**A WORD FROM HENRY FORD**

We expect to announce our new 1935 cars, and have them in dealers' showrooms where you may see and examine them, on Saturday, December 29th. The cars are coming off the line now and distribution will soon commence.

I have never been very much in favor of the custom of yearly models. Good motor cars do not become obsolete simply because the calendar turns a leaf. Our former custom was to put improvements on our cars as soon as we developed and tested them, so that there was continuous refinement and progress. The custom of introducing new models annually is justified when they are really new, and not merely equipped with new talking points for the purposes of salesmanship.

Last year's Ford V-8 was a good car, the best we had built up to that time. We don't say to any customer with a last year's car that his car is out of date. If it is giving him service, and if he is not in the market for a new car, there is no reason for him to feel that he is behind the procession. He still drives the fundamentally latest thing in cars. The new car has all the qualities and advantages of last year's car, with something added.

The improvements we offer are not experimental in any sense; they were thoroughly tried out under every conceivable circumstance before we finally adopted them. That, in fact, is our job all the year 'round—refining, improving, making new balance of qualities, always adhering closely to our principle of continuous growth in the basic purpose of the Ford car.

The Economy is even greater than before—an 8-cylinder engine with the economy of a four. As to Comfort, however, there has been a very considerable advance, as I think you will agree when you have tried the car out.

We built more than 20,000,000 cars previous to the V-8. We have built 1,300,000 V-8 cars. The V-8, we believe, is the proper engine for the low-price car field, which is our field.

This 1935 car will be on display December 29th, with all details ready for your information. It is entirely probable that the prices will start at lower levels than in 1934. We want them lower because we expect to build a million cars and better next year, and the price must be right. If the price is right, people will buy; men will go back to work; a thousand related businesses will feel the new impulse. At least, we are trying to make 1935 a busier, happier and more hopeful year.

## Management by Managers

"Ordinarily the management and managerial policies of a privately owned utility company should remain in the hands of its executive officers who are... familiar with the necessary development to meet future demands of the public," said the late Richard T. Higgins, President of the National Association of Railroad and Utilities Commissioners, in a recent address. "Regulatory commissions with their numerous duties pertaining to many different classes of utility operations may not be qualified and should not be expected to act as executive or managerial agents of the several companies, but wherever there is found to be a destructive managerial policy or flagrant violation of sound executive judgment, the commission should take action as will necessitate a change and correction of the company's policies for the public's interest."

That certainly seems simple and sensible and no doubt reflects the viewpoint of most commissioners. Yet there are growing demands—largely resulting from political attacks on the utilities... for legislation which would take management questions out of the jurisdiction of owners of properties, and make them the province of state commissions.

One wonders how rapidly utilities would have developed in the past had that policy been in effect. State commissions are ordinarily highly efficient bodies—but they are necessarily made up of men who have no personal interest in utilities. The magnificent standard of electric service we have in America has been due to the fact that the people who put up their money to build plants, took all the risks—they gambled, and sometimes they won and sometimes lost. They were comparatively free agents, and there were no artificial barriers to progress and achievement. Should management be subjected to the rule in all matters of an outside body, the spirit of enterprise would be lost—to the ultimate deterioration of service.

## Early Christmas Shopping

It is a little late to say "Shop early." This week the Cisco merchants are planning their final pre-Christmas rush, and except for Christmas Eve, it is the last opportunity for shopping.

For weeks now Christmas packages have been in the mails for Alaska, Poland, Australia, Zanzibar, and other far-off places. The postal authorities have urged the public to shop early, mail early, and give the postman a break.

What they may have added is shop early, give yourself a break as well. Of course your toes may be the tough kind that will take an awful beating from the feet of other patrons grabbing at that same necktie, but even if they are that necktie may be gone when you get there if you wait too long.

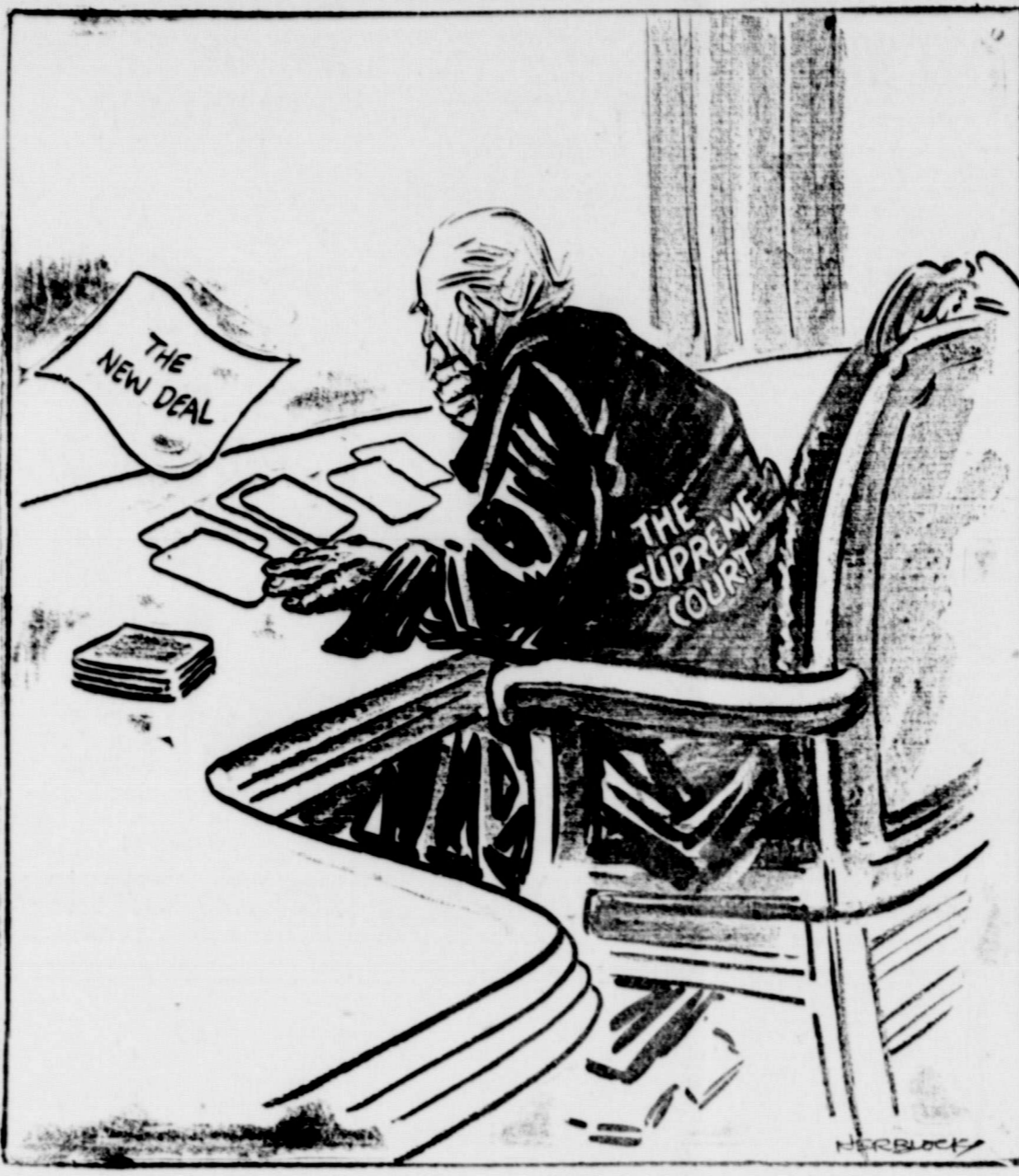

AUSTIN, Dec. 15 — Texas has a condition now which may utterly tie up the state, city, county and district tax payments, indefinitely.

Sen. T. J. Holbrook disclosed in the senate tax committee hearings at Austin, Holbrook said he apprehends a suit Feb. 9, testing the Pope tax penalty remission bill, which not only block and operations under that bill before it expires March 13 but would tie up all delinquent tax settlements and collections for months or years.

John T. Smith, Austin tax expert whom Sen. Holbrook was questioning, agreed with the senator that such a suit might be based on "class" discriminations in the Pope tax law.

Purpose of the bill was to permit the state and cities counties and districts, to get in large quantities of delinquent taxes, sorely needed for current operations, as well as to grant relief to oppressed taxpayers. But a court test by any taxpayer in the state would tie up the entire bill, it was pointed out.

BUDAPEST, Dec. 15 - A series of significant conversations between Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg of Austria and Premier Julius Goemboes of Hungary was concluded today with the independence of Austria. The announcement by Baron Egon Waldeneck, foreign minister of Austria and a member of Chancellor Schuschnigg's party, was regarded here as a sensational development in the present phase of the European situation. Hungary hitherto steadfastly had refused to join in a declaration by Italy, France and Great Britain guaranteeing the political freedom of Austria. Baron Waldeneck's statement followed three days of conversations in this center of European political tension which recently has been intensified by Hungary's dispute with Jugoslavia over expulsion of Hungarians by the Belgrade government. Meanwhile, contrary to Belgrade report officials here said the expulsion of Hungarians from Jugoslavia in retaliation for alleged acts of terrorism originating in Hungary, was continuing. Twenty-five expelled Hungarians arrived at Szeged on the frontier this morning. They said they were given three hours to leave. VIENNA, Dec. 15 - Three political killings were reported today from the provinces. A Catholic storm trooper and a regular trooper were killed on the German front, supposedly by exiled Austrians nazis and a former nazi storm trooper was killed near the river docks at Linz. Police believed the nazi killed at Linz was a victim of revenge because he had left the nazis and had joined the neimwchr.




