Shipping Fever
Virus Isolated

## A virus that is one of the causative agents of shippin ever, a costly and prevalen respiratory disease of cattle has been isolated by USDA vet erinarians, reports Dr. C. M Patterson, extension veterinar ian. This discovery, he adds represents a breakthrough in the knowledge of this highly complex disease. To date, scientists at USDA's Agricultural Research Center, Para-influenza 3 virus (desig nated SF-4 virus) from nasa mucus of calves showing signs of shipping fever; produced mild cases of shipping spraying this virus fever by ooses of healthy calves; and have grown the virus in tissue um, he says. Also, the scientists isolated nfectious bovine rhinotracheit is (IBR) virus from calves with shipping fever, but found that SF-4 anti-serum has no effect on the IBR virus. In some in- stances SF-4 and IBR viruses produce similar symptoms, and shipping fever complex. Th scientists also isolated anothe virus, as yet unclassified, from cattle with shipping fever, Pat

 Pasteurella (bacteria) wer isolated from 65 percent of catle in herds with shipping tle in herds with shipping fev
and from half the cattle herds without the disease. In some cases these bacteria cause secondary infection that de shipping fever.
Patterson adds that the num ber of infectious agents isolated ping fever affected with ship comparable with the number solated from humans affected with respiratory infections. He teels that much more will have complex before complex before an effecti phoduced.
