### Favorable Trade Balance

For the third successive month the value of American exports to foreign countries was greater than in the corresponding month of each of the last three succeeding years. Total exports were valued at \$206,382,000, compared with respect to the existing fundamental \$191,691,000 in the previous month and \$193,069,000 in October, 1933. For the first 10 months of 1934 the total value of exports was \$1,767,697,000, which was 36 per cent more than during the first 10 months of 1933 and larger than for the and salaries two years ago, and who entire 12 months of 1932.

Total value of imports for the first 10 months of 1934 was \$1,371,871,000, about 16 per cent larger than in the corresponding period of 1933. The merchandise export balance in October totaled \$77,000,000, compared with \$60,000,000 in September, 1934, and \$42,000,000 in October, 1933. This was the largest excess of merchandise exports over imports since November, 1930.
