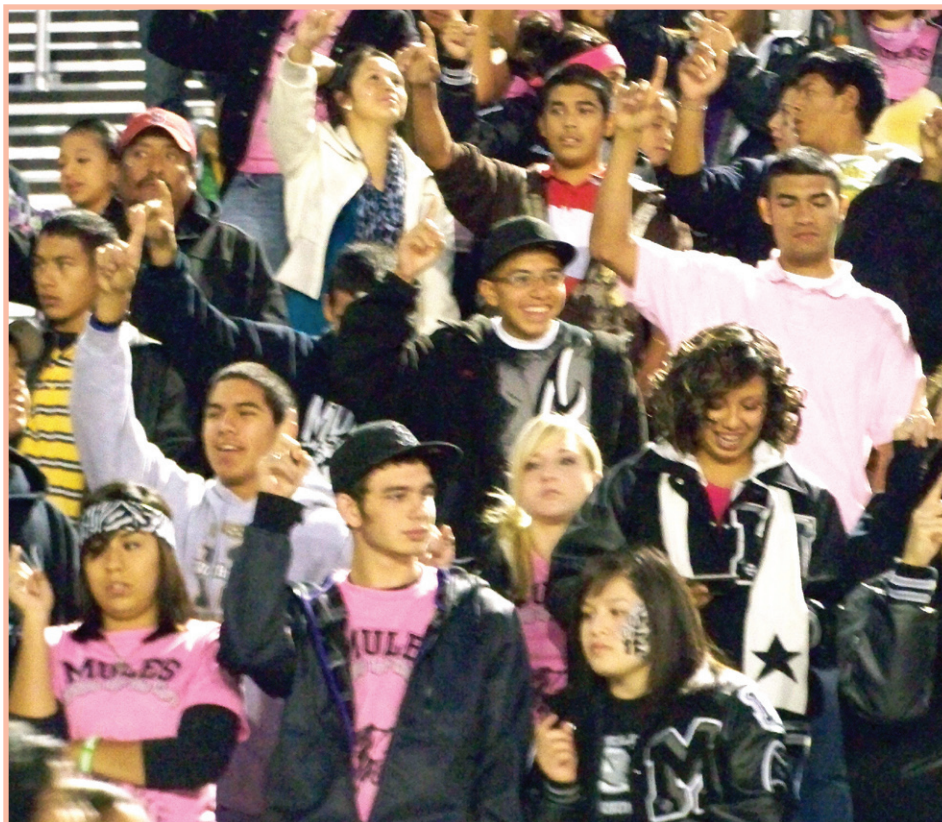
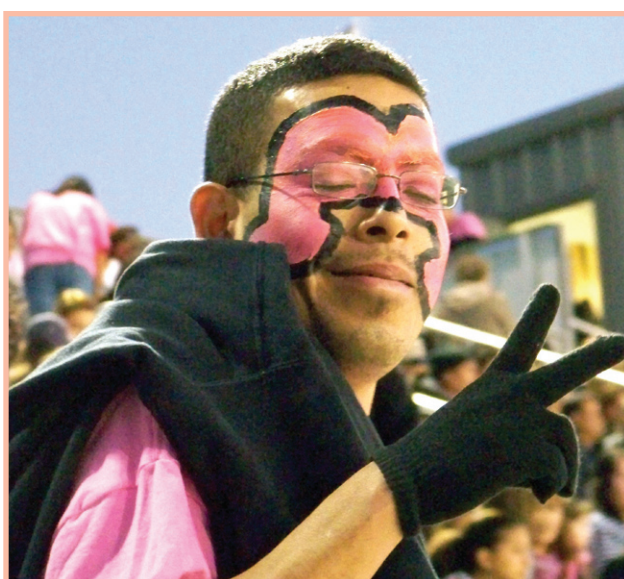

Mules' 'sew up' playoff berth

Bitter taste is gone

The Mules accomplished two of their early season goals Friday night.

They sewed up a state playoff berth and finally were able to get the foul taste left in their mouths last season by their defeat in the opening round of the playoffs by the River Road Wildcats.

The Mules pounded the Wildcats to lead 51-0 after three quarters. They added three more touchdowns in the final quarter while giving up two scores to defeat the Cats 72-16.

"It is great that our seniors could go out on such a high note tonight," said Mule coach David Wood. "We were also able to get a bitter taste out of our mouths that had been there for a year."

"The Wildcats are a very skilled team and virtually the same squad that beat us last year. Our kids were just so focused and we had no lulls during the game. We were just so steady for the whole game. We need that steadiness going into the post season."

"We just need to take care of business next Friday and then we will have a bye to get ready for the playoffs. It was a fabulous night."

The Mule defense served early notice that real estate was going to be hard to come by on the new turf in Benny Douglas Stadium. The Wildcats gained nine yards on first down after returning the opening

kick to the River Road 23.

A herd of Mules plugged up a hole in the middle of the line for no gain on second down. Beau Avila and Cooper Washington shut down River Road's leading rusher, Chris Perez, for no gain on third down. The Cat punt rolled dead at the Mule 38.

The Mules ran four plays on their first possession, picked up four first downs and scored. Washington emptied the backfield

'Phishing' effort hits Fivearea customers

Not all local fishing expeditions end up at Lake Muleshoe.

This week a large number of fivearea.com email accounts received a "phishing" message seeking information about the recipients' username and password.

"Phishing" is a fraudulent attempt to acquire sensitive information such as usernames, passwords, and credit card details by posing as a trustworthy entity in an email.

According to Fivearea.com representatives, the local internet provider will "never" request such information from its customers in this manner, and all such electronic information requests should be considered suspect, and the customer should not respond to the information request.

When asked later during the meeting about AccessCare's outstanding lease payments, board member Wayne Pierson was told an agreement had been reached, and a payment plan had been agreed upon that would bring the account current within the next four months.

In other business:

on the first play and hit Rico Alarcon with a swing pass in front of the Cat bench. Alarcon flew down the sideline for 11 yards.

Washington pulled down the ball after looking for a receiver and scrambled for 13 yards up the middle.

Washington went under center on the third play and on a silent signal to the Mules' center, Royce Strader, took the snap and went up the middle for another 12 yards.

The Mules had run three plays and picked up three first downs and had advanced the ball to the Cat 25.

Washington faked the option pitch to Juan Sanchez and fired a 25-yard scoring strike to Eric Orozco with 9:01 left in the first period.

The Mules led 6-0.

An offensive pass interference penalty set the Cats back to their 10-yard line for a second and 20 needed for a first down. Washington got off his block to make the stop after a five-yard gain.

Perez kept and headed left and the Mules stampeded to the ball for the stop for no gain. The Cat punt rolled dead at the Mule 35.

Sanchez gained six yards on first down and 16 on second with a blast up the middle. Isaac Baca took the option pitch left and broke a tackle for six yards. Baca took a second option pitch right for nine yards and a first down at the Cat 27.

Baca went up the middle for six yards. Sanchez stuck out a stiff arm as he turned the corner for a 10-yard gain. Washington noticed Joey Ramirez was uncovered on the left side of the Mule formation and tossed him the ball. Ramirez sped away for an 11-yard TD.

The Mules led 12-0 with 4:17 left in the first quarter.

River Road drove to the Mule 28 by connecting on a 43-yard pass. Washington blew through his blocker and leaped high in the air to

Sanchez raced through a hole on a blitz and sacked the quarterback for a 13-yard loss.

Orozco went high in the air to break up a pass and force the Cats to punt from the Mule 41. The ball rolled dead on the Mule eight.

Baca gained 12-yards on first down and Washington scrambled left for 34 yards to the Cat 44. The Mules fumbled and River Road recovered on the Mule 42.

The Cats picked up their second first down of the night on back-to-back running plays of nine and five yards.

A herd of Mules plugged the hole on first down for no gain and Orozco batted the ball away from the intended receiver on second down.

Orozco blasted the receiver as the ball the ball arrived to prevent the catch on third down. An incomplete pass on fourth down gave the Mules the ball on the Mule 28.

Three incomplete passes forced the Mules to punt the ball back to the Cats. Saul Elizalde's rugby style punt into the wind rolled dead on the Cat 33.

Perez gained went 30 yards on first down to the Mule 37. Perez picked up 18 yards on second down to the Mule 16.

Sanchez got eight yards up the middle to the Cat 24. Washington faked the pitch to Sanchez and raced 24 yards to the end zone to put the Mules on top 18-0 with 5:59 left in the half.

Juan Guerrero kicked off high into the wind and the ball hit on the Cat 35. A Cat came running up to try and cover the ball but it bounce off his knee back towards the Mules and Gage Edwards recovered for the Mules at the Cat 38.

Washington connected with Ryan DeLeon for 19 yards. Washington dropped back to pass and went through his receivers. He spotted a hole in the defense, pulled down the ball and raced 19 yards for a touchdown.

It was Washington's

second rushing TD in 29 seconds. Elizalde booted the point after with 5:30 left in the half.

The Mule defense held for four downs and turned it over to their offense at the Mule 36. It took the Mules 10 plays to reach the Cat 13. Washington went under center, took the snap and faked the pitch to Sanchez.

He took five steps back and tossed to Sanchez running out of the backfield in the flats at the nine. Sanchez dashed nine yards to the end zone and Elizalde gave the Mules a 32-0 half time lead.

River Road kicked off out of bounds to start the second half. Washington hit DeLeon on a wide receiver screen pass. DeLeon followed his blockers 21 yards. Sanchez grabbed a screen pass to the right and raced 17 yards.

Washington connected with Elizalde for a 10-yard TD. Elizalde's PAT was good to give the Mules a 39-0 lead.

The Cats pinned the Mules on the one-yard line with a punt. Washington set up the Mules next TD with an 87-yard run to the Cat 12.

Sanchez went wide left on his scoring run. Elizalde's kick was good and the Mules led 46-0 with 7:27 left in the third quarter.

The Mules scored again in the third period. Washington faked the handoff to Sanchez up the middle and took a couple of steps back. He made the throw with a Cat hanging on his leg to DeLeon.

DeLeon had gotten behind his defender and pulled in the 21-yard toss with 1:03 left in the third quarter. The Mules led 51-0.

Lucio blasted the ball loose and Orozco scooped it up and 42 yards to the end zone for a defensive TD. Elizalde's kick gave the Mules a 58-0 lead with 11:35 left in the game.

River Road never ask for the clock to run and finally scored with 9:48

left in the game. Their 2-point conversion was good and trailed the Mules 58-8.

Beau Avila took over the reins for the Mules near midfield. Avila connected with Ramirez on a sideline pattern and he looped away from his defender for 16-yard gain. Avila took the snap and waited for Sanchez to leave the backfield on a delay route up the middle.

Sanchez made the catch at the 12 and raced into the end zone with 8:33 left in the game. Elizalde's kick split the uprights to extend the Mule lead to 65-8.

Isaias Gerra picked off his second Cat pass at the Mule 46 and returned to the Cat 18. Ray Martinez carried wide right for 16 yards to the two-yard line. Martinez scored on the Hammer and Elizalde kicked the Mules final point of the night with 4:26 left in the game.

River Road scored on a Perez 56-yard run and the 2-point conversion was good.

The Mules rolled up 36 first downs and 690 total yards of offense. They rushed for 425 and passed for 265. Washington rushed 15 times for 254 yards and two touchdowns.

He also connected on 17-of-27 passes for 219 yards and five TDS and had no interceptions. That is a total of 473 yards and seven TDS.
