

#### LAND OWNERSHIP.

In adjoining columns on this page is an article written by Raymond Brooks, Austin correspondent of the Daily News, that rings the bell on a fact of fundamental economic and political importance. Tenantry is an enduring consequence of extravagance in government. It follows on the heels of high taxes and wastefulness of public funds. This is true for two reasons—the burden of making land produce a profit when so much of the income is exacted to pay governmental costs, and the increasing inclination of the more intelligent classes to resort to employment from which, especially under a regime of liberal public spending, there is an assured income. The drift from the farms to urban centers that preceded the 1929 debacle was in pace with the prosperity of the job-holders who achieved a standard of living during that era never before equalled by the class. The drift back to the rural areas where susistence, if not prosperity, is assured, will equal the stability which the nation achieves as it struggles back to a level of normalcy. If that drift is back to actual land ownership and not merely to tenancy some prospect of permanence is seen.

It is a fact that the amount of money now being expended or to be expended by the federal government in construction of public works, much of which is of doubtful utility would effect a more fundamental relief if devoted to a program of wholesale restoration of tenant citizens to the status of proprietor citizens. But any criticism of the present recovery program must take into consideration the emergencies under which it was conceived and the expedient character of the relief itself. A program to revest the dominant part of the neglect shown by the state gov American citizenship with land ownership would require ernment toward the nearest solu much time and organization. 



#### Memel Politics Are Taboo in Lithuania

KOVNO, Lithuania, Aug. 11 Rising nationalist sentiment in Memel has sharpened official measures, and, under the threat of continued riots and disturbances, the directorate has forbidden further

political meetings. Among the assemblies banned was one sponsored by the clergyman Baron von Sass, at which banners were to be displayed bearing the legend "Memel Awake." a slogan reminis-cent of the Nazi "Germany Awake." On his part, Sass complained to

police that he knew of a plan to break up the meeting by spiriting into the audience a group of opponents armed with "stink bombs," Authorities, who on several recent occasions had prevented serious disorder only by calling out all available forces, decided to prohibit further meetings.

The evangelical consistory of Memel has taken violent exception to Sass' political activities. As a disciplinary action he has been pended from office and it is planned remove him entirely. Official efforts to prevent dis-

orders were stimulated by a report from the commandant of the Memel district that the "Christian Social Workers union," a Nazi organization, planned to recruit further "shock croops" in the vicinity. The commandant demanded that the enlistment be prevented.

In that hope that fall will bring at least a partial solution of the present troubled political situation, the authorities ordered indefinitely postponed the elections to the Agricultural board.

Meanwhile the jurisdiction of Memel's courts has been sharply restricted. Under the new Lithuanian lawcourt constitution, violations of the military service and national defense laws have been removed from their competence. They will no longer be permitted to pass judgment on punishable acts of Lithuanian officials in Memel.

The Lithuanian minister of justice in the future will decide all conflicts between the Memel and Lithuanian courts, and will be empowered to pass on the admission of all new lawyers, a function which hitherto has been filled by the Lawyers


