

During the first six months of the year, 1,097 Texans are dead as compared to 1,032 during the same period of 1958. In the first six months of this year 65,740 people have been injured in crashes as compared to 54,688 in 1958. Estimated 1959 economic loss from the accidents is \$179,000,000 as compared to \$149,000,000 during 1958. Motor vehicles are traveling 22 1-3 billion miles in Texas this year as compared to 21 1-4 billion miles during 1958.


