Cotton Consumption, Retail Sales Are Up

AUSTIN, March 24 — Awakening of business under the recovery program was reflected today in February cotton consumption of Texas mills and increased dollar sales in retail stores as reported by the University of Texas bureau of business research.

Texas mills used 6,043 bales of cotton last month, an increase of 92 per cent over the 3,990 bales consumed in February, 1933, the bureau reported.

Last month's retail sales in 88 department stores were 32 per cent greater than those for February 1933, based on dollar volume, the bureau said.

AUSTIN, March 24 — Jobs will decide the 1934 governor's race in Texas unless some "big issue" is found to arouse the people.

When Gov. Ferguson took office in 1933, state boards were made up of members appointed by Gov. Dan Moody and by Gov. Ross Sterling.

REVIEW BOARD AGREED TO BY AUTO MAKERS

WASHINGTON, March 24 — Automobile manufacturers announced today they had agreed on establishment of an impartial board to review cases of alleged discrimination against union members in the motor industry.

The statement indicated, however, that the manufacturers had reached no agreement on procedure for workers' elections, one of the key issues in the threatened strike.

President Roosevelt held himself in readiness for further conferences looking toward a definite agreement.

Manufacturers are believed still unwilling to recognize the American Federation of Labor as "such" although they might agree as in the case of the steel industry in the captive mines case.

J. C. TAYLOR, 78, NOTED BAPTIST MINISTER, DEAD... RANGER, March 24 — Funeral services will be held here Sunday afternoon at the Central Baptist church at 2:30 for the Rev. J. C. Taylor, 78, noted Baptist minister.

His death occurred at City-county hospital at 30 Friday night after a long illness which two years ago forced his retirement from active service.

The aged minister is survived by four daughters and two sons, his wife having died in 1932 at Ranger. He and his wife, who was Miss Mary Sanson, were married at Crockett, Texas, in 1892.

Burglars Get \$10,000 From Missouri Bank... OSCEOLA, Mo., March 24 — Three robbers entered the Johnson-Lucas bank here today, cut their way into the vault with an acetylene torch and escaped with loot estimated at \$10,000 cash.

SIXTEEN DEAD IN TRANSIENT HOME FLAMES

LYNCHBURG, Va., March 24 — Sixteen destitute men were burned to death and approximately 85 were injured when fire swept through the federal transient bureau home here today.

Bodies of the 16 were recovered. It was feared the ruins might contain others. Some of those injured were burned so severely that they were not expected to live.

Witnesses said the crack of breaking bones could be heard above the flames. Many of those injured suffered broken legs, arms and backs.

Started in Kitchen... The fire started in the kitchen and the cook, frightened, ran screaming. The flames, sucked by the draft, swept up the elevator shaft and soon the old structure was ablaze from floor to roof.

There were 200 persons in the building when the blaze broke out. The great toll of dead and injured was attributed partially to the fact that the cook spent some time in trying to extinguish the blaze in the kitchen, while sleeping transients, as they awakened became so excited they failed to turn in the alarm.

Bybee Is Sought In Northern Texas

FORT WORTH, March 24 — North Texas and panhandle officers today kept a sharp lookout for Hilton Bybee, fugitive life-terminer who escaped yesterday from the Houston county jail after overpowering a deputy sheriff.

Bybee abandoned the deputy's car, which he had taken in his escape, several miles northwest of here last night after robbing A. P. Ward of Dublin of \$20 and taking Ward's car.

Officers believed Bybee might still be hiding in North Texas haunts or that he and the companion who escaped with him from the Crockett jail might have fled into Oklahoma.

REJUVENATION OF LEAGUE IS RUSSIAN AIM... PARIS, France, March 24 — Authoritative sources asserted today that soviet Russia, fearful of a collapse of disarmament efforts, was eager to lead a great movement of world powers for revival of the League of Nations and was negotiating with the United States to that end.

It was asserted that American Ambassador Wm. Bullitt at Moscow and the Russian ambassador at Washington were conducting negotiations in behalf of their governments.

FRANCE ASKS SECURITY GUARANTEE OF BRITAIN... LONDON, March 24 — A somewhat funereal note from France on disarmament left Great Britain still willing today to seek further for a solution of the problem.

As the note was published, the French war ministry announced that beginning April 6 it would accept 18 months' enlistment from men who had fulfilled their compulsory military training period of one year.

Overpass Approved For Cleburne Road... AUSTIN, March 24 — A railroad overpass between Cleburne and Burleson on Highway No. 2-A to be carried out under the national recovery act has been approved by the district engineer of the bureau of public roads and will be let early in April, the state highway department announced today.

BRIM PICKED CHAIRMAN OF STATE GROUP

HOUSTON, March 24 — James E. Ferguson, Texas political power for the past 20 years, appealed for "unity in our ranks" as he was given a seat on the national democratic committee here today by the state executive committee.

Loud cheers and prolonged hand-clapping followed Ferguson's elevation to the national position. He succeeds Jed Adams of Dallas who resigned.

Resolution Defeated... Likewise the Ferguson machine rode down Mr. Hughes' resolution to place a woman for every man on the state committee. Charges of Mr. Hughes "playing politics" came from committee members.

John Davis of Dallas, follower of Mr. Ferguson, advised that women could be elected to the executive committee as now constituted and a substitute resolution was offered to that effect.

Believe Dillinger Trail is Picked Up... CHICAGO, March 24 — A special squad of heavily armed police was believed today to have picked up the trail of John Dillinger, notorious gunman, following the discovery of a hideaway in which the outlaw had taken refuge.

Insull Ship Said To Be Near Rhodes... ATHENS, Greece, March 24 — The Athenian Athos reported today that the chartered freight steamship Maelots, on which Samuel Insull is seeking a refuge from American extradition proceedings, was near the island of Rhodes, near the Turkish coast.

Dr. Wynekoop Term Set to Begin Thurs. CHICAGO, March 24 — Her motion for a new trial overruled, Dr. Alice Lindsay Wynekoop today was sentenced to begin serving a 25-year prison term next Thursday for the slaying of her daughter-in-law, Rheta Wynekoop.

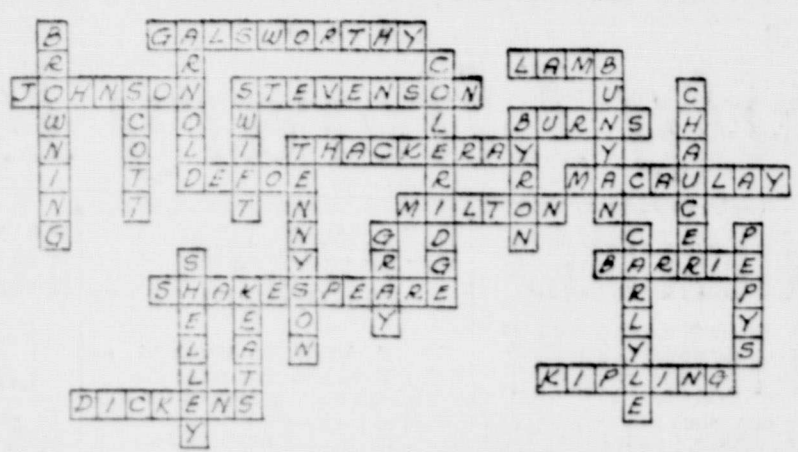
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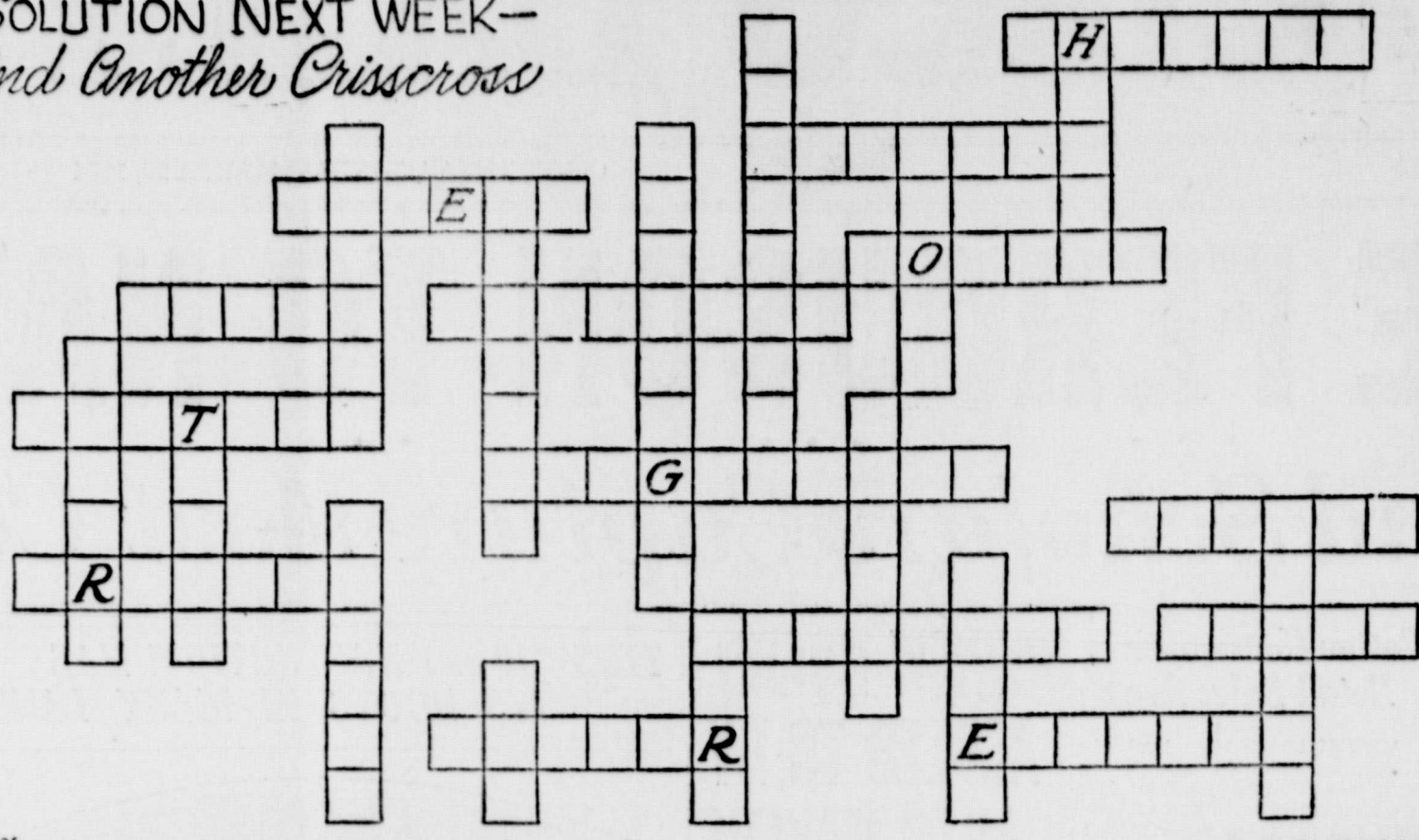

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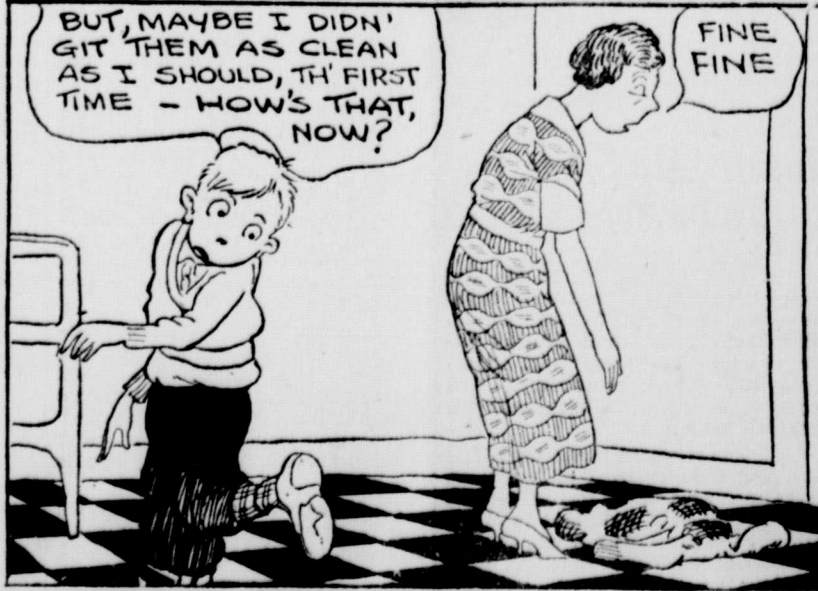

LATERAL ROADS.

The vital place that lateral roads play in community transportation is not always appreciated by the town dweller or the citizen whose business does not carry him off the paved cardinal roads. A great deal of emphasis, rightly enough, has been placed upon the development of trunk line routes of travel which afford swift and direct transportation over long distances, linking areas and linking cities and giving a fluidity to traffic that binds the nation into a more harmonious political and economic whole.

The emphasis that has been and continues to be placed upon the improvement of lateral routes in Eastland county is, locally speaking, the most significant phase of road development here. Cisco is situated similarly to numerous other small cities in that it finds the building of high speed highways prone to attract away business that its merchants could handle as adequately as merchants in larger communities.

The development of an adequate and all-weather system of lateral roads, threading every nook and corner of the trade territory of a community is essential to realizing the fullest benefits of the paved cardinal highways which serve that community. Roads lead into or out of a community, depending entirely upon the initiative of that community.

The insistence of the Texas Good Goods association and other civic agencies that road building constitutes the most effective method of spending federal relief money ought to be qualified to demand more lateral road improvement. The CWA experience has left Eastland county and many other counties considerable benefits in such projects.

PUBLIC TASTE IS CLEAN

The success that the picturization of Louisa May Alcott's classic "Little Women," chaste romance of mid-Victorian American home life, is reported to have attained even in New York's sophisticated atmosphere, is another evidence of the fact that the American public still can appreciate the simple and the clean. A highly seasoned diet of synthetic gangsterism and so-called ultra-modernism, much of it plainly propagandist, has not sufficed to dull appreciation of the homely virtues.

RICH FEES FOR RECEIVERS

Rep. Hatton Summers of Texas is the chairman of the house judiciary committee. That committee is delving into federal receiverships in the city of Chicago. Thus far the investigation has disclosed evidence that \$4,500,000 in fees was shared among lawyers, receivers and masters in chancery in two cases in the court of Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson. The fat sum of \$2,476,088 was divided in one railroad receivership case. Testimony was drawn from witnesses in the Chicago city street railway case that \$4,000,000 was raised by assessment of the Milwaukee Railway's 25,000 stockholders to be divided by interested attorneys without first consulting Judge Wilkerson.

United States senators without ever having applied for any job, without ever having said whether he was a doctor, lawyer, architect or anything else except that he voted the democratic ticket, is now being told to the accompaniment of gleeful chortling. His experience may be used as a horrible example of the political patronage system, as administered by Mr. Farley and the dominant democratic party.

He will not use the man's name who maneuvered such an unusual blanket indorsement out of patronage dispensers; but the man is one of good reputation and standing. He never had any political contacts; and the correspondence reflects Sen. Connally and Sen. Sheppard neither ever heard of him before.

Early last year he wrote Nat'l. Chmn. Farley asking a political appointment. Farley wrote back that the party was going to reward good loyal party men, and suggested he take the matter up with his senators. This the man did, repeating that he was "right" as a democrat.

Sen. Connally's secretary sent back a long mimeographed form letter, saying it was no use to apply in general, and suggesting that he must ask for a specific job. Sen. Sheppard's secretary wrote back a similar letter.

Then followed a dozen letters to and from each senator, ending with letters from both Connally's and Sheppard's secretaries that the senators had "this day filed formal indorsement with the Hon. James A. Farley" recommending the man in blank for an appointment.

Except advising him that he would have a better chance by single-shotting some particular job than a broadside, no word was said in any of the correspondence, either with Farley or with the senators, as to qualifications or fitness or his ability or technical training if any, or the line of work. Sen. Connally did tell him there was little chance of landing an appointment unless he picked out the job and asked for it; but even that letter interposed no question whether he would be able to perform the duties of the office.

The correspondence closed abruptly with the formal indorsement of the two senators of the man they didn't know for any gift within the president's power. The man, already engaged in his own line of work, in which he stands high, has evidenced no intention of applying for any job. But he has had a lot of fun, and said he had gained "a lot of prestige" in the exchange.
