TWO RAIDERS FREE 5 TEXAS CONVICTS

Movement to Supplant Westbrook With Bandeen Charged

DIRECTOR IS ENDORSED BY COMM'N VOTE

AUSTIN, Jan. 16. — Smothered flames of disagreement in the Texas relief commission broke through today and resulted in a seething session which ended in a resolution endorsing State Relief Director Lawrence Westbrook and department heads in relief administration. The vote followed a statement in the commission meeting that there was a movement on foot in west Texas to have Westbrook supplanted by D. A. Bandeen, Stamford, manager of the West Texas chamber of commerce.

Commission members voting for the resolution were Ed Hussion, Austin; B. E. Giesecke, Austin; W. Brooks, Jr., Dallas; Carl Estes, El Paso; and Robert Real, Kerrville. W. N. Christman, Dallas; Earle Gams, Crockett; and R. L. Holliday, El Paso, asked to be recorded present and not voting. Brooks brought the matter to a vote.

NACTMENT OF FUND MONEY PLAN SEEMS CERTAIN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16. — Congress appeared certain today to enact the President Roosevelt's money plan under the law of the land. The gold reserve act, title of a bill carrying out the president's recommendations for taking into the treasury all monetary gold and valuing the gold content of the dollar at a point between 50 and 60 cents, aroused considerable dispute. A sentiment appeared overwhelming in support of the measure. Senate republicans were called together to discuss opposition strategy. Their leaders, however, had little chance of defeating the president's program.

As Two New Wells Completed in Young

Charles Kleiner, Cisco oil operator, tomorrow will go to Young county where he has had two new wells completed since the first of the year. The wells are the Belknap Coal company's No. 3 which came in for 200 barrels daily from 703 feet, and the same company's No. 4, completed for 200 barrels from 692 feet.

Testimony Begins in Wynekoop Trial

CHICAGO, Jan. 16.—The mystery of Rheta Wynekoop's death took form in court room testimony today as the state sought a grim defense for the life of Dr. Alice Wynekoop, the victim's mother-in-law, charged with the slaying. The strain in the court room grew as the murder trial moved into the third day. "The whole court room is sitting on a bomb shell," said one of the physicians attending the accused woman. "Dr. Wynekoop's illness is such that she might collapse without warning," the physician said. "Her condition is grave. Nevertheless, the woman physician drove her attorneys forward with the case."

8 Jurors Chosen in Richardson Trial

GRAHAM, Jan. 16.—When the noon recess was called today, eight jurors had been selected for the trial of Charles Richardson, former mayor of Olney, under indictment for murder in the death of his son, Elga, on New Year's day. Sixty-two of the 108 veniremen summoned had been examined. Attorneys were hopeful of completing the jury today. The shooting of young Richardson was said to have climaxed a family quarrel.

"SHAKE-UP" IN COUNTY C.W.A. IS PROMISED

A "shake-up" in the Eastland county CWA organization was promised by District Director F. H. Bushick, who yesterday told a citizens meeting in the county court house at Eastland, that he had recommended to the state board dismissal of County Director W. W. Gilbert. Bushick made this revelation in the course of a meeting called by County Relief Board Chairman Earl Conner to consider recommendations for restricting CWA appointments to rural projects in order not to interfere with the supply of farm labor in the county. Chairman Conner called upon a number of representative citizens as well as County Agent J. C. Patterson and County Home Demonstration Agent Miss Ruth Ramey, each of whom asserted that not less CWA funds for rural projects, but more were needed. Patterson said that not more than 25 of the workers in rural CWA projects could find farm employment if the CWA work should be stopped. He and others said that the CWA work given to farmers would provide the cash they need to make their crops, and said that there is plenty of farm labor to do the work required. Patterson explained that Eastland county farms are small and that very little hired labor is used.

No Direct Charge
Bushick made no direct charges in his statement. He did say before revealing his recommendation, that Eastland county had been the source of more complaints than any other county in his district of 23. He declared that \$80,000 per month is expended in federal funds in the county and that inadequate records and administration exist to account for it. He indicated that specific charges will be placed before the county committee.

Hearing For All
Chairman Conner said that when the matter comes before the county committee everyone interested will be given a fair hearing. "No recommendation has been filed with this committee," he reminded.

Spurious Cigaret Tax Charges Filed

AUSTIN, Jan. 16. — Charges of counterfeiting cigaret tax stamps were filed in justice of peace court here today against F. A. Melton and M. T. Bockery, Dallas, after state officers had seized stamps representing a value between \$5,000 and \$7,000.

Former Baylor Grid Captain Is Killed

WACO, Jan. 16.—Charles Taylor, Waco, former captain of the Baylor university football and, until the close of the 1932 season, coach of the Hillsboro high school eleven, was killed instantly here today in an automobile-truck collision. Taylor was riding in a bakery truck with Douglas Pitts when the truck collided with a passenger car driven by Earle DeGraffenreid, of New York.

LONG MACHINE DENOUNCED IN SENATE REPORT

WASHINGTON, D. C. Jan. 16. — A stern denunciation of "vicious and abhorrent political practices" in Louisiana was conveyed to the senate today by its special committee which investigated 1932 campaign expenditures by Sen. Huey P. Long's state democratic organization. The committee reported that it felt itself bound "candidly and frankly to reveal to the senate the deplorable and distressing political conditions existing in Louisiana."

Fire Destroys Car And Garage at Home

A "short" in the wiring is blamed for flames what destroyed a Chevrolet coupe and the garage in which it was kept at the home of Jack Jameyson, oil driller and acting game warden, at 900 West Ninth street, last night. Mr. Jameyson had just returned from a well on which he was working. He said that he smelled a faint odor of burning rubber as he put the car up but thought nothing of it. The fire broke out a short while later and gained such headway that firemen were unable to save either the machine or the building, neither of which was insured. The fire breaks a record of more than 160 days without a blaze of sufficient consequence to require water being thrown on it.

\$951.60 Cuero's Fire Loss During 1933
CUERO, Jan. 16. — Cuero's volunteer fire department showed a total fire loss of only \$951.60 for the past year. City valuations are listed at more than \$3,000,000. Chief R. F. Heyer believes the record will be outstanding among state reports.

2 GUARDS SHOT DOWN; BARROW IS SUSPECTED

CROCKETT, Jan. 16. — Two men manning machine guns, one of them believed to have been Clyde Barrow, notorious southwest gunman, liberated five convicts from the Eastham prison farm near here today and wounded two guards. Raymond Hamilton, former Dallas county desperado, ally of Barrow and under life sentence, was one of the five who escaped.

The others were A. B. French, of Hunt county, W. H. Bybee, of Stephenson county, Henry Megheid, of Refugio county, and Joe Palmer, of Limestone county. The delivery was made as the men prepared to leave the camp about 7 o'clock to chop wood. Two men in a small black sedan began firing with machine guns as the line of convicts reached the open, dropping the two guards. Then, as if prearranged, Hamilton and his four companions broke from the ranks and fled to the waiting car. The machine roared away with a hail of bullets pouring from guns of the two delivery and weapons issued the five men who joined them.

Condition Critical
Major Crawford, of Lovelady, one of the guards, is in critical condition at the prison hospital in Huntsville. Glen Bozeman, the other guard, also is at Huntsville with less serious wounds. All of those who escaped with Hamilton were classified as dangerous characters. They were serving the following terms: Bybee—Life, for murder; French—Twelve years for robbery with firearms; Megheid—Ten years for assault with intent to murder; Palmer—Twenty-five years for robbery with fire arms.

Combination Rate On Announcements

House Debates Farm Loan Guarantee Bill

WASHINGTON, D. C. Jan. 16.—The house began debate on the farm loan bond guarantee bill today with majority leaders hopeful for passage of the administration measure before adjournment. The bill places a federal guarantee on the principal as well as the interest of \$2,000,000 in authorized farm credit bonds.

CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE will wipe out all trace of the depression. In Eastland county you have a fight on your hands." He pointed to large office buildings which are for the most part empty and other evidences of the depression.

Moved Headquarters

In order to systematize the CWA program in the county, Bushick said, he had moved the offices from Cisco and established them at Eastland near the county commissioners court and the center of the county, where the law, as he explained, requires them to be established.

He told the group that he had not gone to "our employes" to obtain information upon how the CWA program is being received and what results and satisfaction are being obtained, but that he had interviewed the representative citizens of each community and obtained their reactions. He also said that his recommen-

dations with respect to CWA appropriations for the various counties are received with confidence at Austin. When it is his opinion that the CWA program is showing results in bettering economic conditions, he said, he recommends a reduction of the appropriation. He told the

Eastland county group however, that his recommendation for this county would not be along the line of curtailment. Mr. Glibert has been county relief director ever since the old RFC program was reorganized and a new set-up established in the county

about a year ago. He has county CWA administrator program was instituted in the county early last fall. Under his direction approximately 2,000 jobs have been given employment the CWA.

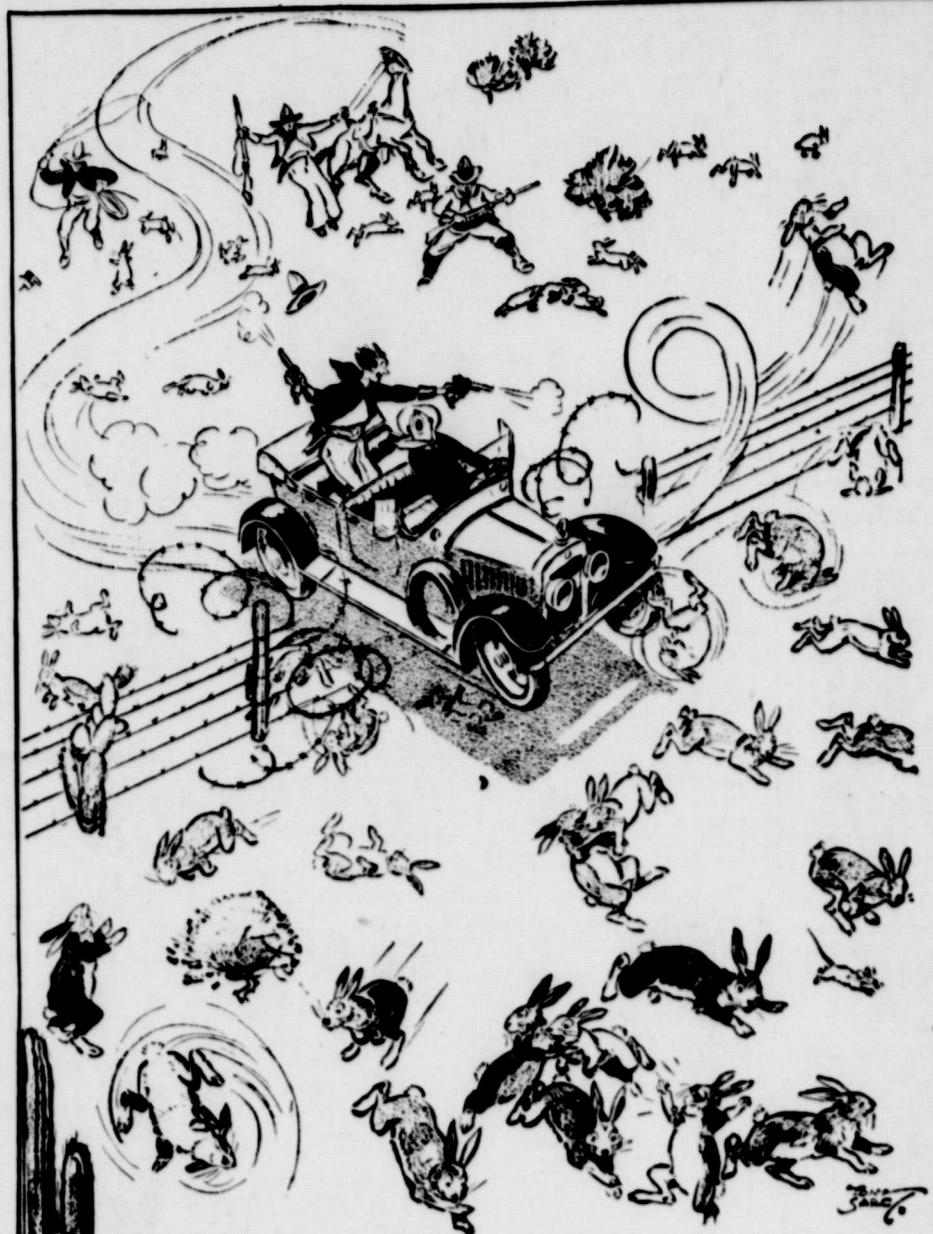
