# PRECINCT ONE WILL VOTE ON ROAD Bond Issue Saturday

Voters in Precinct One will approve or reject a \$106,000.00 road bond issue Saturday. The proposed bond issue would pave 61/2 miles of road in the precinct.

According to specifications of the petition, the bond issue would pave from a point at the end of the pavement on Farmto-Market road 2014 for a distance of two miles south, and west for a distance of 1.5 miles. The proposed paving would also extend FM2014 for an additional distance of three miles to the south.

A two-third majority vote is required for the bond issue to carry. In the event the qualified taxpaying voters approve the bonds, they will be issued at a rate not to exceed 4% interest and will be retired within a period of 10 years from taxes levied on property within the road district.

The election will be held in the Bob Burgess garage, located 16 miles southeast of Stratford. George Bradley will be the presiding judge of the election and Bob Burgess will serve as an election judge.

Precinct One is designated as Road District 3.

Texas wheat growers are reminded by Searcy Ferguson, chairman, State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, that July 23 is referendum day. They will join wheat farmers in 38 other states in the voting to decide the type

of marketing control program Ferguson pointed out that

the referendum was being held at this time so that farmers will know at winter wheat planting time whether or not marketing restrictions will be in effect at harvest time in 1960.

A two-thirds majority of the votes cast will be required to keep marketing quotas in effect, proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture as required by law and the July 23 referendum will determine whether or not they are continued.

Farmers who comply with their individual farm wheat acreage allotments may market their entire crop without penalty and are eligible for price support at the 75 percent of parity rate ton, Susan Upchurch, Ethel when marketing quotas are in effect. A grower who exceeds his allotment will be subject to marketing quota penalties on his excess wheat except that workmanship in the making of any grower may produce up to 15 acres for harvest as grain without penalty.

> If marketing quotas are voted down, there will be no restrictions on wheat marketings. But price support will be available at 50 percent of parity to farmers who comply with their acreage allotments.

The marketing quota penalty rate will be announced later Chairman Ferguson said. It is \$1.07 per bushel for 1959-crop wheat. to 8:00 p.m. On our way to see Rex and Shirley at Bamberg, we drove to Wertheim on the Main River, near Wurzburg. I had spent nearly two weeks there earlier in the year, and had wanted Letha to see the picturesque little town. We drove through Wurzburg, one of the really old towns of Germany. Conspicuous on a steep, vine-clad hill 425 feet above the river is the massive Marienberg, or Bishop's Castle, one of the finest surviving examples of medieval fortress-castles. We didn't tour it, but we wish now that we had. It seemed the short ride to Bamberg was going to take forever. We enjoyed very much the overnight visit with Rex and Shirley, and short visit with Herman, Anita, and their new baby on the way home. All in all, we drove a total of 800 miles on the trip and averaged 34 miles per gallon. We were fortunate, particularly in Europe, not to have been involved in an accident in this many miles of driving. Our total expense for the trip will crowd \$100, including the food we purchased prior to leaving, and film development. Half of this amount was spent on our two-day jaunt to London. We are convinced now that camping is the answer to cheap, yet sat-We ran into no particular language barrier on the entire trip. Nearly everyone who has the opportunity to come into contact with travelers has learned some English, if no more than, just enough to successfuly run his business for the benefit of the Englishspeaking people. With the exception of Germany, excluding the autobahns, many of the roads of Western Europe will rival those in many states of America. Germany has the most sub-standard roads of any we traveled on the trip. And the small car is certainly an advantage in traveling in Europe. Many of the roads will not accomodate two large-sized cars meeting head on and many of the towns have ancient streets that are too narrow for the modern age. Utilizing almost every mode of travel except flying, we are able to add 2,000 more miles to our travels in Europe.
