CELEBRATION OF THE FREEDOM OF THE PRESS. Thomas Jefferson battled for the freedom of the press.

Now editors and publishers in a 260-year-old church at Mt. Vernon, N. Y., celebrated the 200th anniversary of the freedom of the press. The setting of the celebration was the famous St. Paul's church, Eastchester, established in 1665

and called "the cradle of the free press. John Peter Zenger, who edited a local newspaper, denounced the frauds perpetrated by the royal government. He was arrested and tried for libel in the first test of free speech in the colonies. All the colonists watched the trial. Zenger was defended by a brilliant lawyer. He won an ac-

This set an international precedent for the doctrine of the freedom of the press. It furnished the basis for the idea of the free press of America as embodied in the Jeffersonian article, first of the amendments to the constitution of the nixed States. Freedom of thought, freedom of action, freem of conscience, or the freedom of the individual to cast fearless ballot cannot exist in any land where the press is muzzled or its columns dominated by agents of bland autocracy. A muzzled press is a hireling press, a press without a conscience even doing the bidding of an imperial master or a ruthless dictator. In America the press is free. It was purchased by patriots at the price of their blood and their

General compilation of the reports for the five states will be carried on at Austin.

A specialized phase of the national relief program, the handling of transient relief, is now being well organized, with Marshall B. Thompson named as transient relief director for Texas.

The federal government will handle transient relief on a nationwide scale, without calling on local relief organizations. Local authorities wil assist in segregating the transients from local relief charges.

Well - informed opinion among those in contact with federal patronage inclines to the idea that internal revenue collector for the Austin district—the southern district of Texas — will not be named for several months. The office hecame vacant when Judge A. S. Walker died two months after returning to it. He had been collector during the Wilson administration.

Sen. Morris Sheppard has endorsed Frank Scoffield of Hillsboro for the post, as he did back in March, when Sen. Tom Connally's endorse.

Sen. Connally runs for re-election next year. He has chosen the dry side of the prohibition issue. needs votes; particularly south Texas votes, and labor votes. It has not been officially announced that he has extended his support to Mr. Scofield.

Scofield was finance director for the democratic national campaign in Texas last year. Two factors may militate against him-one that he has not been a resident of the south Texas district; the other that he already has been placed in an important public job, as chairman of the

Texas state racing commission. There is presure on Sen. Connally now to favor the appointment of someone who will have large influence upon the labor vote.

It is regarded in Texas as a fortunate selection made by the league of Texas Municipalities when it chose former City Mgr . Adam R. Johnson of Austin as a representative to sponsor municipal public works projects. Mr. Johnson recently has completed an arduous voluntary and unpaid service as head of the national recovery organization set-up in his home city.

He is a hard-headed business man conservative to whom ballyhoo and promotion are foreign; when he submits a federal public orks project, his presentation will inspire the confidence that it is sound and worthy.






