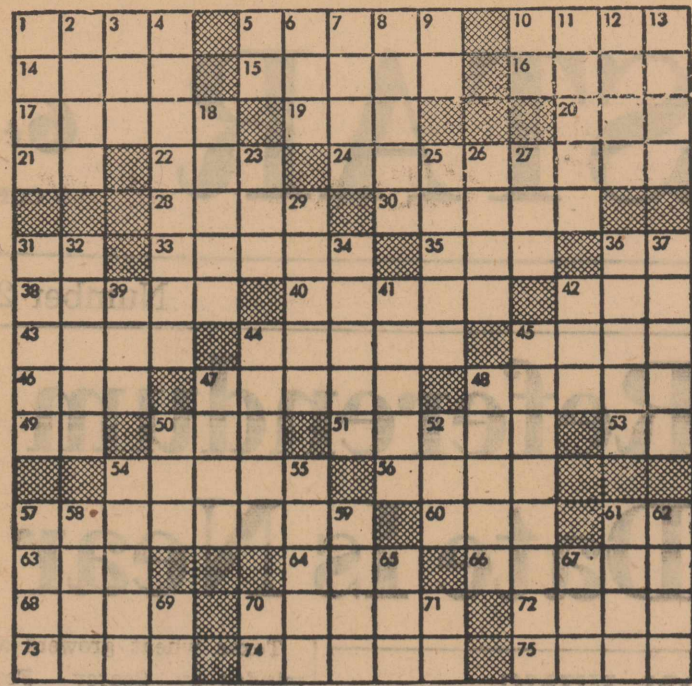


CROSSWORD PUZZLE

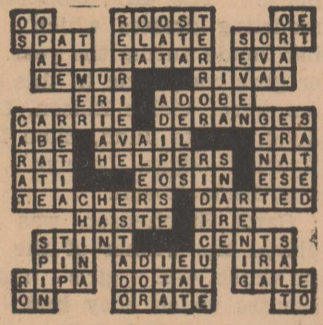

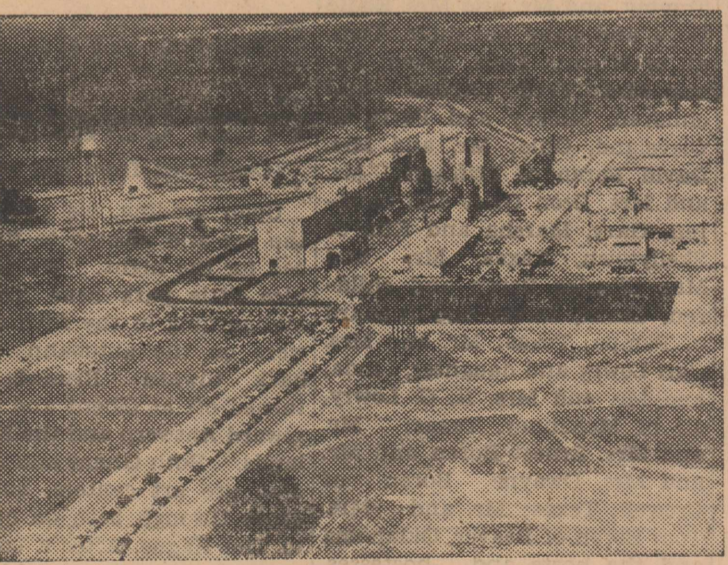

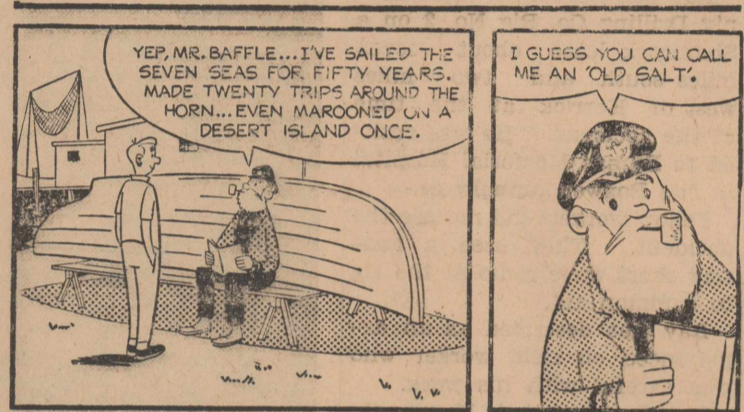
This An' That

AMERICANA Cities To See Pine Bluff, Arkansas



Pine Bluff paper mill. The city of Pine Bluff is the industrial hub of Arkansas and that State's fourth city. Pine Bluff was incorporated in 1839 and the first census in 1850 established the population as 400. By 1900, the combination of a general westward movement, fertile river lands, forests and county seat activity jumped the population to 11,496. By 1953, the population was almost 50,000. Pine Bluff is the leading cotton market between Memphis and Dallas, and ranks second as a livestock concentration point in the state. Although cotton and its by-products are the primary crops, a diversified farm program has been very successful. Rice growing is a major crop and irrigation a general practice. Fish farming as a rice rotation program is becoming a major enterprise. The early history of Pine Bluff began with the activities of Joseph Bonne, a Frenchman, who was the first white settler. He had been an interpreter with the U.S. Commissioner in making a treaty in 1818 with the friendly Quapaw Indians, who were here in pre-territorial days when the land was under French and Spanish flags.

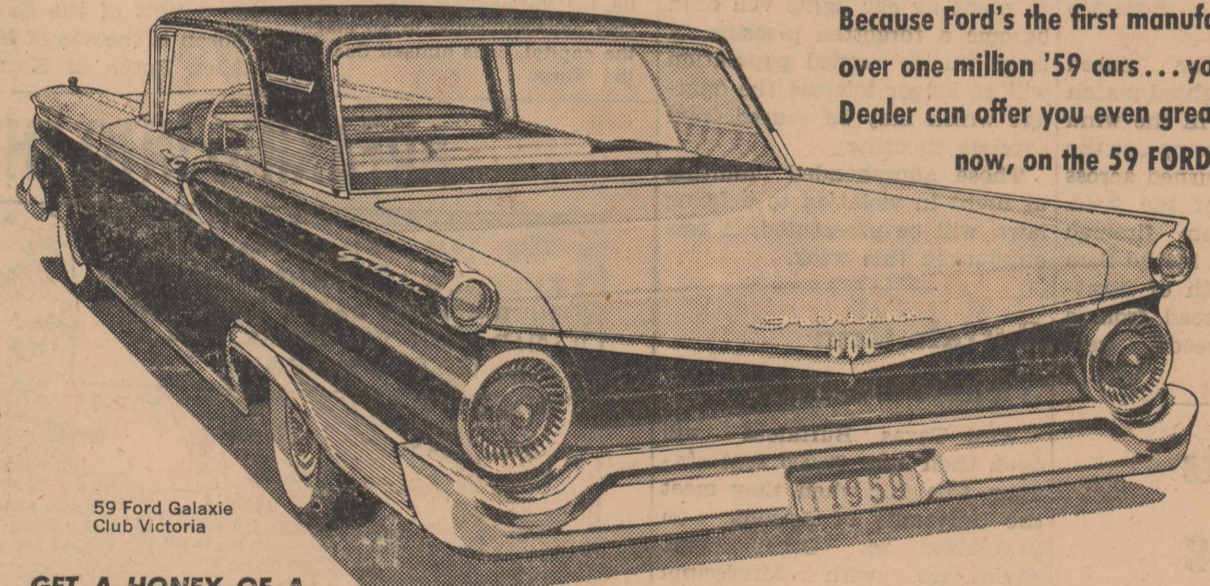


EASY DOES IT

Bean and Frank Round-Up (Serves 6)
4 slices cooked bacon
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
2 1-pound cans red kidney beans
1 8-ounce can tomato sauce
1 1/2 tablespoons chili powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups grated sharp Cheddar cheese
6 frankfurters, sliced
Cook onion and green pepper in 2 tablespoons reserved bacon drippings. Combine with all other ingredients in 3-quart saucepan. Cover and heat slowly for 15 to 20 minutes or until hot, stirring occasionally.

at a cafe and passed the time of day with him.

Our next stop was at Keukenhof Gardens, the royal gardens of Holland. In tulip time, they are the epitome of beauty and tulips. Due to the early spring this year in Europe, the tulips were in their advance stages when we got to see them. There were still acres of beautiful tulips, but we could see remnants of millions of others. During our drive through Holland at this late date, we saw only one field of them. We were disappointed that we had missed one of the greatest single attractions in Europe. We spent that night on the famous Zandvoort beach, just south of Haarlam.

In Haarlam, we finally found the film we had been hunting since we had arrived in London. From Haarlam, to Amsterdam, and then north to cross the narrow strip of land which separates the IJsselmeer from the Waddensee at the very northern tip of Holland. All the land we saw from Amsterdam around to the east side of Holland reminded us of being back in good old West Texas. It was the flattest ground we have seen since leaving Texas.

At this time, we began to get anxious to see Rex and Shirley, whom we had promised to see on Saturday, so we drove as far as we could that day. Just short of Venlo, Holland, our first rain began to fall. We drove all the way to Heerlen, in the very southern corner of Holland, in some heavy rain. We noticed several camping sites in the vicinity of Valkenburg, a small village just outside Heerlen. We didn't know until the next morning exactly what we had discovered. We did some shopping prior to departing. We had not at this time found Letha an elephant for her collection. In attempting to find our road to Aachen, Germany, we became involved in what is known as real backwoods trails. Some of them were hardly big enough for a bicycle, let alone the car. We enjoyed some of the most beautiful scenery on the whole trip through, and we are planning to return to Valkenburg for a week end before we go home. And it was castle country too. Inside the town of Valkenburg was a big castle with a cross on top, lighted at night by neon.

Our agenda for the next day called for a ride down the Rhine and then as far west as we could go. We drove from Aachen, also a great industrial center now as before the war, to Cologne (Koln), home of one

of the most famous churches in the world. We spent an hour admiring the work in and on the cathedral. We prefer the one at Ulm in comparison, however. The distance from Bonn to Koblenz, further up (south) the Rhine, is a total of 60 kilometers, or approximately 38 miles. This distance took us 2 hours and 45 minutes. There are several contributing factors: the narrow winding roads of Germany, the many small villages scattered along the river, the many trucks which use this route, and the many stretches of construction. Another unpleasant thing along this line

was the rain which fell constantly from Bonn to Koblenz. Until we became shrouded in moisture, the scenery was beautiful. Hills dominated at the peaks by castles, palaces or monasteries line both sides of the river as far as you may travel the Rhine. We had decided that we wanted to visit a castle on a hill overlooking the Lahn River, a tributary to the Rhine, just across from Koblenz. The castle dates from the 13th century and was the scene of many a famous fight and rendezvous in German history. It is said that the last of the Knights

Templar took their stand here. We enjoyed the visit through the castle, conducted by a young German lad. He spoke little English. This castle is situated on Lahnberg (berg meaning mountain) and overlooks the Lahn River many feet straight below. It is well kept, but has not been reconstructed or over-repaired like many here. Much of the castle is exactly as it could easily have been left centuries ago. We crossed the Rhine at this point and drove to the autobahn thinking to make more time. We had no sooner opened up the car

for a nice little cruise, when we could see cars in front of us stopping. Rounding the next curve, we could see traffic lined up as far as you could

see. It was almost an hour before we could get past a narrow section under repair. We got as far as Darmstadt before (Continued on Page 8)

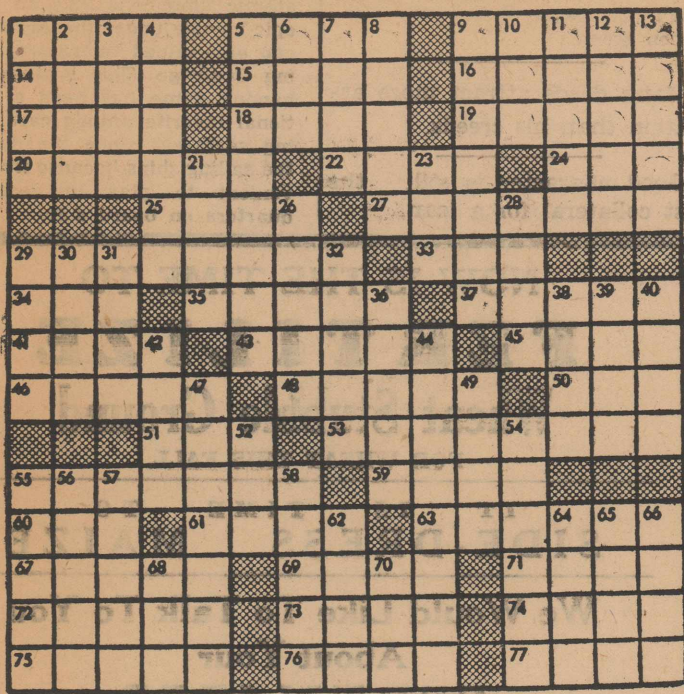

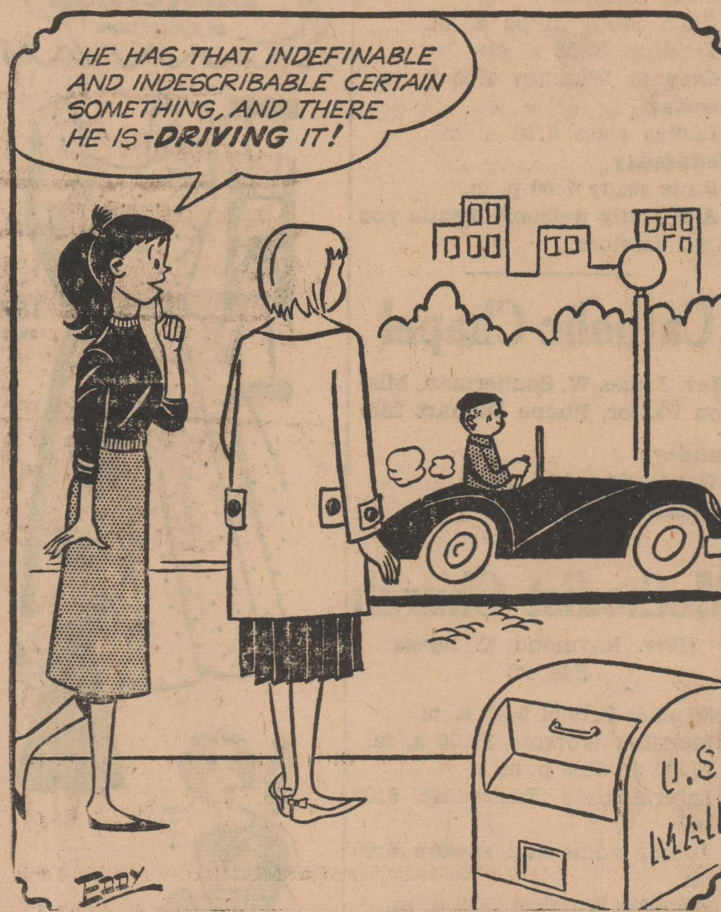
We enjoyed very much the overnight visit with Rex and Shirley, and short visit with Herman, Anita, and their new baby on the way home.
