



This is general view, looking south, of the Farmers Supply Feed Mill and elevator facilities at Hartley.


Immediately north of the mill (foreground) — but not in the picture — is the firm's fertilizer plant. Also unpictured, are two flat grain storage buildings.

The elevators, mill and flat buildings are all connected by a system of underground or overhead tunnels, with serew-type conveyors, through which grain can be moved as directed by electric control panels. Total storage capacity is two and a quarter million bushels.

The mill capacity is 20 tons of ground feed, or 12 tons of pellets, per hour.

The Farmers Supply started in 1934 with a general merchandise store — still operating across US Highway 87 from the elevators — and \$1,200 in assets.

In 1937, it leased the larger of the two metal elevators that can be seen at the far end of the "barrels" and that had been built by J. N. Beasley of Amarillo in 1934. The Supply bought it in 1942, and enlarged it from 30,000 to 105,000 bushels in 1946. The smaller metal elevator nearby was acquired in 1942 when Farmers Supply bought Hartley Mercantile. The major elevator expansion started in 1950, and climaxed this year with the feed mill.




Carl Keenan, chief operator, is shown at the "automatic heart" of the Farmers Supply Feed Mill — the central electric control panel that directs power over ten miles of wiring to the mill's 37 motors that total a little over 600 HP.

By a system of electronics and automatic electric devices, the panel controls each motor and the equipment it operates.

If there is a hitch of any kind, the panel sounds a piercing buzzer, that can be plainly heard even outside the building. At the same time it starts flashing a red light pin-pointing the trouble.

The machine that adds molasses to ground feed, or pellets, has a manual control to determine amounts. But an "electronic brain" halts flow of molasses when the stream of feed or pellets through the machine stops for any reason. The "brain" re-starts the molasses flow when the feed stream resumes.

Baled hay, as shown, or any kind of baled forage, with baling wire removed, is moved automatically by a drag-chain into the hay grinding equipment in the pit behind Lyons, and then by air-suction lifted up and into the main mixing room beyond the wall you see at the far side of the

Because the ground forage is moved by air-suction, instead of air-blast, dust is at a minimum. Even if a hole, or other small break occurs in the spouting, the suction usually keeps any dust inside the spouting from coming out.

But cement block walls seal off the grinding room from the rest of the plant as an extra precaution against dust explosion and fire.





MEDITORIAL: Yesterday I mentioned some of the ways bacteria provoke the body and two of the methods we use to combat them. In addition to our skin and white blood cells we have one other major method in dealing with microbes-antibody formation. This is the body's atomic arsenal, its last and most potent weapon. If this fails, war with the bacterial enemy is on the brink of defeat.

Antibodies or immune bodies are chemicals produced when foreign proteins or similar substances, such as bacteria, gain entrance to the body. Once formed they are transported in the gamma globulin fraction of blood.

There are several types of antibodies. Some, called agglutinins, form an invisible film around the bacteria causing them to stick together. Thus immobilized, the white blood cells can engulf and destroy them. Others, the antitoxins, neutralize toxins and prevent further damage. Antibodies can also interfere with bacterial growth and form a chemical barrier which the bacteria cannot

If enough immune bodies are formed, victory over the bacteria results. And if the disease was previously overcome, enough antibodies may be present to completely protect against present or future attacks of this same disease. In other words, you will be said to have developed immunity. This is the principle involved in vaccination and other immuniza-

When the body has used all its weapons and is losing the fight, outside help is needed. This may come in the form of injections of antitoxins, gamma globulin, immunizations or antibiotics. By striking the bacteria directly, the antibiotics often provide the lift needed to turn the tide of battle.




