

## Circulate Petitions To Pave County Roads

Petitions are being circulated by qualified tax paying citizens which will request the Commissioners' Court to set a hearing for a proposed bond election which would pave approximately 53 miles of county roads in Precincts One and Four.

If the required number of signers are secured, the petitions will be delivered to the county commissioners Monday of next week.

The Commissioners' Court will then order a hearing when all interested parties in the two precincts may appear before the court and speak for or against the calling of a road bond election. They may also request any changes they might desire in the proposed paving project.

Residents of Road District Three which is located in Precinct One are working to secure a bond issue for paving approximately 39 miles of county roads. Roscoe Dyess, county commissioner of the precinct, said that the proposed program would place practically every family in the road district on a paved highway.

Dyess said the proposed paving program in Road District Three would cost approximately \$500,000 and would be retired within 18 years. This bond issue with the one already issued by the road district could be liquidated at the expense of an 80 cent tax on the \$100 valuation of property as it has been assessed for county tax purposes.

Road District Four lies within Precinct Four, and road boosters are proposing the paving of approximately 14 miles of road and streets within the road district. County Commissioner Tom Wakefield said the estimated cost of the paving project would be \$225,000. The proposed bond issue would be retired within 10 years with an 80 cent tax on the \$100 county tax evaluation of the property within the road district. Wakefield said the tax payers could save approximately \$36,000.00 on the project by liquidating the proposed bonds within a 10 year period.

Only tentative plans for the paving have been submitted to the voters. In the event a hearing is held, this will enable interested voters to offer their suggestions for any changes they may desire in the proposed paving routes. After the hearing has been held and an election ordered, no changes can be made in the proposed routes of the paving projects.

## Tighter Driving Law Sought

Legislation that would crack down on the driver who does not even have a drivers license has been proposed for the next session.

Rep. Ben Lewis of Dallas said that under present law a person who drives without having a license can only be hauled before a city court and fined about \$10.

By contrast, he said, a license holder who gets three tickets and has his license suspended can, if he drives during the suspension, be put in jail and fined as much as \$500.00.

Lewis said he would propose a series of stiffer penalties for the people who cannot pass driver tests but drive anyway.

## Johnson Is A Capable Leader

Lyndon Johnson is a capable and courageous leader, Rep. Walter Rogers told fellow democrats at the Johnson for President dinner held at the county exhibit building in Stratford Saturday night. His position in the present debate in Congress over the civil rights issue, has given him an opportunity to show some of the ability he acquired during his early training in Texas, Rogers said.

Rogers deplored conditions which have developed in agricultural areas during the administration of Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson. There is something wrong when every legislative program enacted by Congress is vetoed by the president if they are not approved by the secretary of agriculture, Rogers said.

We have paid dearly for the friends we have obtained through our foreign relief programs, and the so called "civil rights" bill is nothing more than an attempt to centralize power in the federal government, the congressman continued. Minorities who are supporting this measure will learn that centralized government has little respect for minorities, but it sometimes looks as though we are fighting a losing battle to keep this from happening, he said.

## Safflower Sponsors To Visit County

State officials of the Texas Farmers Union have announced their plans for a 1960 Safflower program for the South Plains and Panhandle area of Texas. A series of one or more meetings will be held in Sherman, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Bailey, Farmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Armstrong, Randall, Deaf Smith, Potter, Carson, Hartley, Moore, Hemphill, Gray, Lipscomb, Ochiltree and Dallam Counties.

The meetings will begin early in April on the South Plains. Seed and contracts will be made available to interested growers at these meetings.

The 1960 program will differ from last years Safflower program in that the growers will not be required to purchase stock to participate.

Acreage last year was limited to not more than 10 acres per grower. There will be no limit to the growers this year, as long as planting seed is available.

## Gunzelman Car Wrecked Friday Night

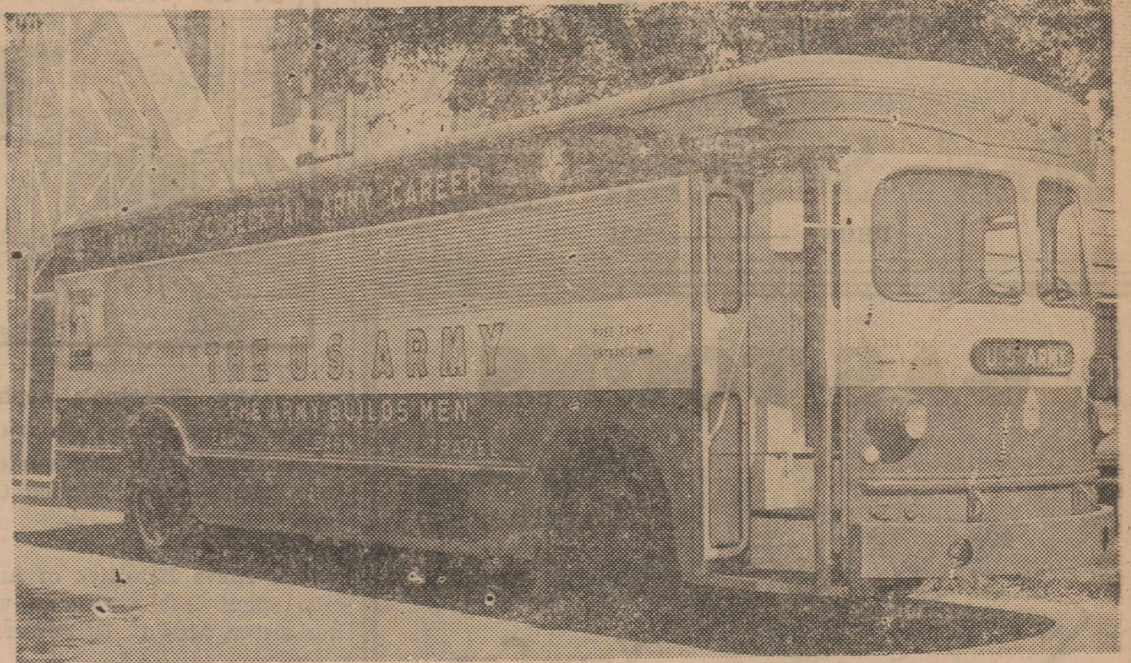

## Group Will Tour Lewter Feed Yards In Lubbock Saturday Morning

### G. R. Naugle On Maneuvers In Puerto Rico

FORT LEWIS, Wash. — Army PFC Glen R. Naugle, son of Mr. and Mrs. Willis Naugle of Stratford, participated with other personnel from the 4th Infantry Division in Exercise Puerto Pine in Puerto Rico. The 18-day exercise, which includes the largest peacetime troop airlift ever attempted, ended March 21.

During the exercise, participating troops of the Strategic Army Corps (STRAC) are being air transported from their home stations, throughout the U. S., to a staging area in Puerto Rico and returned. Puerto Pine is designed to determine the effectiveness of the STRAC units in overcoming the complex supply and operational problems resulting from the rapid deployment of a sizeable force by air over great distances.

Naugle, regularly assigned as a machine gunner in Company D of the division's 39th Infantry at Fort Lewis, Washington, entered the Army in October 1958 and completed basic training at Fort Carson, Colorado.

The 20-year-old soldier is a 1958 graduate of Stratford High School.

Plans have been completed to allow all interested parties in this area an opportunity to tour the Lewter Feed Yards in Lubbock Saturday. The Sherman County delegation will meet at the Handy Drive Inn Cafe at 3:30 p. m. Friday, March 25, to form car load groups for driving to Lubbock. The trip to Lubbock will be made Friday afternoon and a tour of the commercial feed lots will be made Saturday.

Arrangements for the visit to the commercial feeding lots were completed by the livestock committee of the Sherman County Development Association.

In addition to the Lewter commercial feeding pens, visits will be made to the ultra modern Supreme Packing Company, and to several of the smaller farm type feed yards in the Lubbock area.

The Lewter Feed lots have a capacity of 25,000 head of 1,000 pound steers. When operating at capacity, Lewter's cattle consume a minimum of 150 tons of Milo daily. Individuals who have visited this operation have stated that the tour of these lots is worthwhile and very interesting.

The Supreme Packing Company is reported to have the most modern plant in operation. They are slaughtering 1,300 head of beef each week. Many believe that the large central packing plants are on their way out, and that plants such as the one in Lubbock are the blueprints of the future.

It is said there is no better way to keep up with new developments in farming and ranching than visiting and talking with others. The tour will give visitors an opportunity to see the different sizes of feed lots in operation and enable them to discuss the feeding of livestock with men who are actually in the business.

Walter Lasley, W. O. Bryant and Joe Everett compose the committee sponsoring the trip to Lubbock.

The tour will be completed in time to allow visitors to the feeding project time to drive home Saturday evening.

## Texas Oil Allowable Cut

The Texas Railroad Commission has cut the state's oil production for April after testimony that both crude and gasoline were in oversupply.

The April allowable will be 2,814,252 barrels a day, a cut of 123,029 barrels a day from March. The number of producing days was cut from 10 to 9.

Oilmen told the Commission that other states, such as Louisiana and Mississippi had not cut back production to offset the oversupply as Texas had. This state, said one Texas executive bitterly, is taking the "backlash" of the situation.

### Ask Brucellosis Control Area Designation

Livestock men are circulating petitions to get the Livestock Sanitation Commission of Texas to declare Sherman County a Type I Brucellosis control area.

Requirements of the Type I Brucellosis control area include: Testing of the cattle is not required but the owners must have all female cattle vaccinated at his own expense.

To be recognized, the vaccination must be done in compliance with Commission regulations. Only those vaccinated by authorized Veterinarians and reported on approved forms within 10 days will be certified as official.

Beef animal females must be vaccinated between 4 and 12 months of age. Dairy animal females must be vaccinated between 4 and 8 months of age. Vaccinated animals must be identified individually by ear tattoo or by hot "V" on right jaw.

There is no restriction of free movement of cattle in a designated area under the Type I program. Heifers do not have to be vaccinated to be moved in or out of the area.

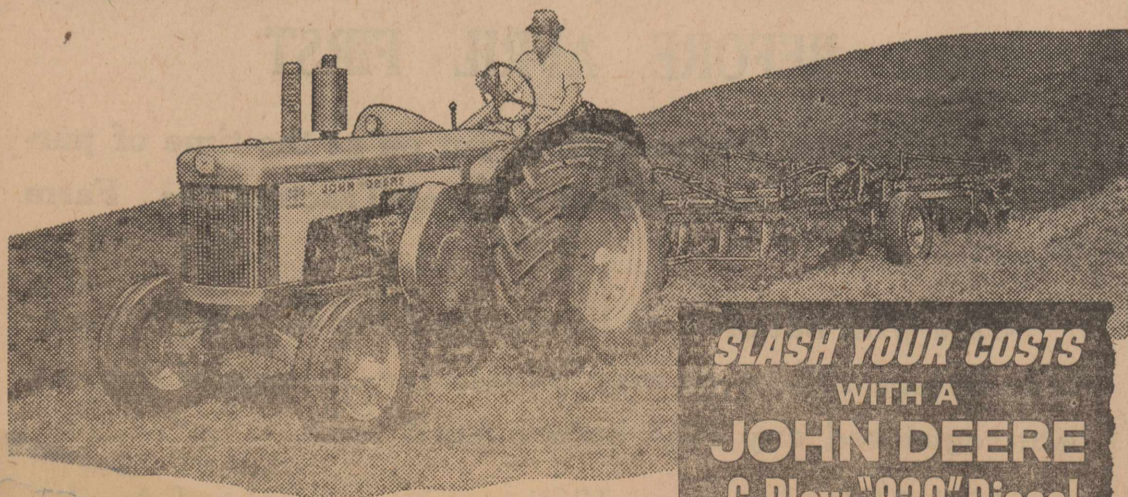
