Voters of Precinct One overwhelmingly approved a \$500,000 road bond issue in the election held Saturday. The vote was 59 for, compared to 8 votes against the issue.

Twenty-nine of the voters voted for paying off the paving bonds within 18 years and 25 voted to pay off the bonds within 10 years.

When completed, the 39-mile proposed paving in the precinct will place every family living in the road district either on or living within a short distance of a paved road.


Taxes assessed on property within the road district will liquidate the bonds issued for construction of the paving project. It has been estimated that the good road policy in the road district will cost each person owning a section of land about \$27.50 a year in taxes. This figure is based on a section of land with a \$3,200 county tax valuation.


Drilling locations for four potential gas well have been announced for Sherman County by the Phillips Petroleum Co.

The well is 32 miles southeast of Stratford and will be drilled to a potential depth of 2,800 feet. Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1-A Jamer is located 1,650 feet from the north and east lines of section 63 in Block 1-C. It is 20 miles east of Stratford and will be drilled to a potential depth of 2,800 feet.

Phillips Petroleum Co. 1-A. Witt "E" is located 1,650 feet from the north and west lines of section 245 in Block 1-T. The location is 6 miles southeast of Stratford and will be drilled to a potential depth of 2,700 feet. Petroleum Exploration Inc. No. 1-161 Roach, located in section 161 of Block 1-C, was plugged April 28. The well was spudded in Dec. 17, 1958 and completed as a gas well with a total depth of 2,974 feet. The well was located 12 miles northeast of Stratford.

From Mrs. M. Nestor, Parsons, West Virginia: I remember sloshing through the melting snow in early spring as I followed my father who, with auger in hand and a bag of wooden spiles on his back, went from tree to tree until the sugar trees all were tapped.

When the troughs were ready to be emptied, we dipped the sap into buckets and carried it to a crude cabin. Here it was poured into large kettles. When the kettles were full, the remainder of the sap was kept in barrels to be put in the kettles as the sap boiled down. It was necessary to keep the kettles boiling day and night while the run lasted. At night, neighbors would gather at the camp and tell stories.

When the sap had boiled into syrup and the run was over, the troughs were turned up against the trees to keep them clean until another run.

Of the many good things, we liked the maple sugar eggs my mother made best of all. She emptied the eggs she used out of the end of the shell. She filled these shells with maple sugar while boiling hot and placed them in an upright position until they cooled. These were our Easter treat. . . .

From Mrs. W. S. Young, Shreveport, Louisiana: I remember as a small child when we moved mama would rake all the red hot coals out of the heating stove and put bricks in them in

a pan in the wagon to keep our hands warm. It would take all day to move. And I remember in September the revival meetings would start. People would pick cotton all day and stay at church nearly all
