SHANNONS RUSHED TO OKLAHOMA CITY

Other Large Purchasers Meet 10-Cent Hike in Crude Prices

2-CENT TOP IS POSTED IN THIS SECTION

Other large purchasers of crude in the mid-continent fields to fall rapidly into line with the prices announced yesterday by Humble Oil and Refining company and the Carter Oil company, Jersey Standard subsidiaries.

Fort Worth it was announced by the Sinclair-Prairie Oil Marketing association, one of the companies which last May led an advance in the Standard units refused to meet the new price for Oklahoma and Kansas, east Texas and other Texas fields.

The new schedule, effective at 7 p. m. today, calls for a 60-cent barrel flat rate for east Texas crude, a 72-cent top for Oklahoma and Kansas, and a minimum of 38 cents a barrel was posted with the Texas company and the Carter Oil company announced.

Anticipated balancing of production to conservative demand and price increases in the wholesale market of products were cited as reasons for the Humble company's price hike in crude prices, effective today.

The higher posting is effective in all fields from which the Humble company, like the Humble a New Jersey Standard subsidiary, joined the price increase.

Two Cents Spread The new schedule retains the two-cent spread, simply hiking all prices 20 cents. For the Cisco area it is a price of 38 cents per barrel for oil below 20 degrees and a top of 40 cents for oil of 40 and above.

WASHINGTON, August 25 — A revised code for the nation's retailers intended to regulate the advertising competition, wages and hours of 500,000 stores employing 5,000,000 persons, was put into final form by the national recovery administration today for submission to President Roosevelt.

REPEAL, BEER, BONDS AWAIT VOTERS' WILL

Cisco, in common with the rest of Texas, tomorrow will go to the polls to vote on repeal of national prohibition, and four proposed amendments to the state constitution, one of them modifying the state dry law to permit the sale of 3.2 per cent beer and wine.

In addition Ciscoans will vote with the rest of Eastland county on whether or not the county shall repeal its dry status under the local option law that governed prior to statewide constitutional prohibition.

But even if national prohibition is repealed Texas would still remain in the dry column so far as hard liquor is concerned because the state constitution expressly forbids sale, manufacture or transportation of alcoholic drinks within the state.

Other issues to be voted on tomorrow include a constitutional amendment giving the legislature authority to issue up to \$200,000,000 in relief bonds, funds of which are to be used to match federal appropriations, and a constitutional amendment giving counties the privilege of "home rule" governments.

STATE CONTROL STRENGTHENED, THOMPSON SAYS

AUSTIN, Aug. 25 — State control of oil production will be strengthened rather than destroyed by the adoption of the petroleum industry code and its federal supervision, Railroad Commr. Ernest O. Thompson reported at Austin when he returned from the final Washington hearings on the code.

The U. S. bureau of mines will investigate the oil situation, the needs for petroleum, imports and all other factors, and on its survey the federal government will "recommend" allowances for the states. This probably will fix one lump sum of daily production for the entire state, and allow the Texas commission to allocate it between the various fields.

And now the state railroad commission will go ahead with hearings on which to base orders fixing the daily production limits.

Texas Voters Facing Two Dry Issues Sat.

DALLAS, Aug. 25 — Prohibition faces a double-barreled attack from the Texas electorate Saturday as hundreds of thousands of persons cast ballots at a special election made nationally important because of the liquor vote.

Two clear-cut issues face the voters as they begin the trek to polling places. Of prime importance to the Roosevelt administration, whose spokesmen have appealed to Texas voters to adhere to the principles of the national democratic party, was repeal of the 18th amendment.

Senator Morris Sheppard, tight-lipped, persuasive public speaker, toured Texas in the interests of the drys. He traveled through every senatorial district in the state asking the people to support the 18th amendment, which he wrote into the United States constitution.

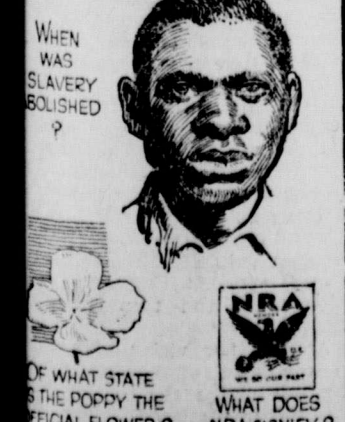

OIL PRICE INCREASE.

The Humble's 10-cent increase in the prices of crude oil yesterday is interpreted in various quarters both in the light of the recent Standard refusal to join other purchasers in a general increase and in the light of the defeat of the New Jersey Standard interests in their opposition to the price-fixing clause in the oil code which becomes effective September 2.

Be all this controversy as it will, the fact in which the public, whose well being is concerned with more prosperous times in the oil business, is interested is that prices have increased. Whether this increase was ulterior in motive or based upon sound industrial factors, it can be interpreted hopefully.

On the other hand, there are reasons to believe that a forecast of the future of the industry, as influenced by the new code, promises conditions sound enough to warrant anticipatory increases in price.

Unless we can be certain that both possible reasons for the increase argue the same end, we can have no faith in the effectiveness of the industrial recovery program. We prefer, if at all reasonable, to believe that things are getting better in the oil business.

TEST OF TEXAS FORESIGHT.

Tomorrow offers Texas both an opportunity and a test. Voters must decide whether their fellow-beings in this state shall go hungry, shall lack medicine in illness and garments to protect them from the winter's cold.

The best that can be done now to families who have no income is \$8 per month for a family of five. That means the barest possible food on which a family can live.

And Texas cannot assure its jobless, its aged and hungry people even this \$1.25-per-person dole after this week, unless its citizens go to the polls and provide a relief and rehabilitation fund with which to do the job.

That is, if they vote the public works bond issue tomorrow, they will provide for feeding the hungry and creating jobs for those who can work. They will gain the right to continue sharing federal money for this relief work.

Texasans know that so long as a dollar remains in the hands of any Texas citizen, or in the cash drawer of any Texas business corporation, people will not be allowed to lie helpless and starve. They know they must, in one way or another, pay the bill of feeding the hungry.

SETS DIFFICULT STANDARD.

Moore Lynn will retire Sept. 1 as state auditor, resigning a few days before the end of his term. He is the first state auditor of Texas. The law creating his office was passed back in the Moody administration.

Auditor Lynn established the worth and benefit of the office. He carved out an ambitious scope of work for the department, reaching out into the field of budgetary control for cities and counties and the state, as well as the post-audit of state accounts.

The full title of the chief of this department is "state auditor and efficiency expert." As efficiency expert, Mr. Lynn set up uniform methods for handling expense accounts of all departments, made a most voluminous survey of the functions and work of each clerk in each state department.

Under laws passed in connection with that creating his office, he has begun to keep records of the fees paid all county officers, the excess fees paid into the county treasuries; and the city and county and state budgets from year to year. A further step to take and keep the auditor's department out of politics was recommended in the joint legislative efficiency and economy survey, and embodied in the administrative code.

Mr. Lynn, in closing his service, has established the new state department on a high plane, as little as possible under present conditions affected by politics. His successors will have a real mark to shoot at.

Creation of the department in which he has served meant the doom of the wasteful fee system of paying county officials; and even before that obsolete mass of privilege legislation is swept off the books, the work of Mr. Lynn and the senate fee investigating committee is saving the state more than \$400,000 a year, by requiring county fee officers to take care against fraudulent, padded and excessive claims.

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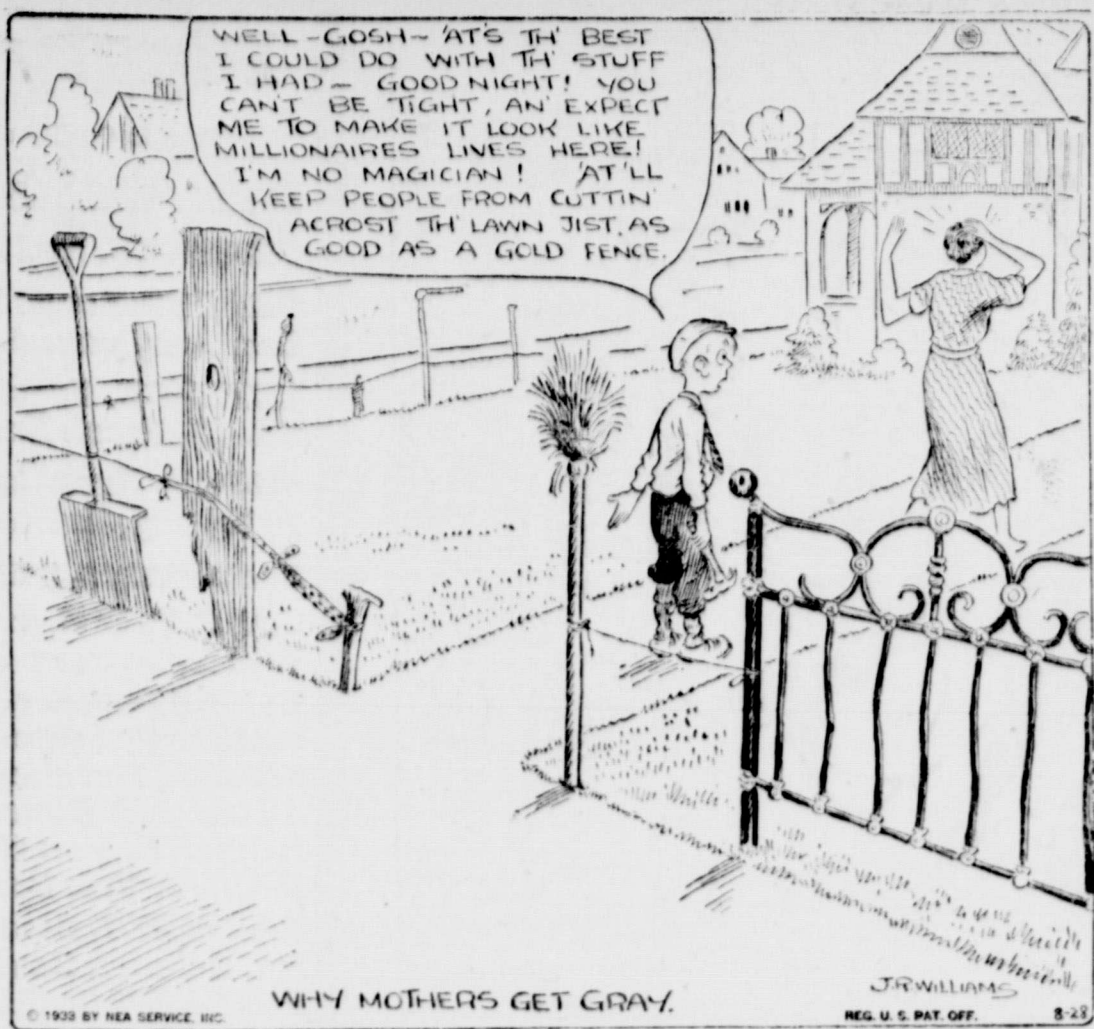

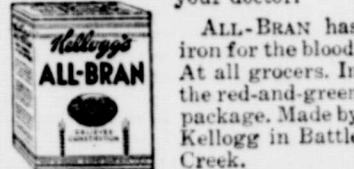

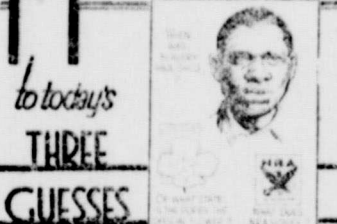

U.S. COTTON IN BEST POSITION IN THREE YEARS

AUSTIN, Aug. 25—American cotton is in the strongest position it has occupied for three years, due to a reduction of the carryover in the United States of about 1,500,000 bales as of August 1, according to Dr. A. B. Cox, director of the University of Texas bureau of business research and internationally known cotton authority.

"This drastic reduction in carryover was offset to a considerable extent by a crop estimate as of August 1 of 12,314,000 bales, or 1,008,000 bales more than the estimate on this date last year," Dr. Cox said. "The net supply of cotton in the United States for the 1933-34 including carryover plus the estimated crop is 20,490,000 bales. This compares with 20,958,000 bales last year and 21,950,000 bales two years ago."
