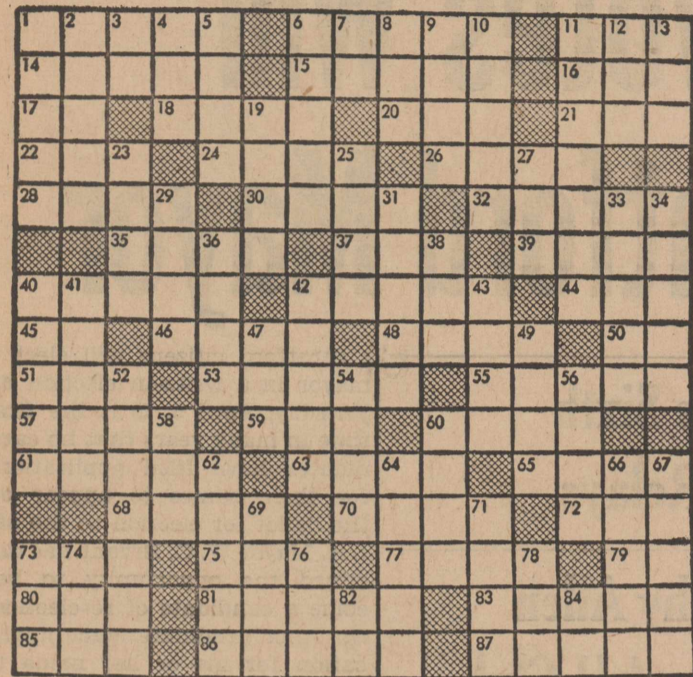


HILL CRAWLERS . . . San Francisco's famous cable cars now have new bright reflective markings to help avoid evening collisions.

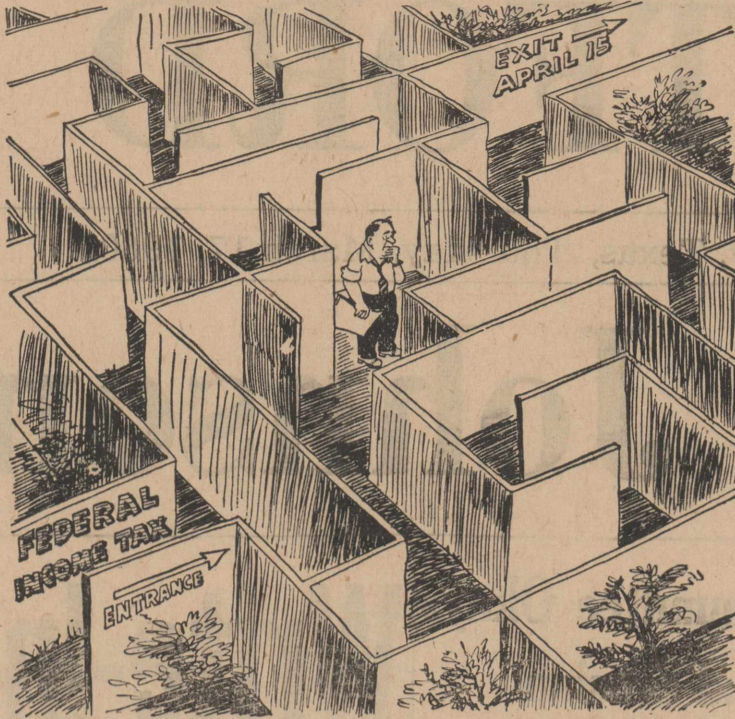
CROSSWORD PUZZLE

Social Security Office To Hold Open House

An open house celebration will be held from 2:00 to 5:00 p. m. Sunday in the new quarters of the Amarillo Social Security Office, according to Hal Geldon, manager. The new location is 1006 Adams Street, which is on the outskirts of the downtown business area in Amarillo.

The Amarillo office serves the entire 26 counties of the Panhandle, and is extending an invitation to all persons to its open house, Geldon said.

During the course of the afternoon a film on social security will be shown at regular intervals to interested visitors. Exhibits will be on display. Refreshments will be served, and employees of the office will be on hand to guide visitors through the new office and answer questions concerning the social security program.

Social security is now an old-age, survivors and disability insurance program affecting nine out of every ten persons. More than 13,750,000 people are currently receiving social security payments. Over 16,000 of these

Teacher Retirement Fund Is Growing

Texas' teachers retirement fund has increased more than 35 per cent in the past decade, according to State Auditor C. H. Cavness.

Cavness reported that at the end of the last fiscal year the fund stood at \$389,341,289. This is \$140,000,000 more than 10 years ago.

Teachers pay 6 per cent of their earnings up to \$8,400 into the fund. The state matches their payments.

The fund provides for a minimum of \$100 per month retirement pay for teachers and \$75 a month for other school employees. To make the fund grow, it is invested in municipal, state and federal bonds and certain corporate securities under supervision of a board of trustees.

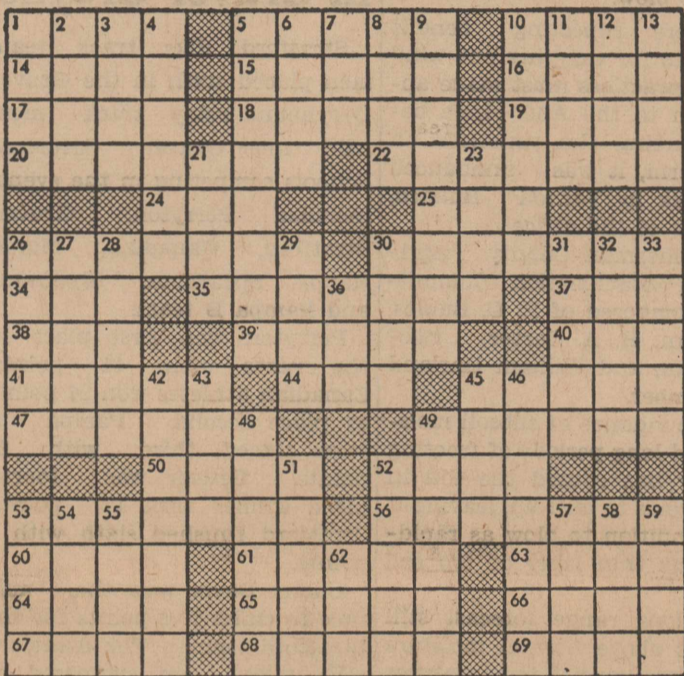

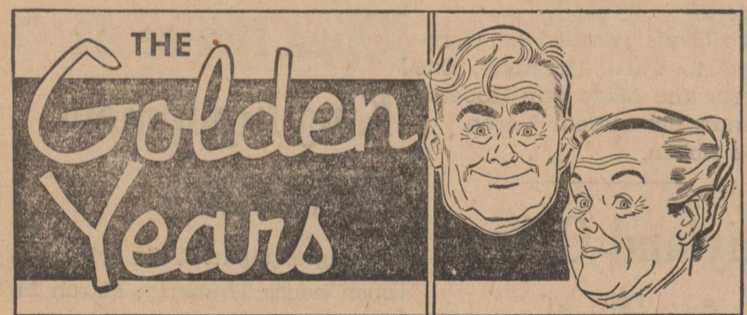

HE TURNED A HOME INTO \$146 A MONTH

"People who up and sell their homes when they retire ought to look into the idea of selling on contract rather than for cash. That's how we sold ours, and we'll get \$146 a month for ten years. Our money is secured by the property itself. We're getting 6 per cent interest. And we get a break on the tax we have to pay on the profit from the house."

Comment: Not a bad idea, if you're smart enough to know how. But I'd prefer to sell the house and buy an annuity, if I were going to spend the money. You don't have to buy a fire insurance policy on an annuity.

Most of the people setting out for the sunshine after 65 are going visiting, not moving. The Continental Assurance Company comes up with these facts on four of its pension groups: Group 1 has 403 persons; six moved to Florida. Group 2 has 569 persons; six moved to California and three to Florida. Group 3 has 269 persons; eight moved to California, 17 to Florida, and one to Arizona. Group 4 has 230; one moved to California.

Group 3, from which the largest number moved, was composed of union workers.

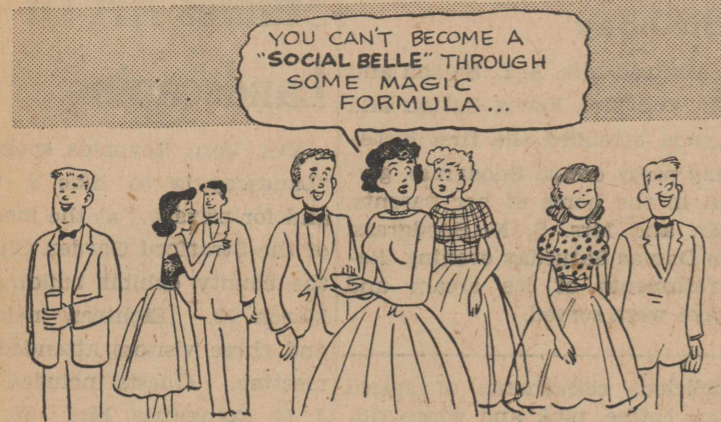

Former Teenager Discusses Being 'Liked'

IN THE MAIL: A recent column about making people like us brought a letter from Marilyn Alexander, Champaign, Illinois. Fresh out of the "teens," Marilyn outlined some of the things that helped her to get along with people. She says:

"Most of us who are shy, I believe, have a few negative feelings toward others along without natural desire for their approval. We should try to minimize these because they conflict without desire for approval. This can be done merely by looking for something to share with others—a common

idea, an assignment, a favorite pipe dream, a shared experience involving a third person, and so on. We should accept others' feelings with an open mind, remembering that we all have similar needs for friends.

"Becoming socially poised is not a matter of suddenly becoming a 'social belle' through some magic formula. It is built on everyday experiences that occur, whether it is eating lunch on the school steps at noon, participating in a club with others, or chatting at the lockers between classes. Each

one is an opportunity that is waiting to be taken advantage of.

"There are times when attempts to assert yourself seem almost fruitless. Just be patient and don't forget to stage a 'comeback' of that friendly, optimistic attitude. Never let yourself give up completely. There has never been a rainy day that was not followed by sunshine. But whether the sun 'shines' depends almost entirely on one's mental attitude. That is all-important.

"Don't be afraid to trust someone for friendship, even if it's casual, when they show signs of genuine interest in you. This friendship is built on the little things—in fact, these small rewards are what life mainly is made from.

"And—don't believe for a minute that 'tomorrow will be different' or next week, or next year—they won't be. UNLESS you start to do something now and continue to do so from now on. Developing confidence is a matter of small ingredients."

Gourmet Tricks for Foods

Those creamed soups which you're serving now, like mushroom, celery, chicken and potato can be much enhanced with slices of avocado added just before serving or one of the following: ripe olive pieces, salted whipped cream or thinly sliced rye bread spread with garlic butter and toasted.

Spiced Oranges
(Serves 4)

4 large oranges
1/4 cup red cherry juice
1 stick cinnamon
3 whole cloves
1/2 cup currant jelly
Pinch of salt
Flaked coconut
Fare and section oranges.
Cook together cherry juice, currant jelly, cinnamon and cloves for 3 minutes. Add oranges and chill in refrigerator for eight hours or overnight. Serve with flaked coconut sprinkled on top.

spoon wine vinegar, 1 tablespoon salad oil, 1 tablespoon minced green pepper and 1/4 teaspoon dried dill.

Cooking some clear lemon sauce for pudding? Add a few spoonfuls of mixed fruit cocktail to it and see how glamorous it will be!

Chilled green beans make a special treat with chilled salmon pieces sprinkled with lemon juice. Add pickle relish to mayonnaise and soured cream for novel dressing.

Fish that's been broiled with lemon butter deserves a special garnish: brush canned cling peach halves with French dressing, sprinkle with dill, curry or rosemary and broil right along with the fish.

(Q) "Some time ago I read about a concentration drug to help people think better. Can this drug be obtained, and what is it called? Also, I smoke cigars but don't inhale. Is there any danger in this?"

D.E.

(A) I know of no such medicine. Perhaps you are referring to drugs which stimulate the nervous system and thereby, supposedly, make us think more clearly. We certainly could use a concentration drug, but unfortunately we have none at this time.

Cigar smoking without inhaling is probably the least harmful form of smoking. Incidence of lung cancer is much higher in cigarette smokers who inhale. However, there is slightly more lung cancer among cigar smokers than nonsmokers.

(Q) "I am allergic. The exact cause of my allergy isn't known. I have heard there is a one-shot method which can cure allergies. Is this so? How effective is it?"

F.C.B. Jr.

(A) For several years researchers have been trying to develop a one-shot desensitization. The product being tested is a concentrate of the material causing allergy in a fluid which delays release and slows absorption. This has a prolonged effect and eliminates the need for more frequent injections.

Some clinical trials have produced good results, but the biggest problem appears to be the number of bad reactions. If attempts to correct this are successful, we will have a more convenient method to control allergies.

Incidentally, the cause of allergy must be known for this method to be effective.

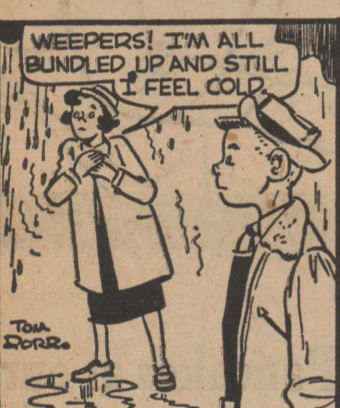

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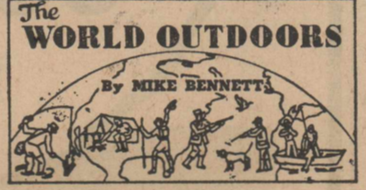

THE Public Lands Law has been liberalized to enable various States to meet increasing needs for public parks. States heretofore were limited to 640 acres of public lands yearly for public park purposes. The new act authorizes up to 6400 acres annually and up to three park sites. During the years of 1960-62, States may make application for up to 12,800 acres at not more than six park project sites. They may ask, without limitation, for additional acreage for small roadside parks and rest sites of not more than 10 acres each.

Not only has the Public Lands Law been liberalized—it has been strengthened. The new law requires that lands conveyed will be used in perpetuity for park and recreational purposes. Previously, the law required only that the States use the land for this purpose for at least 25 years.

The wise fisherman, we are told, never finds himself short on fuel for his outboard motor. But, fisherman sometimes make the mistake of going to some lake or region that is so out-of-the-way replacement fuel is not readily available.

What can be done in an emergency, when it is not possible to purchase the oil or gasoline recommended by the outboard motor manufacturer?

Outboard engineers say that a well-designed outboard engine should be able to digest regular automotive gasolines and oils without appreciable loss of performance and without danger of mechanical failure. Needless to say, however, a prolonged diet of modern "super additive" automotive gasolines and oils will eventually lead to trouble.

So, be safe, use the prescribed gasolines and oils—except when there is a real emergency.

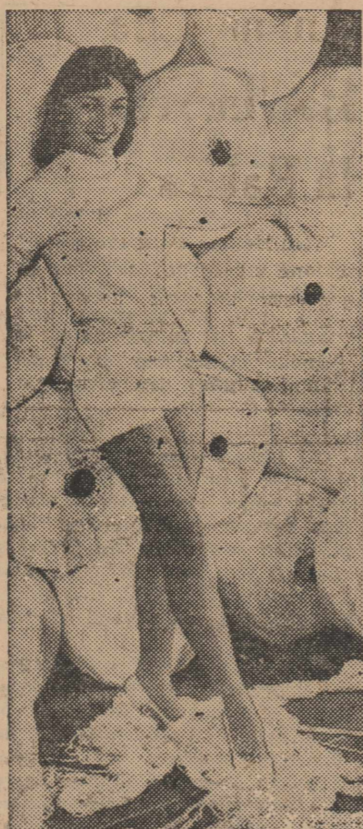

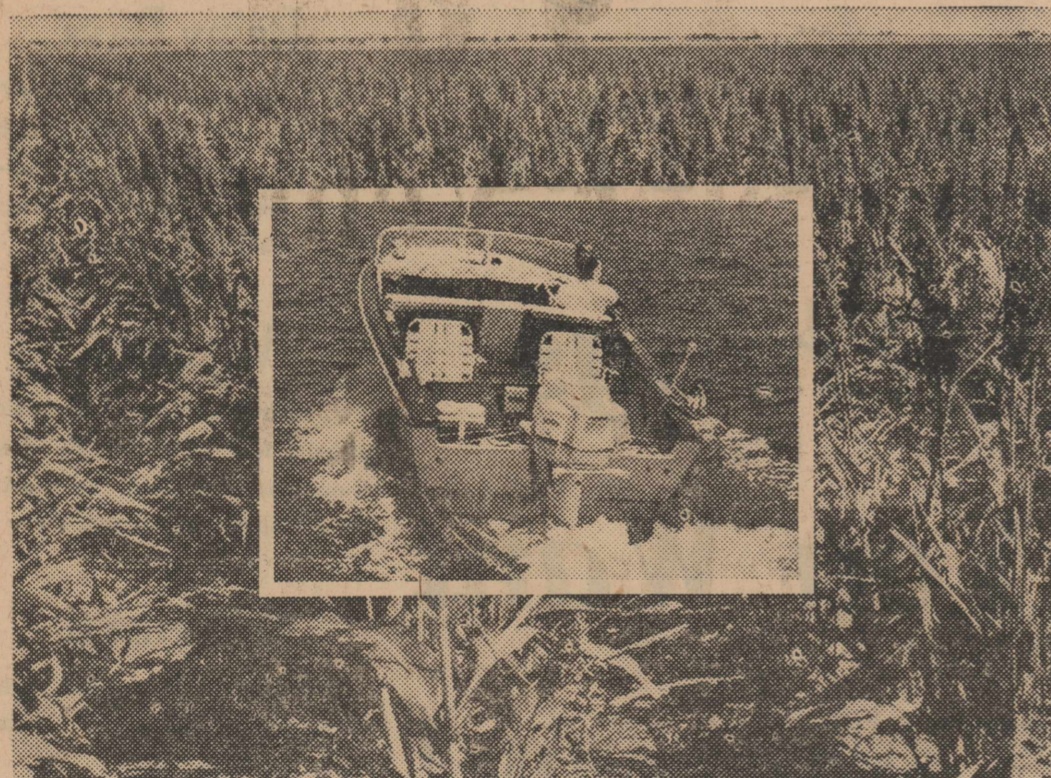

cases of rabies diagnosed in all animals. Only 17 of the 69 total were among dogs and cats.

The rabies picture in Texas has recently been taking on a new look. The present trend indicates a decline in the number of rabies in domestic pets, but a rise in the number of wildlife rabid animals.

Infected skunks and foxes were more numerous than the total of rabid dogs confirmed by the State Health Department

laboratory during 1959. Live-stock rabies has shown an increase also, probably due to exposure to wildlife.

Public health veterinarians point out that, numerically, there isn't a high enough immune pet population in Texas to prevent the spill-over of wildlife rabies into the dog and cat population.

Three counties in Texas have emergency rabies control programs at the present time.

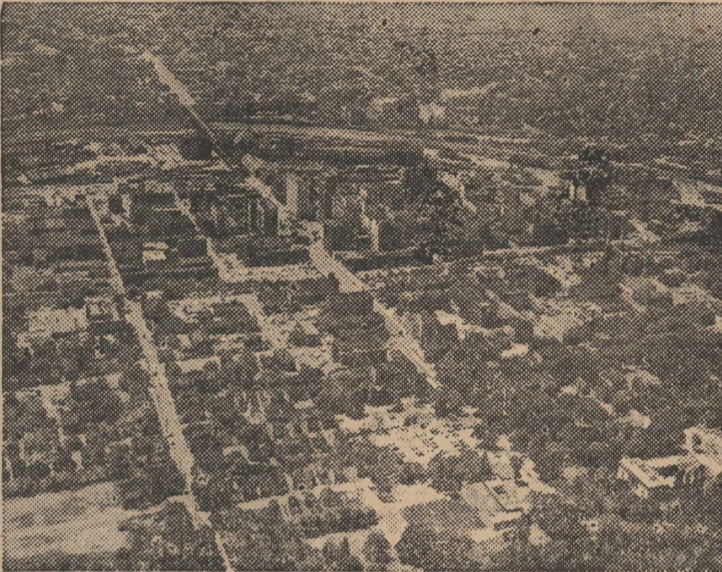

Administration Wheat Plan Has Few Friends Among Congressman

The first administration's wheat program has been received with coolness in the House Agriculture Committee.

"It looks like we are going to have the same law on the books next year," said Rep. Carl Albritt of Oklahoma, a member of the committee. He made the comment after Marvin McLain, assistant secretary of agriculture, outlined the administration wheat proposal for the 1961 crop and declined to go along with any increase in the price supports level.

Wheat is now supported at 75 per cent of parity of \$1.77 a bushel with a national wheat acreage of 55 million acres. If the law is not changed the same program will prevail for the 1961 crop. Wheat supplies are at record highs and are slated to increase after the 1960 harvest.

McLain outlined the department's proposal for the future which said:

Eliminate acreage allotments. Set the price support level for 1961, 1962 and 1963 at 75 per cent of the average price received for wheat by farmers during the prior three years.

Set the price support level for the 1964 crop and afterwards at 90 per cent of the average market price for the preceding three years.

Chairman Harold Cooley of North Carolina asked McLain if the administration would go along with any increase in the price support level if strict production controls were invoked.

McLain said it would not favor any material increase in such levels.

"It will be a sad day if we adjourn this session of Congress without some new wheat law," Cooley told him.

McLain estimated wheat would drop to about \$1.35 a bushel the first year under the administration plan. But, he said, this plan also included a step-up in the soil bank program from the present 28 million acres in the reserve to 60 million acres in three years.

McLain contended the soil bank would absorb much present wheat land, and would result in eventual cuts in wheat production.

BY The Old Timers

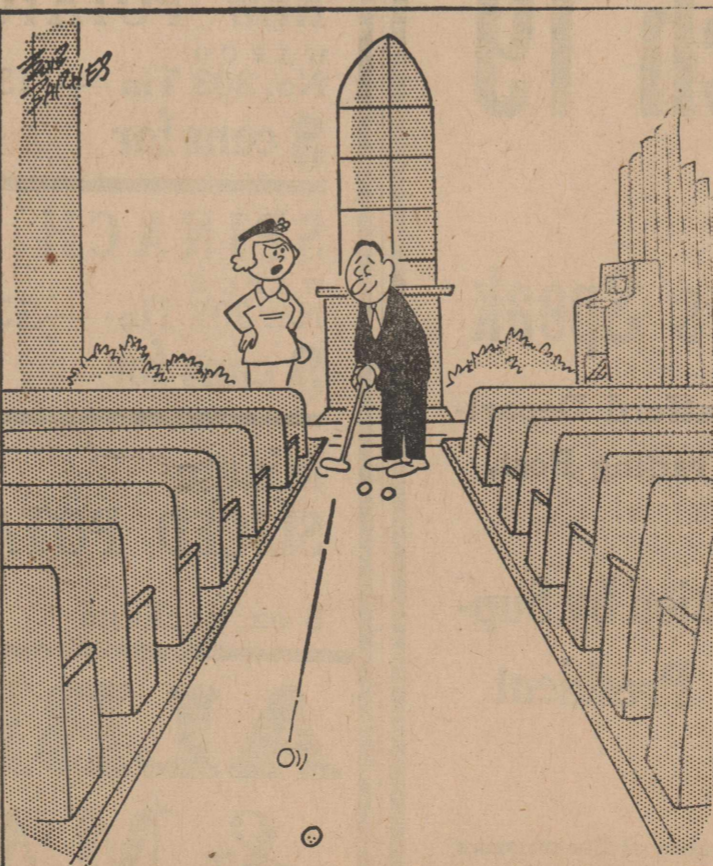
From A. M. Watts, Chester, Vermont: I remember for over twenty years before her death my grandmother Watts was crippled and could walk very little. But that did not prevent her from working.

She did all sorts of sewing, mending and darning. She did patchwork. She made various kinds of quilts, calico and silk. She knitted scarfs, mittens and stockings.

But her most outstanding and unique work was making hats. Every spring she purchased blocks of chalk shaped in the form of the latest fashions in hats. The women folk from miles around would bring to her their old straw hats. She would take the braids of straw apart, cut out any damaged parts, wrap them around the chalk blocks and sew them together to fashion hats of the latest styles.

From an Old Timer, Hattiesburg, Mississippi: I remember when it wasn't only the farm folks who kept a cow and killed their own hogs. We lived only a few blocks from Main Street, but kept a cow to provide fresh milk for a big family and father always had a pig or two in a small lot nearby. My father always had the best garden in the neighborhood. Mother loved flowers, particularly sweet peas. She and dad played a little game every year. He would rise at daylight and prepare a couple of rows for planting, then retire to the house for a cup of coffee and some rest. Mother would slip out the side door and plant her sweet peas in the rows that he had prepared for something else—or, at least, so he said. It always seemed to me he managed to have a couple of rows ready for planting the day after she placed her seed in a prominent place in the kitchen.

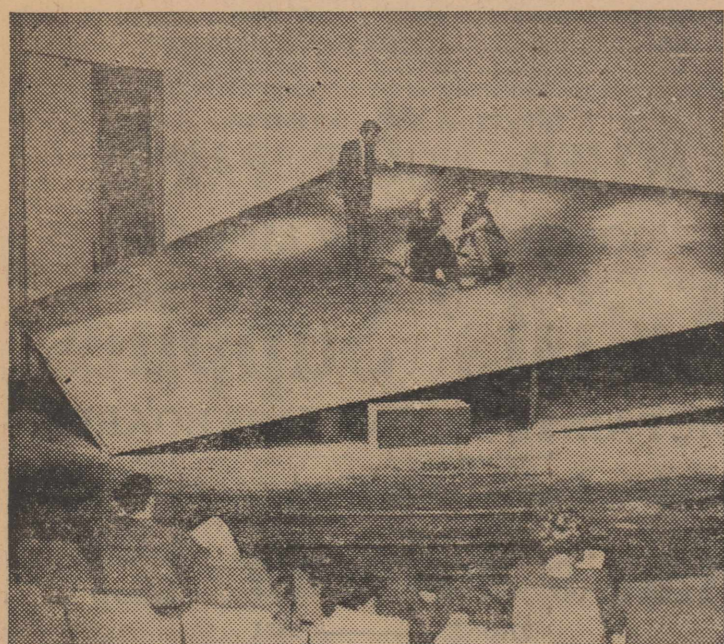

Stairs should be covered with slip resistant pads if they're covered with glossy materials such as enamel paint, linoleum or ceramic tile. Check to make certain no pads are loose.

Helen's Favorite:

Broiled Frosting
(For 9-inch square cake)
3 tablespoons butter
½ cup light brown sugar, firmly packed
2 tablespoons cream
½ cup chopped walnuts
1 cup miniature marshmallows
Cream the butter, add sugar and blend well. Stir in cream, walnuts and marshmallows. Mix lightly; spread on top of baked cake while still in its pan. Broil slowly 5 inches below heat for 2 or 3 minutes or until top is bubbly and light brown.

Bedrooms should not open onto a landing or stairway. This, of course, needs extensive remodeling to rectify in an occupied house, but it can be checked if you're marketing for a home.

Doors should not open into halls. They should open into the rooms themselves. Install a grab bar by the bath tub. This will assist getting in and out with relative safety.

Electrical outlets should not be within easy reach of the bath-tub. This, of course, is a reminder not to touch them while hands are wet.
