



most famous fishing in the world has been Ozark "float fishing" drifting down a rolling stream with nothing to do but cast for the big ones while a guide handled the boat and told you just where to toss your lure to catch the big ones.

In some parts of the country, float fishing has become a commercial venture. Outfitters will provide everything-boat, food, guide, even fishing equipment. And, prices are usually reason-

But it has only been recently that the average angler took up with the idea that he can catch fish close to home in the same manner-floating down his favorite fishing stream. You can organize your own float trip on the nearest "floatable" stream-at a small cost, especially if you own or have access to a boat. For a small stream, all you need is the boat, some time, your fishing equipment and someone to pick you up downstream. If you fish a large stream, particularly one which has large pools where the water runs deep, with little current, an outboard motor is almost a necessity. In fact, if you are fishing a deep stream, you can eliminate the necessity of having to rely on someone to pick you up downstream. You can motor upstream several miles and then fish back to your starting point.

One of the advantages of float fishing is that it gets you to fishing waters inaccessible by road and thus much less fished than the portions of the stream above and below bridges and in the vicinity of highways and rural roads.

The majority of anglers, of course, don't go to this trouble, although those living in coastal areas keep up with the tides and other elements which have some effect on the activity of fish.

In fresh water fishing, a thermometer can be a handy item But just because you are able to find ideal water temperatures for fish at a certain depth, this is no guarantee that the fish will be there. Other factors, such as food and available cover, must be con-

Let's face it. The "average" fisherman isn't scientific-minded once he gets to his favorite lake stream-he came to fish. Usually, he can't wait to get that first lure or minnow into the water and he keeps it there until it's

The angler who just wants to catch fish without using any gadgdepths—the top and the bottom. If he gives both a good, thorough try, he will catch some fish.

Reasoning behind this is simple. Food and cover for all types of fish are found principally at the top and at the bottom. Bass may be feeding on frogs, insects and hatches on the surface, or taking crayfish, helgrammites and minnows on the bottom.
