

Commissioner Riggs Works At Girls State

Jessie Jean Riggs of Stratford, a Citizen of Bluebonnet Girls State now in progress in Austin, at the Texas School for the Blind, was elected County Commissioner of Precinct 1 of her county. She has been assigned to the Nationalist party and is residing and voting in her county.

Jessie, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Riggs, was sponsored to Girls State by the local Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary.

The 1959 session of Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of 94 girls held at Baylor University in 1941, to become the biggest single extracurricular educational program for high school girls in Texas. This year, a full quota of 400 girls, the largest number which can be presently accommodated at the Texas School for the Blind, are in attendance, making a total of almost 5,000 girls who have participated in this top level citizenship training program. Citizens are selected at the local levels on a basis of character and leadership from students who have completed their junior year in high school each year.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and non-political, the purpose of the program is to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age, to afford them an opportunity to live together as a self-governing group and to inform them of the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults.

They learn the problems of government by performing the same duties as real office holders in the everyday world. Each day's activity begins at 7:30 a. m. with flag raising.

All is not work, however, and there is a lot of fun thrown in. Periods of recreation and rest are provided and devotionals are held each evening just prior to "light out." Talent and music are given an important part in each day's participation; always looked forward to is stunt night; a tour of historical landmarks and interesting sights of the Capitol City of Austin, including the Governor's Mansion is made; lunch is served one day on the Capitol grounds and an annual picnic and swimming party is held at Barton Springs. Wheat Harvest Machines Roll

Wheat has continued pouring into Stratford elevators from dry-land fields over the territory. Local showers Monday and Tuesday evenings halted operations in many fields until noon of the following days. Yields reported averaged 18 to 20 bushels per acre.

No combines have been reported in operation in irrigation wheat fields in the immediate area. Harvest in South Plains wheat fields is from 45% to 90% complete.

Normal yields are expected in most of the Northern Panhandle area and no shortages of men or equipment is expected. Damage caused by root rot has reduced the yield on some 10,000 acres in Potter County. Some acreage has been abandoned due to this disease.

An Oklahoma bulletin states that harvest activities are 50 to 85% complete in the central portions of the state.

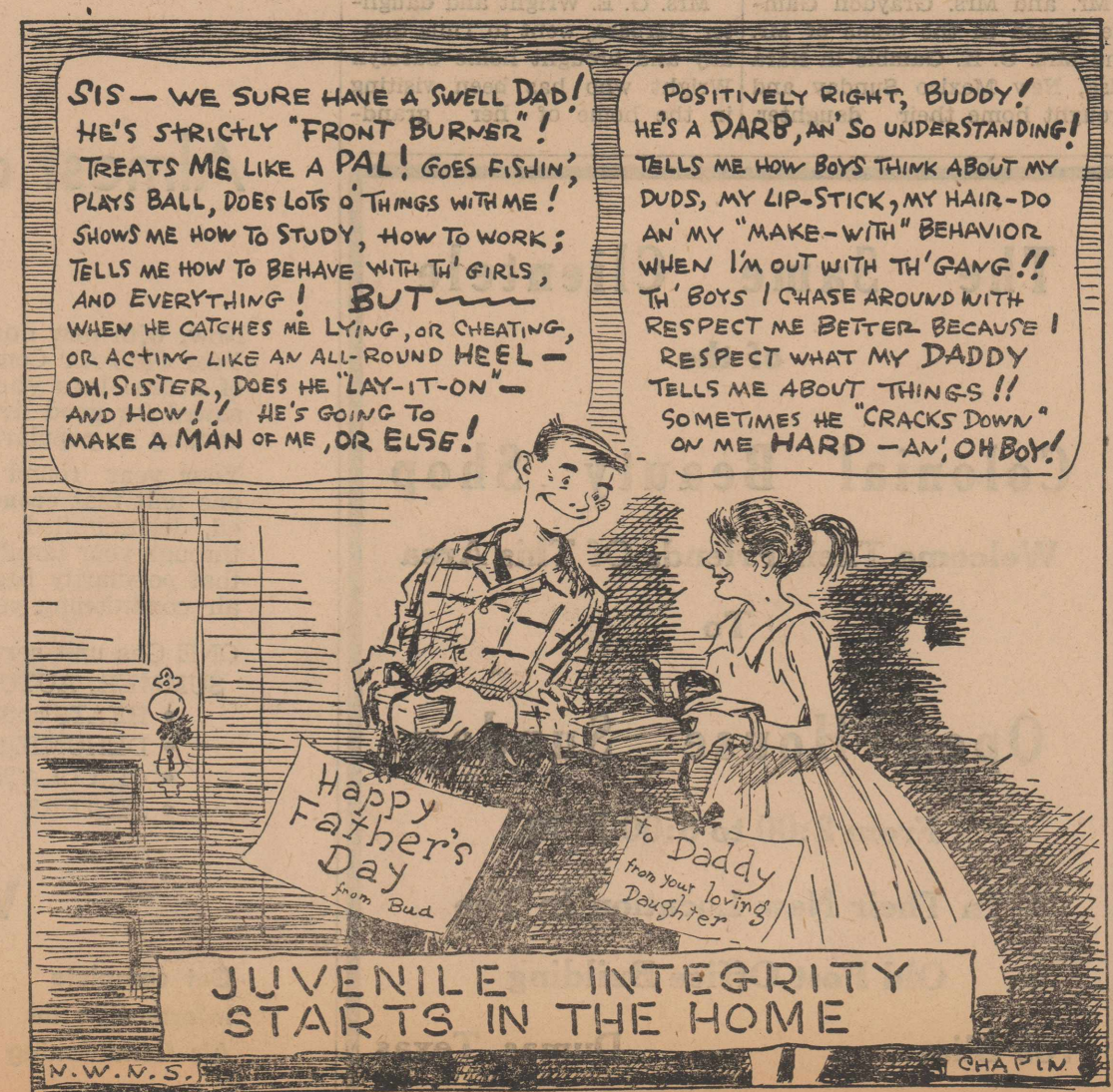

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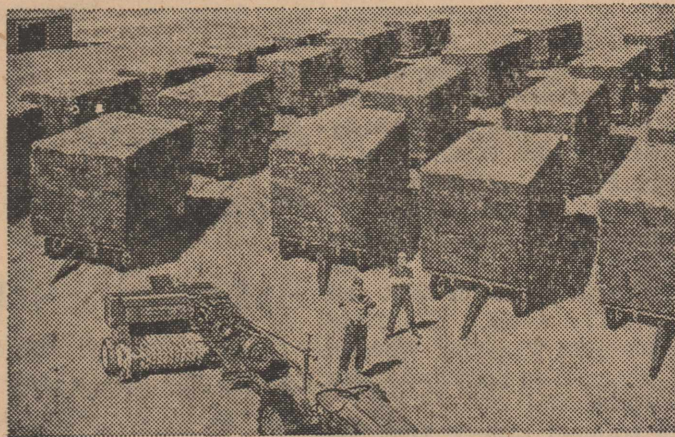
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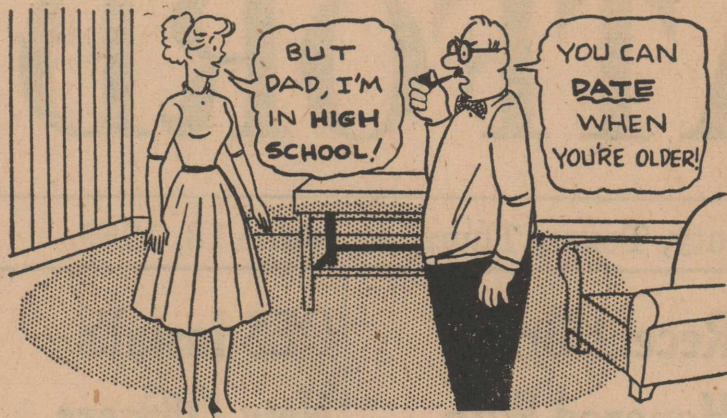

When Is Teenage Girl Ready For "Dates"?

A teenage girl wants to know how to bring parents "up to date." She writes: "I am 16 and constantly have offers from nice, smart and mannerly boys for 'dates.' My parents are opposed to my dating and say 'all boys are alike' (and I disagree). They say I can date when I am older, and they won't have anything to say about it. Other girls my age are sneaking out when their parents won't let them date. I don't want to do this, and talking to my par-

ents only leads to arguments. Is it hopeless?"
Certainly, it shouldn't be hopeless. In this day and age the girl who reaches 16 without having "dates" is a rarity. Whether parents like it or not, many teenagers start dating before they are sixteen, and really too young for anything except "dates" for a birthday party or school affair. A girl of 16 is—and should be—a young lady. She is almost out of high school and, chances are, she

will then take a job where she meets the "public" every day—both the male and the female public. At this age, the girl should have a certain amount of self-confidence in meeting and dealing with "people"—and she has this confidence if she has participated in social as well as scholastic activities during her school years.

A girl of 16 is old enough to have dates and the parent who refuses to allow a girl of this age to have so much as a "date" for a school dance or a movie with another couple or two, is making a mistake.

Some parents have a great fear of their children getting into the "wrong kind of company" and getting "into trouble." What they really do is shirk the responsibility of seeing that their children keep the right kind of company by forbidding them to have anything to do with the opposite sex. They consider it the "easy way out"—but it is the wrong way.

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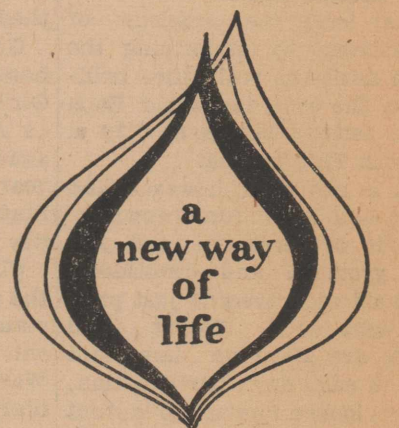

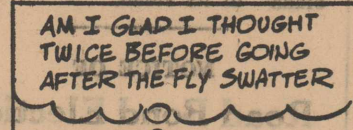

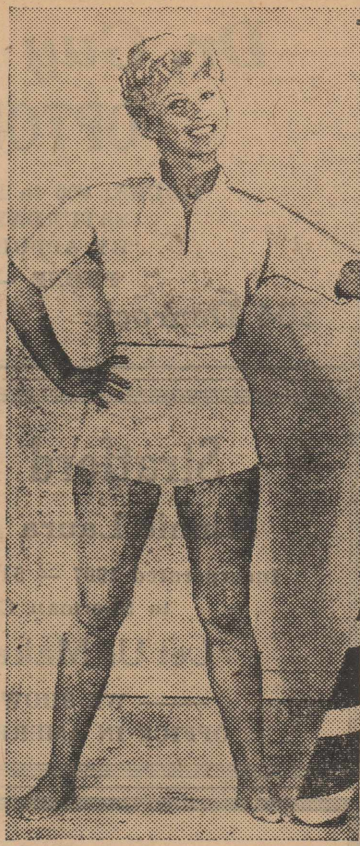
