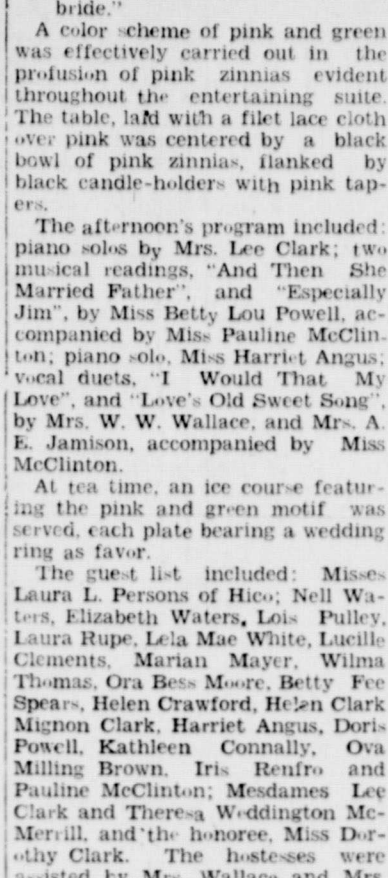

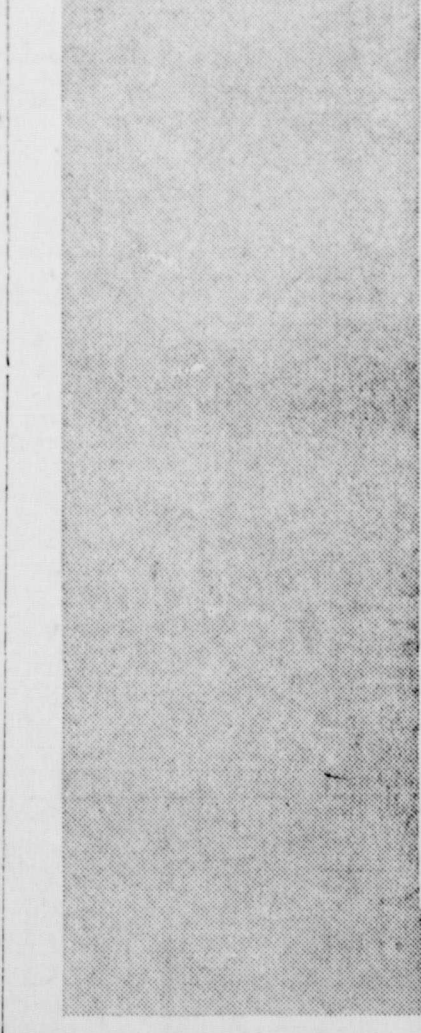

About this matter of minutes and miles

The speedometer is a little thing, but can be a big source of wrong conclusions.

On a recent test, two cars of different makes, with speedometers set at 0, were given each two gallons of gas, and driven the same road till they stopped. The top car went 7 miles farther down the road than the low car, yet the low car's speedometer showed that it had gone farther than the top car. Paper miles and road miles may be two quite different things.

It is easier to build a speedometer that will read 70 miles an hour than a car that will go 70 miles an hour.

A Detroit man who has a summer home in Northern Michigan, began several months ago to drive his first Ford V-8. He says:

"My watch tells me that I go up north in less time than I did before, but my Ford speedometer says that I go at slower speed, and the trip registers fewer miles. In my former car the speedometer speed was higher, my mileage greater on this trip, but with my Ford V-8 I go in less time and use less gas."

There is no mystery about that. His former mileage, speed and gas consumption were delusions. He figured by a speedometer that did not measure accurately, and was not meant to. All his costs—operations, repairs, upkeep—were calculated on a wrong basis. A wrong speedometer misleads on all these items.

Some car manufacturers justify this practice. They say it is just as well for a driver to think he is going 70 miles an hour when he is going only 62. Well, let that pass as to speed; does it justify telling every driver that he is getting more mileage out of his car than he really is? A speedometer measures speed AND mileage; should it cheat on both?

Speeding up a clock cannot create more hours any more than speeding up a speed-meter can create more miles. An hour is sixty minutes long. A mile is 5280 feet long. Ford mileage and Ford speed are accurately measured—they are there—you get them—no one gets more.

Anyone can buy speedometers and have them "fixed" anyway he wants them. We deal with manufacturers who know our strict stand on accuracy and are glad to meet our specifications. The limit of variation in Ford speedometers, a limit that cannot be avoided in manufacture, is 2 1/2 at 70 miles.

We get our speed and mileage out of our engine and wheels, not out of our speedometer.

SPAIN BUILDS NAVAL SHIPS FOR MEXICANS

MADRID, Aug. 19 — With contract officially signed, construction of five war transports and ten gunboats for coast guard use for Mexico is expected to begin shortly in Spanish shipyards. Heretofore Mexico has maintained only a small navy.

The tonnage of the vessels will total over 20,000 tons and will cost approximately 70,000,000 gold pesetas (about \$14,000,000), according to Commodore Garcia Jurado, chief of a naval mission sent from Mexico in connection with the building of the craft.

Many Companies Work
Commodore Jurado, in an interview, said the transports and gunboats, which will have a speed of 20 and 25 miles per hour respectively will be built at El Ferrol, Valencia, Cadiz and Bilbao. Almost all the naval construction companies in Spain will participate in the work.

Besides the 15 vessels, two floating docks are being built at the Cartagena arsenal. One will be installed at Veracruz and the other at Manzanillo, according to Commodore Jurado.

"The construction companies," said Jurado, "are detailing their best technicians and specialists to supervise the work in order to use this contract as an opportunity for demonstrating the efficiency of Spanish naval construction."

First of Program
"The construction of these vessels is the first part of a naval program by Mexico. The second part will probably include submarines and perhaps a cruiser. Among the eight naval units which Mexico now possesses, there is only one cruiser of 4,000 tons."

Commodore Jurado said the group of naval officers now in Spain is studying the Spanish fleet and the navy yards. Some of the men also witnessed the recent maneuvers of the fleet in Balearic waters. All will remain here for a year and a half, specializing in technical aspects of the marine.

Britishers Knock American Drinks

CLEVELAND, Aug. 19—Ice water with meals and chocolate sodas at drug store fountains are all very well for Americans, but a group of Englishmen here on an inspection tour don't think much of their inability to obtain tea and cakes.

"The cooler drink in the world," said Joseph Stuart, editor of the London School of Printing Record, "is hot tea. Cold tea is filthy."

"Your 3.2 beer is wet and cold," said Alan Greenway, the Lord Mayor of London, "but it is very, very weak."

"It seems peculiar," said Joseph Bruton, London, "that no one ever thinks of serving tea and cakes."

The Englishmen are members of a group which is touring the principal cities of this country to inspect printing establishments and American printing and engraving methods.

Art Colony Dispute Expected to Break Out Again When Portrait is Given to Capitol

AUSTIN, Aug. 19 — The dispute in Texas' art colony over the perfection of portraits hung in the state capitol is expected to break out anew when another picture of Sam Houston is presented during the proposed special session of the legislature.

The portrait, painted by T. J. Donnellan, depicts the noted Texas statesman at the height of his fame as United States Senator.

One portrait of Sam Houston owned by the state shows him in the evening of life. He wears a beaver hat and a blanket about his shoulders. Artists have been generous in their praise of the portrait particularly for the perfection of Houston's hands.

The hands of Former Governor James Stephen Hogg as shown in his portrait hanging in the hall of the House of Representatives, are criticized from the standpoint of execution. The hands are too small for a man his size, many artists have declared.

Careless Hunter
Critics also find fault with the house painting of Stephen F. Austin with a dog and rifle. The picture makes Austin appear to be a careless hunter. He has a finger over the muzzle of his long rifle.

The size of his head also has provoked arguments. State portraits show that the founder of the Texas colonies had an unusually large head. The sculpture by Elizabeth Ney, shows him with a small head.

A large painting of the battle of San Jacinto was purchased a number of years ago by the state and now hangs in the senate chamber. The painter, McArdle, spent years collecting photographs of participants in the battle and descriptions of their clothing and weapons.

Details of the uniforms of Mexican troops and the relative position of different organizations were taken from official records.

The picture's reputation for accuracy suffered somewhat when the flag carried through the smoke of the historic battle was presented the Texas House of Representatives. It differed considerably from its representation in the battle scene.

Many critics have pointed out that McArdle had to paint from descriptions alone and that its representation is remarkable in similarity to the actual flag.

RIGHTS SCRAP CONTINUES IN WEST STATES

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 19 — The status of disputes among western states surrounding and including Colorado has not quite reached the point where it may be said that all is quiet on the western front.

The quarrels center around such widely divergent things as water rights, boundaries, truck licenses and oil.

Each State Wants Power
A parley among Colorado, Nebraska and Wyoming over allocation of waters of the North Platte river adjourned here recently in a deadlock with each state standing pat for what it considered its rights. Each state wants more water for new power and irrigation projects.

Nebraska's claim to Platte river waters comes under the general heading, "First come first served." The corn and sugar beet growing state has received some court support to its contention that states nearer the headwaters of the river cannot deprive Nebraska of water after it already has developed irrigation projects.

Colorado Wants to Borrow
Colorado wants to borrow some water from the North Platte near the source, which is in Colorado, then pay it back later, meaning down the river farther, to Wyoming and Nebraska.

After starting in Colorado, the North Platte winds through Wyoming and that state wants its share for a big power and irrigation project near Casper. Nebraska also wants to expand its use of North Platte water by building a power and irrigation project near North Platte, Neb.

A satisfactory settlement of this tangled appears difficult.

Colorado and New Mexico still have a boundary dispute inherited from pioneer times. Governor Edwin C. Johnson of Colorado gave economy as a reason for refusing to permit an appropriation to complete a survey which would, perhaps, make it clear to some residents along the Colorado-New Mexico border just where they stood.

War on Licenses.
Fort Morgan, Colorado and Scottsbluff, Neb. were hot spots earlier this year in the Nebraska-Colorado truck license war. Arrests were made at both places of truckers of the other state who did not carry licenses of both states. Peace was declared when Colorado passed a reciprocal truck license law to conform with Nebraska's.

The difficulty over oil developed after Governor Johnson of Colorado, assured Gov. Leslie A. Miller his state would use Wyoming oil, in preference to all other, for improving its roads. The Standard Oil Company of California, however, claimed it offered oil to Colorado cheaper than Wyoming oil could be obtained. Wyoming believes that Colorado should prove its loyalty to its sister state by using its products. Coloradans are divided on that question.

MADRID, Aug. 19 — Rafael Vega de los Reyes, young brother of the late great bullfighter, Francisco Vega de los Reyes, "Gitanillo de Triana" (Little Gipsy of Triana) has been graduated from the junior ranks into those of the full-fledged bullfighters.

Family's Third Fighter
"Gitanillo III," as Rafael is called is the third of a family of fighters. One brother is retired, while the other, Francisco, was gored in May, 1931, and died a month and a half later from the injuries to his groin and thighs. His death was mourned not only in his native gipsy quarter of Triana, in Seville but by the whole Spanish nation.

Rafael has been a "novillero", or junior bullfighter, for the past year and therefore was entitled only to meet three-year-old bulls, or bulls which were slightly defective and had been rejected as unsuitable for the regulation fight.

To Receive Degree
He will receive his "alternative" or doctor's, degree of his dangerous profession on August 19, at Malaga. This will permit him to alternate in meeting the big bulls with the veteran fighters. Already he has contracted for appearances in Madrid, San Sebastian, Valladolid and Salamanca, and is negotiating for contracts at Barcelona, Seville, Valencia and Zaragoza.

The latest "Gitanillo" is regarded by bullfighting experts as having exceptional ability and grace. He is said to resemble the great Juan Belmonte with his solemn fineness and brilliant shading of the giant animals.
