DRIVE AGAINST SMALL STATIONS.

Small radio stations which have sprung up over the state, unlicensed on the theory that a station broadcasting solely intrastate is not subject to federal regulations, are shortly to get the ax. Thad H. Brown, vice-chairman of the federal radio commission, is in Texas claiming to have evidence against 43 stations in the state which do not have fed-

This paragraph of a statement issued by Vice-chairman Brown is significant:

"There is no such thing as an intrastate station. Every station which operates comes under our jurisdiction." In other words no matter whether a radio station is or is not heard across the borders of the state in which it operates, it is subject to the regulations which the federal government has prescribed for the control of such stations and it cannot claim immunity from those regulations simply by reason of having no power beyond a state line.

The air is the property of the public. It is neither owned by nor subject to the control of a private individual or corporation. The very nature of radio broadcasting and the America's greatest enemy is not without, but within. medium through which it operates make it incomformable to National indifference and public neglect are to blame. state control. told the nation last night over a radio hookup in a war for a "new deal. against crime sponsored by the United States Flag association. It is a "foreign army," the secretary explained, because it is foreign to everything that is American. He declared that this "scarlet army of crime" is perpetrating greater oppression than the American colonists suffered before they threw off the yoke in the war of the Revolution.

The war secretary's appeal to the American people to enter a united action to drive crime from America was one of the series of appeals which come each Monday evening at 7:30 over a national radio broadcast. It is a campaign to arouse public sentiment in a war that will not cease until the last vestige of this criminal scourge is driven from Ameri-

can soil. Existing conditions the secretary blamed upon the "indifference of the American people." This indifference is indeed the crime of the American nation. It is true that





BRITISH PRAISE ROOSEVELT FOR HIS COURAGE

United Press Staff Correspondent LONDON, Aug. 29 — British opin-ion of Franklin Roosevelt, after the first six months of his presidency, is ympathetic and friendly, though tinged with doubt as to the ultimate success of his "planned economy."

Conservative economists have been denouncing him as reckless; socialists insist that any attempt at governmental planning within the capitalist system is foredoomed to failure but all criticism here is mingled with admiration for Roosevelt's courage in shouldering responsibility, taking risks and acting.

Even though an important section of British industry and argiculture prefers an ingrown policy of economic isolation. the pressure of the Dominions, notably Canada and Australia, is strongly pulling Britain towards measures in harmony with the United States.

Unbiased commentators here understand, and the fair-minded section of the press has tried to make clear to its readers, that Roosevelt is not primarily concerned with lowering the value of the dollar in relation to the pound, franc o r mark, but wants the dollar to be worth less goods. It is realized that his objective would best be gained if other countries pursued a policy of reflation in concurrence with that of the United States.



ETHNOLOGIST . TRACES NAME **ADIRONDACKS**

WASHINGTON, August 29 — In tracing the origin of the name "Adirondack," J. N. B. Hewitt, Smithsonian ethnologist, has found that the Mohawks didn't know their

great rocks from their tree eaters. In Mohawk the name Adirondack means "they eat wood or trees." It is supposed to have come from an Algonquin tribe formerly living on the Ottawa river—who at times were claimed to have been driven to eating bark. However, Hewitt explains, since bark eating was in no outstanding sense a habit peculiar to this people, this is not the historical origin of the name.

The real orginin of the name Hewitt says, comes from a tribe of "Arendahronon" (meaning "they the great rocks") who dwelt on the rocks of the lower St. Lawrence river


When the Mohawks analyzed the word Anendahronon, according to their lexicon it meant tree eaters. The Huron epithet, 'Atowarontas' (the great rock), through synony-mic relation with the tribal name Arendahronon (the rock clan or tribe)," Hewitt explains, "thus became the Mohawk 'Atirondacks,' and by the vagaries of traditional confusions has become the name of a small Algonquin people and of the noted group of mountains in the Northeastern part of the state of Adoption of the word Adirondack is allegedly the work of English speaking topographers.

An interesting phase pointed out by Hewitt in the history of the name of the famous mountain range, is the first recording by Dutch traders in the winter of 1634-35 in an instructive vocabulary of Mohawk words; herein it is written, "Aderondacke," with the translation Frenchmen and Englishmen," although no evidence is included show that the French and Englishmen were tree and bark eaters.

SIGNIFICANT REVISIONS IN LEAGUE RULES

AUSTIN, Aug. 29 - A number of significant changes have been made in rules and regulations governing Interscholastic League activities, according to Roy Bedichek, chief of the University of Texas league bureau. A re-districting plan has been adopted by the state executive committee which introduces regional eliminations between the district meets and the state meet. A rule has been adopted to prevent the barring from fall competition of otherwise eligible pupils whose schools closed early on account of financial difficulties. A third change affects the league essay contest.

Under the plan as outlined and adopted by the state executive committee the number of districts in the Ford, and other relatives here. Texas Inter-cholastic league has been increased from 27 to 31. "This will reduce the number of contestants eligible to the state meet, and at the same time will bring the meets closer to the schools," Mr. Bedichek explained. "It has become necessary to lessen the amount of school time devoted to inter-school contests and also to decrease the amount of traveling expenses to which schools are put to send contestants to various meets. The new plan as it will appear in the 1933 edition of the constitution and rules accomplishes this purpose The meets are brought closer to the schools and a smaller number are qualified for the state meet."

At the same meeting the state committee considered the case of schools which were compelled to Many questions have arisen in connection with the eligibility of pupils this fall who were compelled to drop out of school before the end of the semester on account of the fact that the schools were closed. The "Preceding Semester Rule" would automatically bar such pupils.
