



PROTEST COTTON REQUIREMENT

The minimum requirement of 100 pounds per acre average production threatens the success of the federal government's cotton reduction campaign, declare a group of farmers and farm leaders who have called a mass meeting of cotton growers of this area to meet at Anson Saturday to consider the problem. The administration will accept no contracts upon and pay no rentals for land which over the five-year base period, 1928 to 1932, inclusive, did not produce an average of 100 pounds of lint cotton per acre. In the case of Eastland county, this regulation will exclude a great number of growers who would otherwise cooperate. The country's average acre production over the period is said to be less than 100 pounds. 

Jack Jameyson's car and garage were destroyed.

Cisco property owners are today paying the cost of excessive fire losses in previous years. A 12 per cent penalty has been added to the insurance rate to re-imburse the insurance companies for the money paid out during years when there were frequent and destructive fires. It is further unfortunate that the increased cost took place during d pression years.

The 12 per cent means that sev eral thousands of dollars in addi-tional premiums go out of Cisco anmually. It does the local agents no good, for they receive no increased commissions. It injures their bus ness, instead, for the higher cost may deter prospective purchasers of insurance protection.

Now, while Cisco is having success with its fire prevention program, it is time to lay new emphasis upon the necessity of public cooperation in Keeping Cisco free of fires. Let's keep up the good record.
