

Map 39 Miles New Road Paving

Resident qualified voters of Road District Three laid out an agreeable 39-mile paving program at a hearing held at the courthouse Wednesday morning. May 14 has been set for the election to be held on the \$500,000.00 road bond issue which would place every home in precinct one on or near a paved road.

The proposed paving program has been set up on a 39-mile basis although mileage by section line count amounts to only 37.75 miles. Much of this is absorbed in the variation of the size of sections of land.

Paving Routes

The proposed paving covers various parts of the precinct either tying into existing pavement or extending to U. S. highway 287.

The map of proposed paving adopted at the hearing which was completed for Roscoe Dyess, county commissioner of precinct one, shows these designations:

From the northeast corner of section 398 in Block 1-T south for a distance of three miles;

From the northeast corner of section 459 in Block 1-T east for a distance of approximately 6 1/2 miles east to U. S. 287;

From the northeast corner of section 398 in Block 1-T east 6 miles to U. S. 287;

From the northeast corner of section 272 in Block 1-T south for a distance of 1 mile;

From the northeast corner of section 343 in Block 1-T 4.5 miles west to U. S. 287;

From the northeast corner of section 334 in Block 1-T south 2 miles, and 1.75 miles east to U. S. 287;

From the northeast corner of section 334 in Block 1-T east 1.5 miles to U. S. 287;

From the northeast corner of section 18 in Block 2-T west 8 miles.

From U. S. 287 in the northeast corner of section 3 in Block 2-T, east for a distance of approximately 3.5 miles.

The election for approval or rejection of the proposed \$500,000.00 will be held Saturday, May 14, in the Bob Burgess garage. The polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. until 7:00 p. m.

The route of the proposed paving was agreed on by resident qualified voters of the road district who attended the hearing Wednesday morning. Retirement of the bonds within 10 or 18 years was discussed. No decision on this question was made at the hearing.

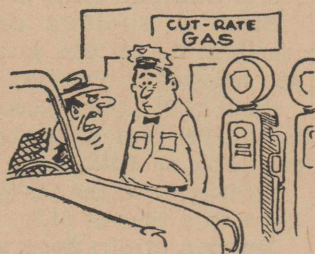

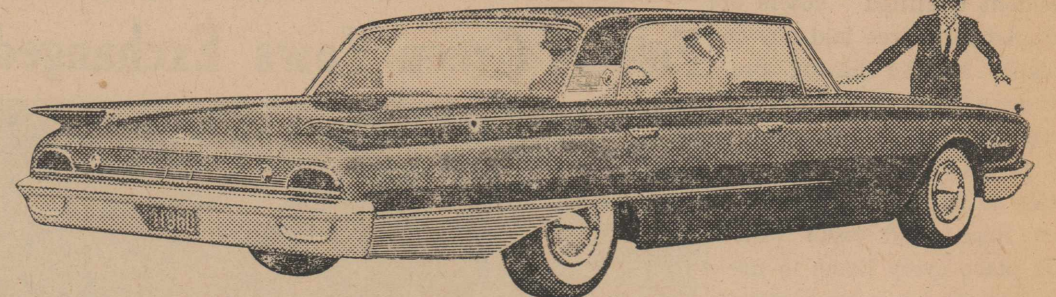

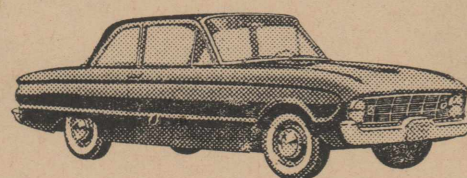

State Advisory Committee To Meet May 16

The assignment of the State Finance Advisory Committee will be to suggest every possible economy that can be made in state government and recommend a tax program to put the state on a sound financial basis. The 30-member committee appointed by Gov. Price Daniel will meet May 16 to begin work on the task.

For the immediate future the tax program is to wipe out the general revenue fund deficit, which the governor estimates will be \$40,000,000 at the end of this fiscal year, and provide \$35,000,000 for teacher pay raises.

The committee is to be made up of leading citizens in both public and private life. Six have been named. They include Secretary of State Zollie Steakley, who will be chairman; Jess Irwin, the governor's budget director; John Ford, administrative assistant to the governor; Dr. John R. Stockton, director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research; John R. McKee of Dallas, Ford Motor Co. executive; and Hugo Lowenstern, Amarillo real estate man.

Gov. Daniel said he would ask the committee to search for revenue sources other than a general sales tax or state income tax.

The Hallway between the offices of the County Agent and Home Demonstration Agent is being enclosed as an office for the office secretary.

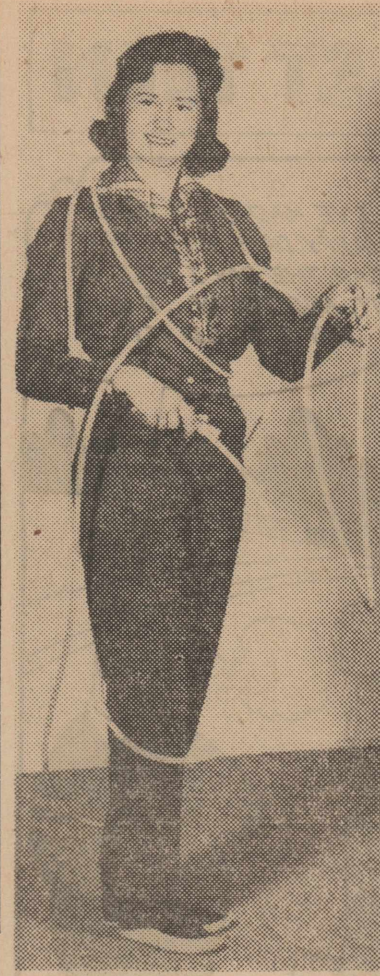
Edd C. and Earl Garoutte are remodeling the county offices.

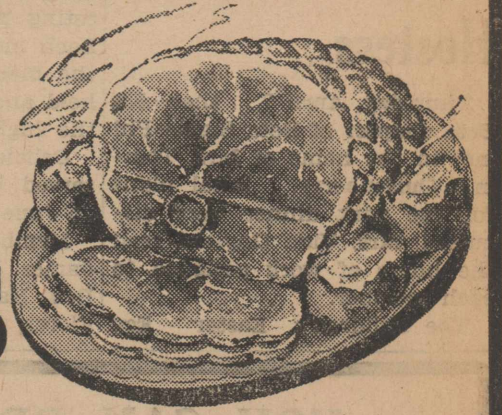

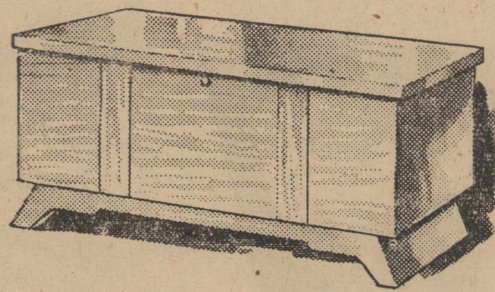

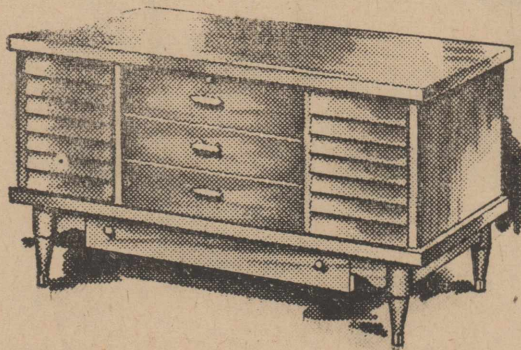
