

BEGINNING A NEW ERA

A new treaty between the United States and Cuba. from which the Platt amendment is omitted, has been sent to the words of sympathy cannot bring New Orleans federal circuit court of senate of the United States by President Roosevelt for rati-fication. The treaty reserves to this country only the right fication. The treaty reserves to this country only the right to maintain a naval base at Quantanamo, relinquishing those of intervening in Cuban affairs to maintain Cuban independence or protect American lives and property. The Platt! amendment was incorporated in the Cubar constitution after the United States had wrested the island from Spanish misgovernment and declared its independence. Its ostensible purpose was to enable this country to preserve the constitutional government that had been purchased for the island people with the blood of American soldiers and sailors.

In affirming the doctrine of non-interference, the United States enters upon a new era of diplomatic relations with its Latin-American neighbors, an era in which these peoples are recognized as something more than irresponsible little brothers upon whom this nation is required to force its protecting influence. The period of the Monroe Doctrine which ruled United States' relations with the Central and South American countries for a century is past. That doctrine served well in a period when the people to the south of us were struggling for freedom from European tyranny and the right to govern themselves in accord with the principles of liberty upon which the United States established itself. It gave their cause the powerful influence of a proven power and prevented their independence, once won, from being destroyed by a reinvasion of former conquerors. But the Monroe Doctrine was never intended to be the basis of a domination of these small countries by the United States. It has been cited in recent years as the justification for American interference in the political affairs of some of these troubled nations; and the American marine was by far the most serious element in the whole picture of Pan-American relations. What benefits of order and strong government were claimed for these interventions were dissipated in the larger and subversive result of hatred and resentment that was cultivated. These influences were increasingly operative in every Pan-American congress, and the most apparent issue in the last congress when Sec'y of State Hull enunciated the new "Roosevelt Doctrine" of which the proposed new treaty with Cuba is an expression.

The doctrine, confirmed by an official act that establishes it as a policy rather than diplomatic buncombe, will accomplish more in behalf of Pan-American security and order and the strengthening of cordial relations between those countries and ourselves than any diplomatic gesture has ever done. It paves the way for a real Pan-American cooperation by means of which the United States can exert a constructive influence far beyond the possibilities of armed intervention. It establishes a basis of political equality and goodwill upon which international trade relations and the economic good of the western hemisphere may be projected

in a broad and amicable program. The Platt amendment, under which a few large American sugar interests in Cuba claimed the protection of American warships and marines, is a mighty small price to pay for great international good that ought to be the result of this new American attitude toward our sister republics to the south.






