





The three largest sources of state revenue are federal aid, highway motor fuel taxes and crude oil taxes (in that order). A large portion of the remainder of state government revenue comes from select sales taxes. One interesting fact revealed by the chart is the amount of revenue yielded by the natural gas tax. Five other states (New York, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio and Illinois) collect from two to pine times as much in taxes ner thousand cubic feet on Texas and Illinois) collect from two to nine times as much in taxes per thousand cubic feet on Texas. natural gas as Texas itself collects.
