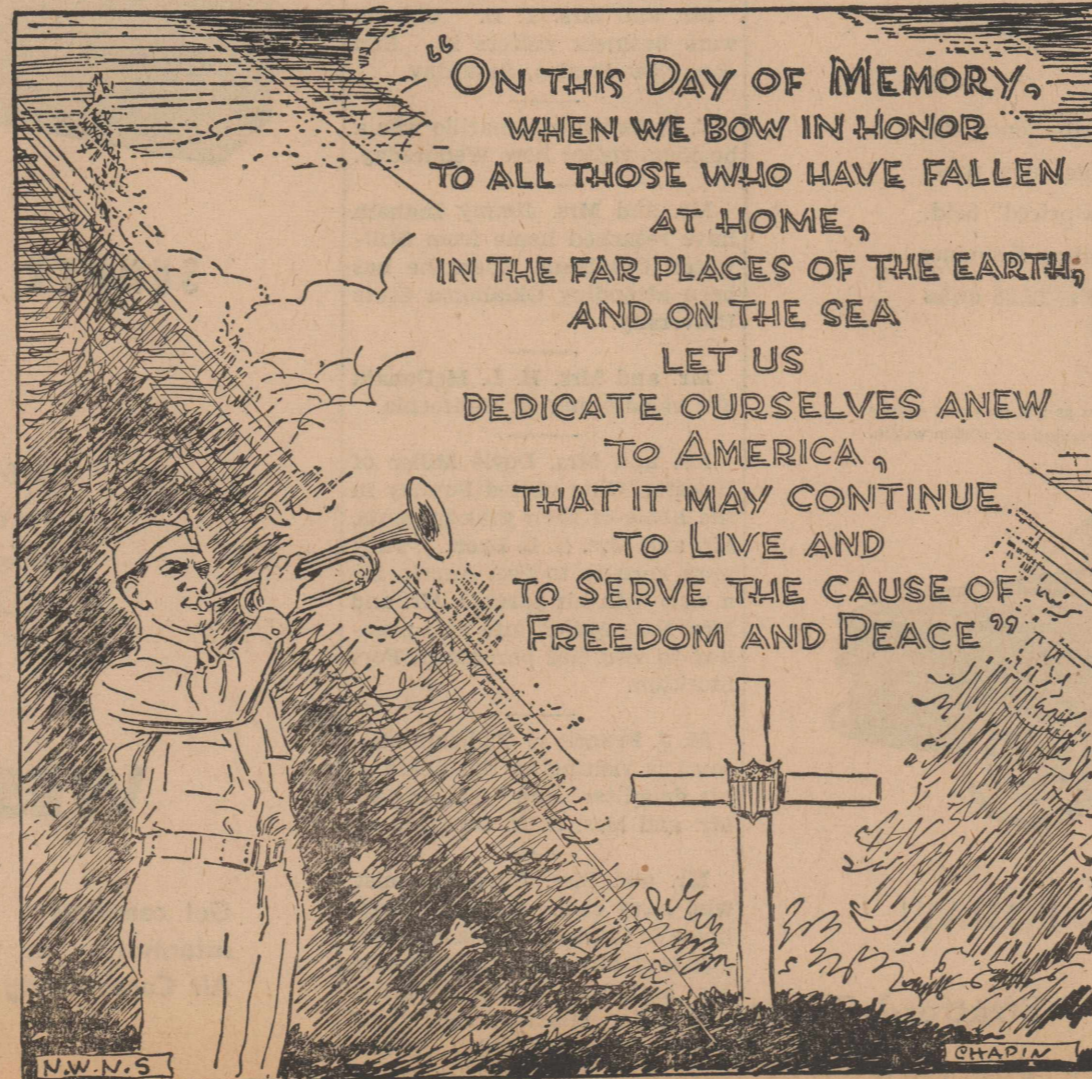

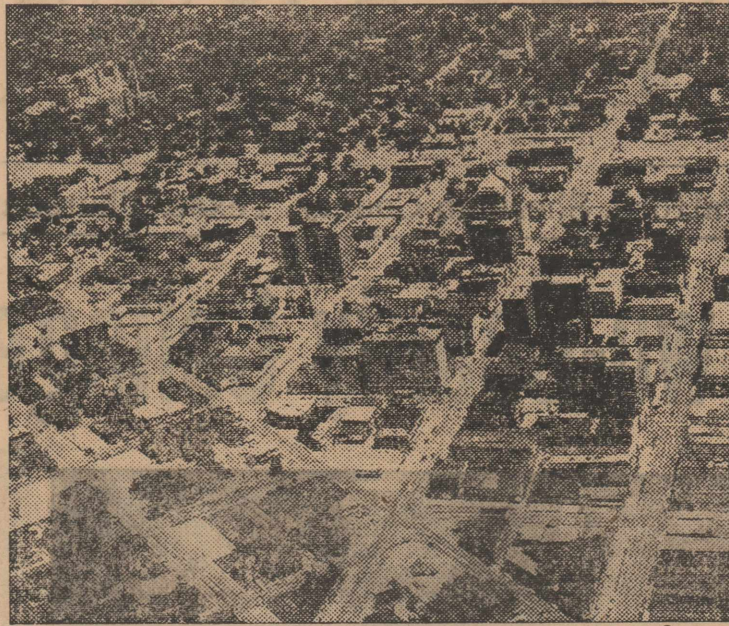

Peoria, Illinois

Settled in 1691, Peoria is believed to be the oldest settlement in the State of Illinois. Strategically located 147 miles southwest of Chicago on the Illinois, Peoria abounds with historical tradition, having lived under the flag of four nations. Louis Joliet and Pere Marquette headed the French party which lived for a few weeks on the shores of Lake Peoria in 1673. Ninety years later, France ceded the Illinois county to Great Britain. The English regime came to an end when George Rogers Clark routed the British. For a short time in 1781 Peoria was in the hands of the Spanish, but within a matter of weeks, U. S. troops again gained control.

Peoria has the distinction of being the "Earth Moving Machinery Capital of the world" and also the home of the "World's Largest Beverage Distillery."

The city ranks fifth among all cities of the United States for its railway location. It is the terminal point for 15 railroads, nine of them major lines.

Third largest city in the State, and number one city in downstate Illinois, Peoria is known as the "Convention City of the Middle-west"—a favorite meeting place for many state, regional and national groups.

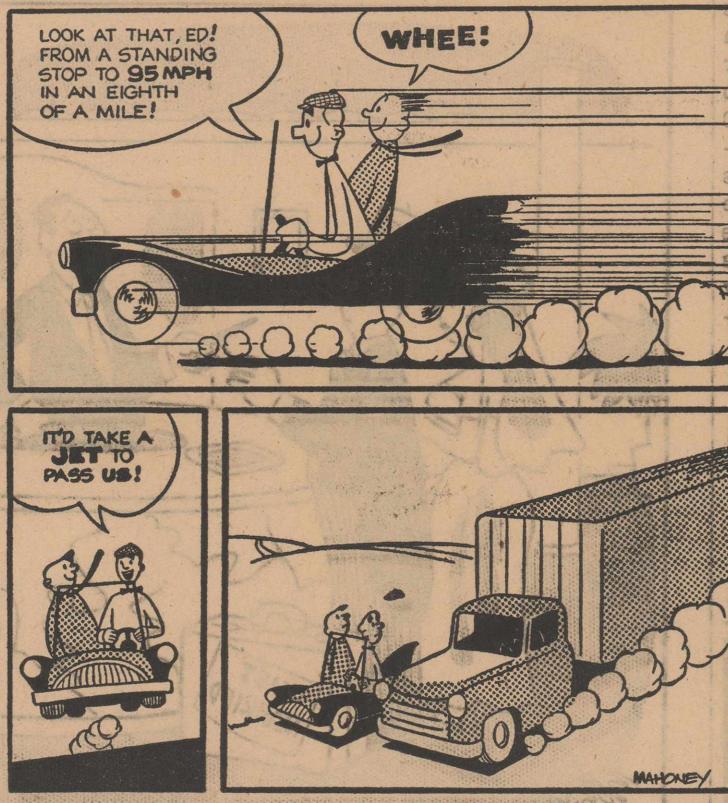

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Wheat Committeemen Called To Washington

Kenneth Kendrick of Stratford, Glyn Bayne of Washington state, Gib Egbert of Kansas, and Herb Hughes of Nebraska, who compose the National Wheat Program Committee of the National Wheat Growers Association, were called to Washington, D. C. Tuesday by Floyd Root of Oregon, president of the National Wheat Growers Association. Committeemen will assist President Root in placing the best possible wheat bill before the House and Senate Conference Committee.

The problem facing the wheat grower is how to reduce the production of wheat in the United States and at the same time to maintain the income of the growers at some where near the present level.

Crucial legislation for the coming wheat program is expected to be enacted this week.

A bill before the senate gives the wheat farmer three choices of attempting to solve the wheat

problem. One would keep seeded acreage at the present 55 million acre level and provide price supports at 65% of parity. Another would cut the allotment acreage 10% and provide price supports at 75% of parity. A third choice would be to reduce allotment acreage 20% and establish price supports to 80% of parity. No price support crops which would be taken out of wheat production. The proposed measure would tighten up controls and provide a penalty of twice the normal yield of the actual field for overseeding.

A House bill now under consideration would reduce wheat allotment acreage 25% and establish a support price of 90% of parity. Another bill would remove all acreage controls and drop the support price for wheat to 50% of parity. No price supported crops would be planted to acreage taken out of wheat

in the event the first proposal is adopted.

In the event of the adoption of the first proposal, a penalty of twice the normal yield of the field, would be provided for over seeding acreage.

House and Senate agricultural committeemen were expected to meet in a conference committee today in an attempt to work out an agreement on the proposed legislation which has been introduced in an attempt to solve the wheat production problem.

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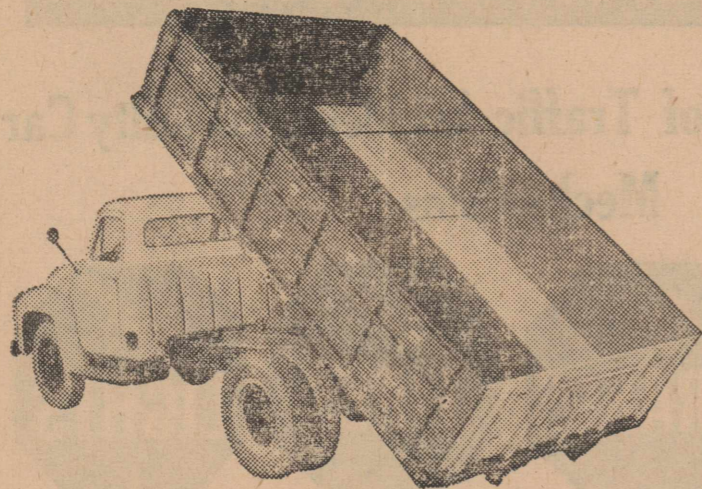

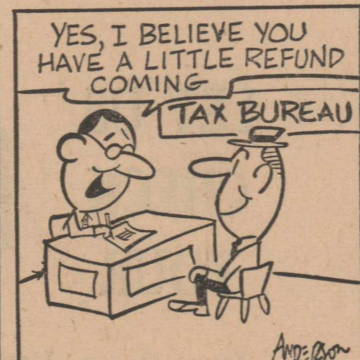
