





DESPITE the fact that there is clamor in some parts of the country to make it illegal to own and use firearms, this corner would still like to propose that we take our youngsters off the streets and teach them how to use firearms safely.

We're not suggesting that we give the young "gangs" weapons to use against one another, but that we take them off the streets and let them expend some of their boundless energy in rifle clubs or the sport of hunting. It is because youngsters have idle time and unused energies that they get into trouble. Whether we like it or not, some of the blame for juvenile delinquency must go to grownups and the fact that our population and our "civilization" expanded so rapidly that we have been too busy with other things to provide proper recreational facilities and training for all our young people. Many of us have been too busy with other things and idle teenagers, for lack of any other type of organized activity, had to form their own clubs or gangs.

It's not too late, however. We can start with the present crop of teenagers. We're willing to bet that 90 per cent of them would just as soon belong to a rifle club as to a group known as the "Black Jackets" or the "South

But teenagers for the most part have a great interest in firearms and it would be much better for them to learn how to use and handle guns properly, under adult supervision. Many of them will own firearms when they are older and everyone of them, as well as safer if they knew what weapons are for and how they should be




